Negro Woman Acquitted In Whiskey Case By District Court Wednesday

Defense Shows That House Was Rented

The "mysterious Mr. X," as he was referred to by District Attorney J. M. Nuesse, may not have been present in the 91st District Court at Eastland Wednesday, but his being, as established by four witnesses, was the crucial point in a verdict of "not guilty" returned by the jury for Mrs. Lola Harris who was charged with the possession of intoxicating liquors for the purpose of sale.

This "Mr. X" otherwise identified only as Joe Davis, an itinerant colored truck driver, was named by four witnesses in the final day of the trial Wednesday as the person having rented the portion of the dwelling located at the intersection of Marston and Cherry Sts. where a large cache of illegal whiskey was taken by Ranger police in a surprise raid Feb. 13.

The witnesses, which included Mrs. Harris, a Negro, testified that Joe Davis had rented the room nearly a year ago and had "come and gone" during that time. The witnesses indicated however, that they did not know if he had a family, where he worked or where he went from here.

Mrs. Harris said that he paid \$12 a month rent for the two-room dwelling.

Claude White, sexton at the First Baptist Church, disputed the testimony given by Police Chief W. G. Pounds Tuesday, when he said Wednesday that no trials were in evidence at the rear of the dwellings leading from the Little Gem Hotel to the house where the cache was seized. Mrs. Harris also owns the Little Gem Hotel.

On questioning of District Attorney Nuesse, White said that he had become familiar with the terrain in back of the dwelling through frequent visits he had paid Mrs. Harris and her mother and that he had been to the house to get Davis to go to work.

White also said that he had seen Joe Davis in the neighborhood during his visits.

Calvin Brown of Ranger, one of the defense's six witnesses during the final day of the trial, testified also that no trail was visible at the back of the dwellings. He said that he was familiar with the terrain as he had been called there on numerous occasions to deliver supplies, make estimates of repair and conduct repair work.

The defense lawyers, Frank Sparks of Eastland and L. K. Pearson of Ranger, sprang the "Joe Davis story" during a 1 1/2 final day of the trial after Wednesday's session involved mostly the witnesses of the prosecution and the paneling of the jury.

Sparks attempted in the opening minutes of the trial Wednesday to have the case thrown out on the grounds that the writ was inadequate and that the search warrant should be issued with more adequate and accurate information as to why the search warrant should be issued was not made available.

Sparks, referring frequently to Mrs. Harris as "this old lady," maintained that she could not be held responsible for property not under her possession or control that she had nothing to do with.

Chief Pounds, after describing a trail that led from the Little Gem Hotel to the house where the hidden whiskey was seized, was asked by Sparks if the path was not one "niggers" used all the time.

However, White's and Brown's testimony that no trail was or is in evidence diluted that of Chief Pounds' and Ed Freeman's, the second Ranger policeman to testify Tuesday.

Staged before a full-house at times, the trial sluggishly wormed through the necessary testimony of the first witnesses on nearly an even keel until the "Joe Davis" testimony ruptured the prosecution's testimony.

Nuesse said today that a file of forfeiture suit on the liquor seized would be filed. He said that the suit would be filed in the name of the State against the liquor. Anyone making claim of the illegal whiskey, which has been stored in a Liquor Control Board vault in Abilene, would be liable for court hearing.

The jury deliberated nearly three hours before reaching the verdict.

Three Day Easter Services Begin At St. Rita's

Holy Thursday, the Memorial of the Last Supper, will be celebrated at the St. Rita's Catholic Church here tonight at 7 p.m.

The event consists of the "washing of the feet" of 12 members of the congregation by the pastor, then the climax with the "Eucharistic Sacrifice" during which the faithful will take their turn to watch and pray with Him during the night and the following Good Friday.

The ceremony of the veneration of the cross, followed with mass, will be conducted at 6 p.m. Friday. This ceremony also called in the early days of Christianity "The Night-watch of the Resurrection" or the "Mother of all holy vigils" calls to mind the intense sorrow and dread filling the hearts and souls of the few who remained loyal to the Lord after His death.

This ceremony comes to its climax in the "Candle-light" service. In this ceremony all lights are turned out and each participant receives a candle which represents the faith and hope of the Risen Christ.

The mid-night mass will begin as the new day, the day Christ arose. All these services are a historical portrayal of the way the Holy Week services were celebrated in the very early days of Christianity.

Easter day mass will be conducted at 11 a.m.

Skies Expected To Clear; No Rain In Sight

Warmer weather was expected to replace the dust in this area today and temperatures were expected to return to about normal by Easter Sunday.

A high of near 70 is predicted for Thursday with the low Thursday night around 45-50 and the high returning to near 80 Friday. Light to moderate wind is predicted for Thursday and no moisture has been predicted for the next two days.

U. S. Senator Price Daniel made a positive and definite announcement of his candidacy for Governor Monday night. He pledged to wage an active and vigorous campaign in every section of the state.

Two weeks earlier on March 12, he announced that he was ready and willing to run for governor and thought he could serve best in that office during the next two years, but he left his final decision to the people of Texas and asked that they write him their advice.

Daniel said that 29,352 Texans had written their approval and offered their support, while only 429 had expressed their opposition. In Monday's announcement, Daniel reviewed again his 12-point program and said that his campaign would stress four particular points:

(1) Peace and integrity in the halls of government.

(2) Honesty and integrity in the political campaign. On this he said, "Texas needs clean politics as much as it needs clean government." He promised to keep his campaign on a high plane regardless of the bitterness and name-calling that others might employ.

(3) Restoration of unity and good will among the people of Texas.

(4) Protection of the rights of Texas people against further Federal encroachments, and especially against domination by certain national pressure groups which will try to capture the governor's office this year for the candidate of their choice.

Black derby hats in many varieties have certainly become popular during the past few months in this area with celebrations at Abilene and Cisco running concurrently. The black hats atop bearded faces are seen quite frequently about town as visitors from the 400 cities appear on the streets.

Caplan G. L. Morahan of the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol said that traffic accidents and deaths are continuing to mount in spite of the fact that the death rate for sales driven is down in this area.

Accidents increased substantially this year as 104 motor vehicle accidents occurred in February as compared to 66 in February of 1955.

Capt. Morahan said, "Horsepower, in the modern automobile, alone does not cause the trouble. In fact, the horsepower comes in mighty handy when passing another car, carrying a heavy load, or climbing some of our steep hills. It is the driver who causes nine out of every 10 accidents by failing to control that horsepower. We can't drastically reduce traffic casualties until we all slow down."

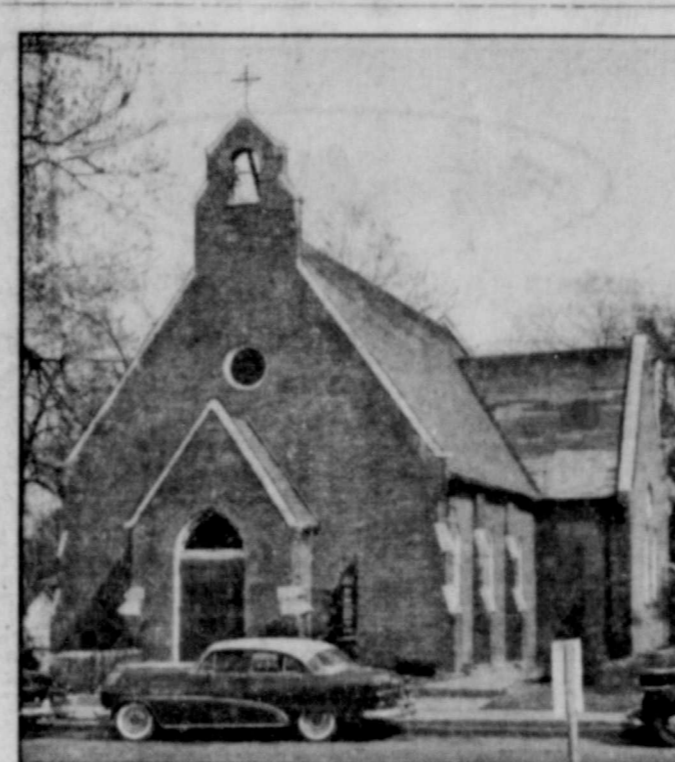

County Livestock Show Plans Readied

Final planning for the Eastland County Livestock show which is to be held at Eastland Friday and Saturday, was completed this week. It has been announced.

All stock to be judged in the show must be in place at 11 a.m. Friday. Sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, the exhibit is to be held at the show barn of the association at Eastland.

Entry slips turned in by vocational agriculture teachers of the county and the county agent's office indicate that there will be 25 fat calves, 85 fat barrows and 150 fat lambs in the FFA and 4-H division of the show. There will also be entries in breeding stock, hogs, sheep and goats.

Awards Provided in 4-H Frozen Food Program

An increased number of incentives are being offered for the 100,000 4-H Club members participating in the 1956 National 4-H Frozen Foods Program.

A new addition to the Honor Roll of National Donors of 4-H Awards, the Whirlpool-Seeger Corporation of St. Joseph, Mich., is providing medals for four county winners this year, double the number previously offered. State winners in the program will receive all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Convention in Chicago, in place of a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond. At the Congress, six national winners will be named and each presented a \$300 college scholarship.

The National Frozen Foods Awards Program has become increasingly popular among 4-H members since its inception in 1945. Through the program, club members learn to use freezing equipment advantageously and economically, discover the local foods best adapted to freezing, and develop skill in preparing, packaging and freezing meats, poultry, eggs, fish, fruits and vegetables.

The program is conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service,

and the awards arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago. Full information is available from county extension offices.

New Edition of Hwy. Travel Map Now Available

The new 1956 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map is now available, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced in Austin today.

The map has many new features and contains a wealth of information on Texas, Greer said. Most of the topographical relief was removed from the map last year so that more essential information can be read easily and quickly. The growth of the Texas Highway System at the rate of about 3,000 miles a year has made it necessary to gradually remove some of the less important information to make room for the increased mileage, he said.

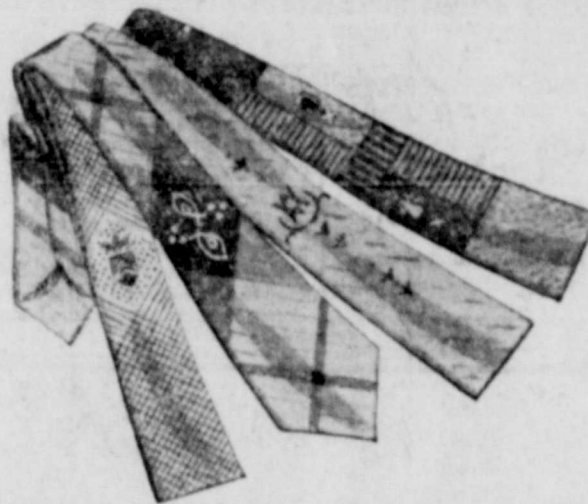

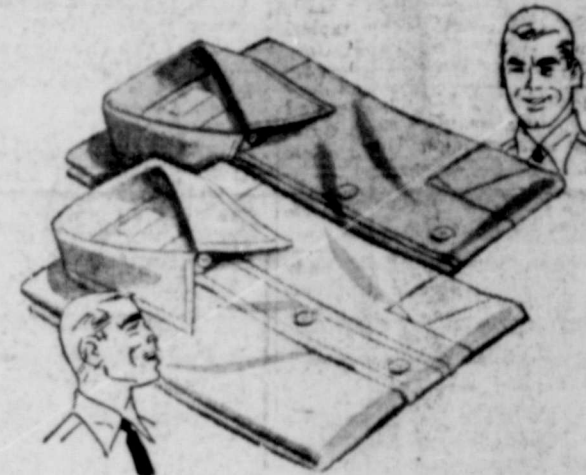

Enough Different Zinnias To Plant a Whole Garden



Big and Small, All the Blossoms Illustrated Are Zinnias.

Zinnias, the native American flowers which are the easiest of annuals to grow from seed, excel all other annuals in the variety of their colors, forms and sizes. There is hardly a garden role for which one of its many varieties cannot be used. A beautiful garden can be planted with zinnias alone, and if all of its charming colors, and various forms are used, your friends will find it difficult to believe that such an effect was produced with different varieties of one flower.

Planting such a garden offers no difficulties. Seed can be sown direct in the garden to germinate in a few days and flower in a few weeks. Somewhat earlier flowers can be obtained by starting seeds in the house, or a cold frame, to be transferred to the garden when freezing weather ends.

In a zinnia border, it would be well to avoid seed of mixed colors, and do your own color composing with groups or masses, each of a single color, attractively placed in harmonious contrast with each other.

In the background the giants can be used, 3 to 4 feet tall. In this size you may select from two different forms, the dahlias flowered and the cactus. The first have flat petals formally arranged on 4-inch blooms of white, cream, yellow, red, rose, pink, lavender or purple flowers, in various tones. In pleasing contrast to these, cactus flowered zinnias have charmingly irregular curled petals, and grow even larger in size. There are white, scarlet, pink, and yellow varieties with flowers 3 inches across. With groups of these large flowers arranged so that each group enhances the beauty of its neighbors, a decorative effect can be achieved difficult to surpass with any other flowers.

For the border foreground there are lower growing zinnias, with smaller flowers, but borne in greater profusion. They grow in low bushes from which armfuls of blossoms can be cut to use in bouquets. The secret of making them bloom profusely is never to allow flowers to fade on the plant.

Fantasy zinnias, 2½ feet tall, have shaggy flowers like the cactus type, and lovely lavender, orange, rose and scarlet colors. The flowers of Hageana Zinnias growing 18 inches tall, resemble small dahlias, with each pointed petal tipped with a contrasting color, including yellow, crimson, maroon, pink and orange.

Lower growing kinds with small double flowers of conventional form, in brilliant red, pink, yellow and orange, include Tom Thumb, 6 inches tall; Cupid, 12 inches; and Lilliput, 12 to 15 inches.

All zinnias need room to develop branches so do not crowd them. Give even the smallest kind a foot of room to grow in and the giants twice this space. They revel in warm sunshine and increase the abundance of their flowers as the days grow shorter, continuing until frost.

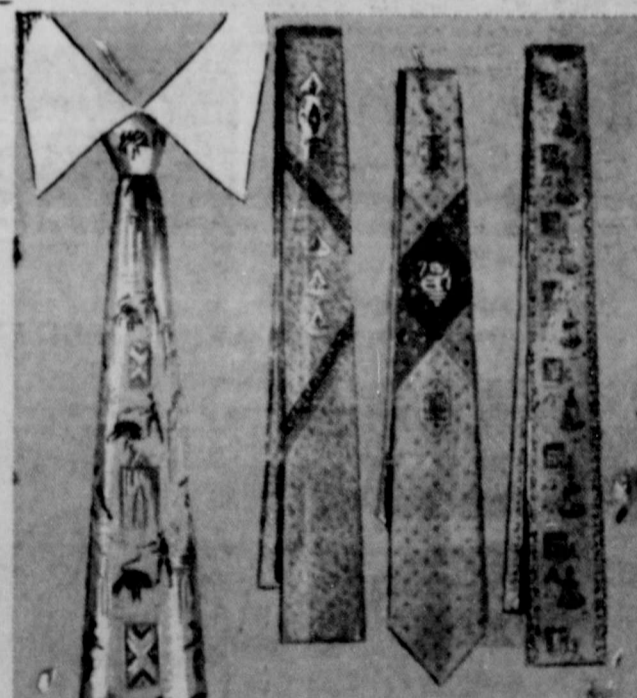

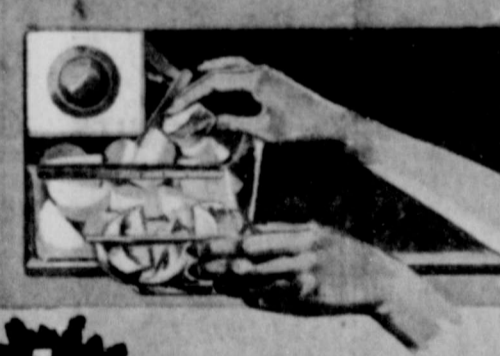

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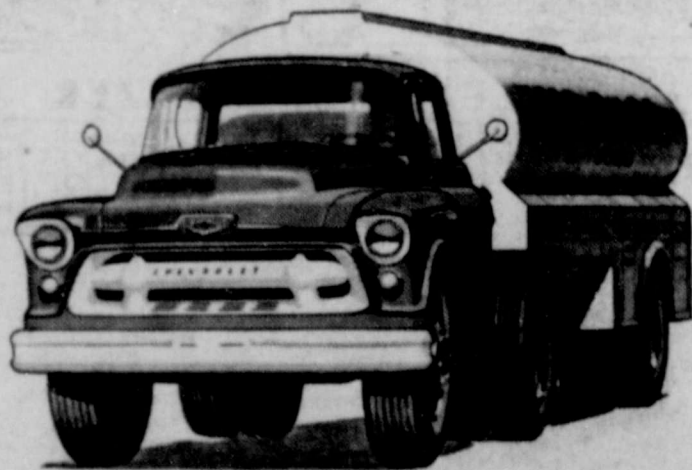

Beauty of Tall Flowers Enhances Garden Picture



Hardy Asters Blossom In Early Fall

Flowers speak with color, form and height of growth. Like the neighbors in your block, they differ. By their contrast with each other, flowers excite interest in your garden. Proper blending of their beauty brings out the best in each.

Tall flowering plants form the backdrop for your stage-full of blossoms. Because they are used to help screen out background views, they naturally are seldom planted alone.

There are many tall growing flowers which can be used this way, including both annuals and perennials. Where space is limited they can serve better than shrubbery for their roots do not compete with other flowers as does shrubbery. Some are among the old-fashioned flowers which are new again, and will be admired by visitors to your garden who are not familiar with them.

For an attractive background screen for your earlier flowers, try *Boltonia asteroides* (false chamomile). It grows 6 feet tall with a leafy plant. In late summer its daisy-like white flowers come and remain until October, giving you one of the few perennials which blossom in the fall.

For large clusters of "forget-me-not" flowers of gentian blue in June and July, try *Anchusa Italica* Dropmore which grows 5 feet tall.

Hardy Asters, true American flowers (which the British call Michaelmas daisies) are perennials you can grow from seed. Their white, crimson, pink and blue flowers are grown on bushes

that may reach 5 feet in height. *Gypsophila* (Baby's Breath) grows 4 feet tall, bearing myriads of small pink or white blossoms in late summer.

Single and double hollyhocks are among the most highly decorative flowers for a border background. They grow quickly from seed to a height of six feet or more, with flowers including many tones of red, pink and orange. The flowering season can be lengthened many weeks if faded blossoms are picked to prevent seed formation.

Liatris September Glory (Kansas Gay Feather) is a 6 foot beauty whose stalks are covered in late summer with feathery purple flowers.

Thalictrum (meadow rue) is a delicate flower with feathery leaves which grows 5 feet tall, and while never taking the spotlight, always provides a pleasing background for more brilliant blossoms.

A 4 foot perennial *Verbena* (bonariensis) bears fragrant lavender flowers from seed the first year.

All the above are perennials which grow easily from seed, and once established will perform their roles in the garden picture for many years.

Among tall growing annuals are *galliardia*-flowered sunflowers which grow 4 to 8 feet tall, and have fully double flowers of chestnut red and yellow, which give height and color to the garden background, where there is room for a considerable group,
