Child Welfare Spends \$700 For Provisions

The Child Welfare Club spent nearly \$700 in providing certain necessities for needy persons here last year, their annual report released this week indicates.

Biggest cost to the club was 52 grocery orders that cost \$383.40. Also 27 persons in 15 families were provided with new clothing at a cost of \$145.12 and another \$62.14 was spent for 13 pair of new shoes for eight families.

All totaled the group answered 158 calls during the year, which included gathering clothing and household furnishings, establishing pensions, distributing and gathering Christmas baskets and in general providing for the general welfare of the needy.

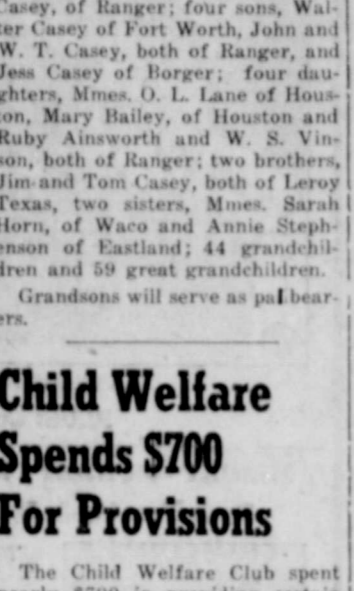

Four of the world's largest tires, ten feet high by four feet wide, support the 101 tons of hoists, framework and twin diesel engines which make up the behemoth. Built by R. G. LeTourneau, Longview, Tex., the monster can handle upward of 67 tons. The huge device can operate in water up to eight feet in depth. It is expected to materially reduce expensive losses incurred when landing craft are disabled.

Location for a new Eastland County wildcat has been staked one mile northeast of Olden, W. L. Meadows, Jr., of Midland.

It will be No. 1. Mrs. I. C. Webb, et al, spotting 1,050 feet from the north and 200 feet from the west lines of Section 1, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 1,200 feet with cable tools.

Five miles south of Eastland, Pete Thomas of San Angelo spotted Harbin, Convent and Siebert, a 1,000-foot rotary project in the regular field.

Site is 300 feet from the west and 1,400 feet from the north line of Section 10, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Eight Bulldogs Named To Official All-District Squad

Three Rangerites Hear Industry Talks

Three Rangerites heard the Industrial Conference of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce ponder the problem confronting most West Texas cities of developing existing industry Thursday afternoon following a discussion of attracting new industries in a meeting at Abilene.

The three attending from Ranger were R. V. Galloway, Chamber of Commerce manager; Lester Crossley, city manager; and Jess Meroney.

Delegates from 53 West Texas cities, in separate discussion sessions held at the Wooten Hotel, agreed to entice local industry to expand their operations.

One session, headed by C. F. Watson, assistant manager of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, was for delegates representing cities of over 25,000 population.

The other session, presided over by W. M. Lenderman, manager of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, here, was for representatives of cities having less than 25,000 population.

The consensus from the two sessions was that the greatest problem facing expansion of existing industry was the apathy, or contentment, of operators.

One solution to the problem was, to make it easier for the small businessman to secure "risk capital" giving him an incentive for expansion backed with the necessary funds.

H. J. Tanner of Eastland, B. A. Butler of Rising Star and C. Ray Martin of Dallas gave pro and con views on the question of developing existing industry on the panel discussions carried over into the afternoon.

Panel members listed examples, some which were successful and others which failed, in which smaller industries were urged to expand their operations.

Davis McMahon, manager of the Dallas general merchandise office of Sears, Roebuck and Co., spoke briefly on what the manufacturer or developer looks for most in deciding whether or not to build in any particular community. If an area is friendly and cooperative and will give the new industry an even break the community's chances are helped greatly, he said.

Former Ranger Boy Killed By Gun Accident

Bobby Ray Boyd, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Boyd of Moran, died at 9 p.m. Thursday in a Cisco hospital of gunshot wounds that was inflicted by his father in a tragic accident near their home earlier in the day.

Bobby, who was born in Ranger in 1949, walked in front of his father who was firing a .22 calibre rifle at a target. The bullet from the rifle struck the youth in the head. He was taken immediately to the Cisco hospital for treatment but died several hours later.

Funeral services were held Friday at 4:30 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Ranger with Rev. Ralph Perkins, pastor, and J. B. Fowler of Moran, officiating.

Interment was at Bullock Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

The youth was survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Boyd of Moran, a brother, Tommy Lee Boyd; grandmothers, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Boyd of Cisco, Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Hodges of Ranger; great grandmothers, Mr. and Mrs. John Lester of Ranger.

Pallbearers will be Don Bradford, Wesley Dempsey, Bob Miller and Vinton Jones.

The Ranger Bulldogs, district 7-A football champions and victors over McCamey in the regional playoff clash, placed eight men on the official all-district team, a recent survey of the six district coaches by the Ranger Times has shown.

Of the 13 players picked, five of the group, Jerry Wharton, Archie Robinson and Tommy Young, all of Ranger, Clyde Evatt of Eastland and Max Pierce of Gorman were chosen unanimously.

Balloting among the coaches necessitated the 13-man team. Seven linemen and five backfieldmen are generally chosen but Pete Jameson of Ranger and Larry Tankersley of Eastland received an equal amount of votes at the tackle position.

Surprising member of the all-district squad was Ranger's powerful fullback Tommy Sutton, who set at the sideline with injuries the first half of the season, only to develop into one of the conference's leading ground gainers the latter half of the year.

Others of the Ranger group, who reached an all-time high in all-district choices by filling the eight positions, were Quarterback Paul Hinds, end Jerry Cantrell, and center John Hagaman.

Both Eastland and Cross Plains, the number two and three teams in the district, placed two men each. Eastland had Evatt at end and Tankersley at tackle while Cross Plains seated guard Terry Watkins and back David Jennings. Gorman rounded out the group with its only selection, Pierce.

District coaches have agreed that this year's all-district choices represents the finest display of talent ever assembled in this conference.

James Alexander, Cross Plains coach, said this team has speed, passing and power.

Ranger mentor, Boone Yarbrough added, "There's very few lines that have as much speed combined with that much weight. The backfield is a powerful combination of speed and deception."

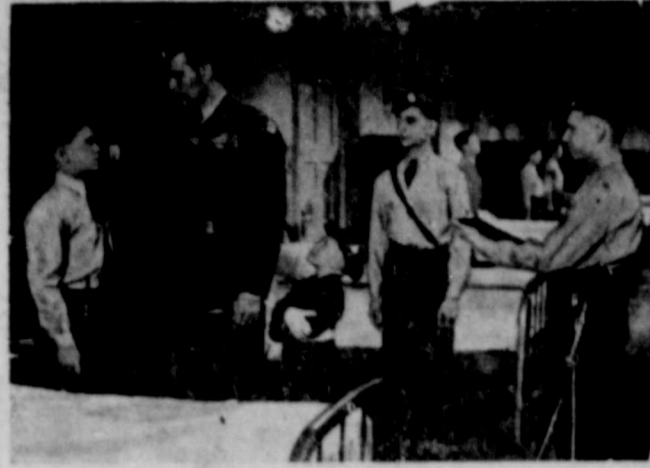

Navy Calls For 10,000 Draftees For March

The Navy which skips drafting in January and February, will induct 10,000 men in March, the Defense Department has announced. Army's draft call is 6,000.

When the Navy first went to the Selective Service for new sailors it anticipated it would need 56,000 draftees by next summer. However, the increased reenlistment rate has made the Navy personnel situation take on a more favorable look.

Optimism was expressed by Navy Secretary Thomas who, during his recent Far East tour, predicted that the Navy would actually be drafting less than half of the original 56,000-man goal.

Some 20,000 inductees have donned bluejacket uniforms since the Navy began drafting in November. Navy's holiday policy ruled out drafting in late December and January. The reenlistment improvement resulted in cancellation of the February order for 10,000 draftees.

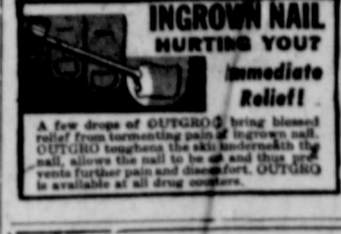

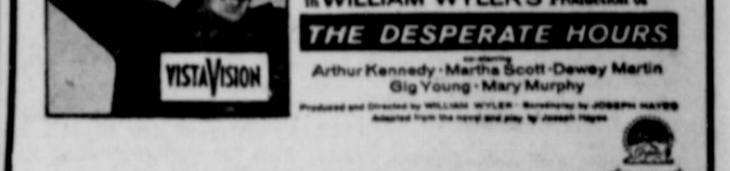
