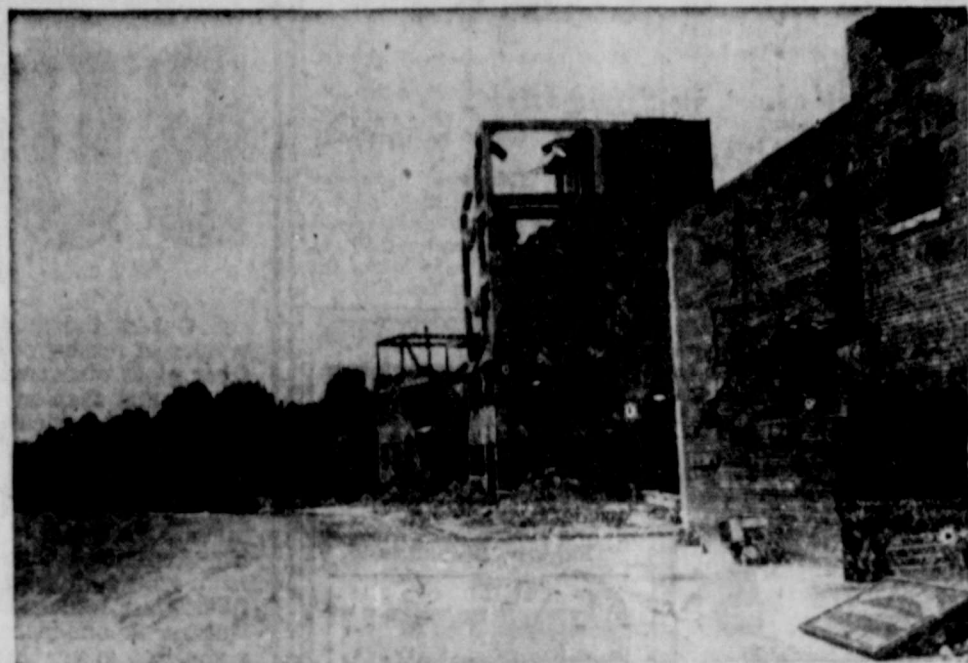

Following the fall of the heavy rains in this area Sunday, Monday and Tuesday a great deal of the interest has naturally shifted to Lake Leon which rose to its tallest heights Wednesday. Of course, there was some speculation as to crops, but then we all pretty well know just what the moisture means to the farmer.

Biggest complaint heard over the area following the downpour was "Well, I lost a good trotline," or "I didn't get the trees cleared off around my lot."

Actually however, these statements were probably matter of fact rather than complaints. For there's probably not one single fisherman who would trade the nearly full lake to have his trees cleaned from his cabin site or to have his trotline returned unharmed.

Heavy traffic since the rain began to ease Tuesday morning has moved steadily from nearby cities, including Ranger, to the lake. Curiosity seekers have followed the rise of the lake inch-by-inch.

However, those few who can reach their boats or boat docks, which for the most part stand divided from land by several feet of water, have for the most part not ventured out on the lake and for the best possibly. For large stumps, tree branches and even hazardous boat travel on the lake hazard.

We are fortunate that the lake lacks so little in being full, for other reservoirs constructed in different parts of the state have set practically empty for years before taking enough water to fill them even half full.

Of course, with the lake now this full, we'd like to see it go all the way. There's a lot of speculation as to how the overflow, now almost submerged, will handle the water.

Each time that a large rain falls in this area and water begins pouring into the lake, somehow, by some means or another, the dam is quickly spread that the dam is endangered and the flashing story takes on a wilder approach each time until it finally includes that the dam is cracking and crumbling.

Such was the case Tuesday night. The Police Department was diluged with telephone calls asking if the dam wasn't about to wash out.

Of course, the situation in that case would or could be disastrous, yet, the dam has its first time to show any signs of weaknesses and there has never been any qualms among the Water Board members.

There's much debate around this area as to whether or not rain making machines scattered through this area had any effect upon the clouds which poured out the rains during the past few days. Of course, there's a "gun", a part of a big hoopup, right here in Ranger.

It doesn't seem however, that the experiment has been used long enough to be proven. We know that it is not always effective, but even say that it is 50 percent effective (which it may or may not be), then our chances of more rain in this area would certainly be increased.

## Leg Of Dallas Cloud Seeding Operation Located In City

A simple appearing machine installed in a cabinet like metal chest no more than three feet tall may have caused the recent heavy rainfall in this area.

The machine, located at the D. C. Robinson Texaco Service Station on U. S. Highway 80 West in Ranger, called a silver iodide generator, has been stationed in this area by the Water Resources Development Corporation in Denver.

Purpose of the machine is to provide rainfall in the Fort Worth and Dallas areas, but Pat Wade, serviceman for the area, says that the machine cannot help but benefit this area as the unit cannot make the clouds depart with their moisture in any certain area.

Mrs. Robinson explained that the 1 1/2 horsepower one phase, 115 volt motor is started with charcoal and kerosene. Fumes and smoke from the silver iodide and is supposed to saturate rain clouds drawing their moisture from them. Machines in the area are started when the operators are notified by telephone to begin operation from the corporation's headquarters in Denver. Weather conditions and direction of the wind set the pattern as to which machines will be turned on.

Other machines have been set up at Stephenville, Valley Mills, Ennis, Greenville, Graham, Olney, Wauridka and Ardmore and Durant, Okla., a map of the area shows. Some others, unlisted, have also been placed recently.

As the silver iodide fumes fan out from any of the given areas, they are pushed by the wind toward the Dallas area where they form in their heaviest concentration. Basically, the principle of the operation is this: Silver iodide crystals have the peculiar chemical property of being able to collect minute particles of water vapor around them at certain temperatures, well below the freezing mark, thus forming a tiny ice crystal. As the crystal continues to collect these tiny water droplets it grows in size. When the ice crystal thus formed becomes sufficiently large it begins to fall of its own weight and in falling it gathers more water particles until it becomes a snowflake. Otherwise it melts and falls the rest of the way as a raindrop.

Nature produces precipitation in exactly the same way except that in nature, dust, soil particles and salt particles act as the nuclei or (Continued on Page 8)

## Lake Leon's Full - Almost

Actual work on the dam began Feb. 15, 1952. Work was completed in August of 1954.

Combined spillway capacity is 206,000 second-feet. Yield during annum is 7100 acre feet and capacity of the lake at the pump station is 3,500,000 gallons a day. Capacity of raw water line to the filter plant is 3,500,000 and rated capacity of the filter plant is 2,500,000 gallons daily. Overload capacity of the filter plant is 3,500,000 gallons a day.

With the lake full, residents of Staff — who at one time feared the lake would cut them off from both Eastland and Ranger — are enjoying a minor boom. A special appropriation for \$125,000 by the State Highway Commission for a new bridge across the lake gave the township new hope. The old bridge leading to Staff is now completely inundated.

Engineers have estimated that the lake will supply the water needs of 100,000 people adequately.

Perhaps Boyce House best described the setting for Lake Leon when he said the new lake "...is scenic — rugged, boulder-strewn hills; clumps of post-oak, pecan and mesquite trees; and in the woods and thickets are to be found squirrels, mockingbirds, armadillos and perhaps a wolf or two."

Lake Leon has made the entire area fishing conscious. Hundreds and thousands of bass, catfish and other fish were stocked in the lake even before the completion of the dam, and fishing was not allowed until September 1, 1955.

Actually it took only two good rains to fill the lake to its capacity, which proved the watershed is more than adequate to keep the lake full. Strangely enough, the two big rains came almost a year apart, in May of this year and May of 1955.

Yes, Lake Leon is full!

The heavy downpour marked the heaviest precipitation in this area since an 11-inch flood struck the area last May.

Heavy rains in the area put Lake Leon on an eight foot rise bringing the lake to a depth of 74 feet and eight inches, 1 1/2 highest point it has ever reached. The lake water level stood at 66.3 before the surging waters began pouring in Tuesday morning.

Showers expected here would be caused by moist air from the Gulf of Mexico overrunning cooler air aloft.

Lake Leon, now four inches below its capacity mark is now not expected to fill completely. Ab Richardson, warden at the lake, said that no additional water seemed to be pouring in this morning. "It looks pretty still," he said.

## Fight Between Two Factors Looms Here

Eastland Countians will have an opportunity to voice their opinion Saturday of who they think is right — Governor Allan Shivers or Sen. Lyndon Johnson — when 25 precinct conventions are held beginning at 2 p.m.

Backfield material is fairly deep but nearly all positions on the line are being manned by inexperienced personnel. In most cases there is no depth.

Some of the local gridders have been transferred from their regular position to fill other gaps, created this year by graduation and transfers.

Hestand, however, may get a boost from four new prospects, Joe Bob Allen, a halfback from Whiteface, Robert Odell a Monahans halfback and two ends, Keith Hodo from Quannah and Owen Mobley from Seymour.

The overall lineup shaped up something like this:

Ends: Jim Mangum a 215-pound starter will be back for service and Dan Mitchell, 185, who was hurt early last season, will again seek a starting berth.

Tackles: Only Eddie Joe Jones, 230-pounds and a letterman during the last season, has become fairly certain to start at one of the tackle slots. Charles Scott, at 185-pounds could see a lot more action if he added more weight.</

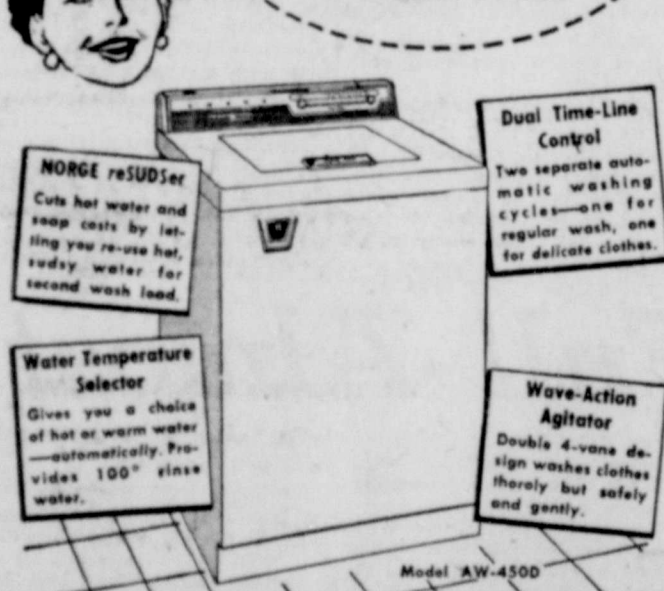

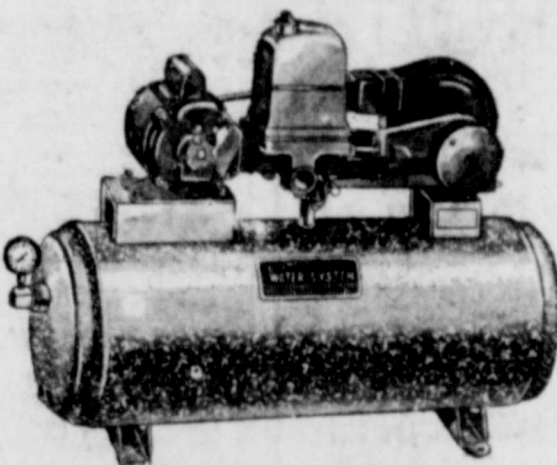

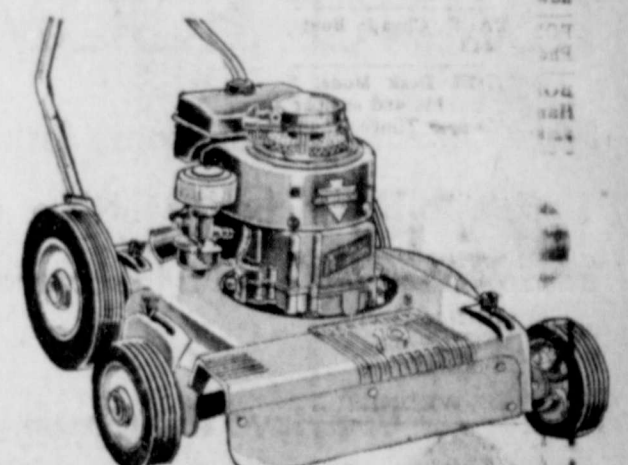

**How I Stand on The Farm Problem**

Open Letter to Farmers and Ranchers

As I stated in my announcement, the farmer and rancher are getting a raw deal. All we have had is conversation. All this fancy talk about parity means nothing to us. Anything less than 100% parity means the money you get for your crops and cattle is not as good as the money the rest of the people are getting for their services and products. It amounts to this: If you had to trade your \$100 that you received for your crops and cattle on a barter basis, your \$100 would get only \$50 worth of other materials or perhaps as much as \$84 depending on the type of crops. It is still less than you deserve. Why should you be discriminated against? We hear all this conversation about surpluses and soil banks. What else can we expect when big money interests move in and take over the little farms and initiate big commercial ventures producing big surpluses and squeezing you, the little man, out?

How do you think the soil bank is going to effect you folks with a thousand acres or less? You know what. You will be getting poorer and poorer. There are statements being made that if you cannot make a living, it means you are not intelligent enough to farm and ranch and you better get out of the business. What would they have you do? Give up the soil that is yours? Shoot yourselves? Collectivization is taking place right now. You are being given the one-two treatment.

Your income has dropped 35% in the past eight years while the national income has raised 40%. No one has done anything but give you conversation.

Overproduction is not the only reason for your price troubles. Overproduction is caused by big commercial farming ventures owned by Eastern absentee owners who would have the man on the farm get out of the business because he is a nuisance and leave all the gravy to them.

You are faced with rising costs of what you buy and lowering prices for what you sell. This squeeze is pinching you bottom and top — it has a hand in all of your pockets.

No one cares what happens to the farmer and rancher in the 17th Congressional District. They won't care about the hazards you face, the drouth, the disease, and insects. The whole nation should share the risk of your gamble.

Your crops and cattle go to market seasonally. There is always a glut at this time—so why shouldn't the price be shared by all who eat the food. Besides, don't you tear your hair out when you see the price spread between what you sell and what the consumer pays?

After the war, industry was helped tax-wise by the government to convert from cannons, guns, and tanks to peace time production. What could you, the farmer, do? Convert to monkey wrenches?

No one thought of giving you a real fair deal. Instead, big commercial promoters moved in and took over the situation producing surpluses and depressing prices squeezing you all out one at a time. Everybody is getting fat but you farmers and ranchers.

You are tired of politicians giving you conversation. You are tired of government agricultural experts and economists telling you about small farm inefficiency and it is alright for the big farm to gobble up the little farm. They will tell you to go to the city and get a job and let the big boys run the big company farms. They will tell you if you are a little farmer, you have no business farming. We are all little farmers in the 17th Congressional District.

Your tax dollars went to our foreign friends, and these foreign friends are now competing against you. You can't even sell your surpluses abroad. You have to give it away — and then they won't take it because your tax dollars have made the rich foreigners richer and they don't want their own markets depressed.

God gave you the earth to farm. Regardless of how small of a farmer you are or how big, if you are doing your own farming, you deserve a break.

You should be allowed tax free income and the big corporation and commercial absentee ownership farms should engage in a soil bank program without compensation for the idle acreage, while the smaller farmer should be allowed unlimited production. The definition of a small farmer to be calculated by the number of acres, geographical location, and products produced. All of the above conditions to match 100% parity. No fancy talk is necessary. Round up the experts and tell them to come up with a solution. At the same time, keep the government from getting its hooks into you. Keep the bureaucrats from running your lives. Don't sell yourself down the river to this group. Don't let them give you the same old story dressed up in a different suit.

The farmer and rancher in our 17th Congressional District cannot benefit by producing fewer crops and cattle to make up for the reduced cash position. This unfair situation must be solved and the economist and politician cannot tell you it's tough luck and you better get out of business if you cannot make the grade.

It is about time the farmer and rancher get rid of those politicians who give you nothing but conversation. We people in the 17th Congressional District must speak out for ourselves. We must safeguard our rights, liberties, and freedom. The ball must start rolling from somewhere. God willing, we can start right here in our own district.

## Abolishment of The Evil Progressive Income Tax

Open Letter to the Merchant, Working Man, Barber, Doctor, Lawyer, Professional Man

In my opening announcement, I proposed abolishment of the progressive income tax. I suggested its replacement with a flat rate on income plus a Federal sales tax. Not only will this form of tax encourage greater investment, greater risk, harder work, and larger incomes for all — it would increase tax collections by the government.

The replacement of the income tax is practical both economically and politically. Unless such a program is enacted in time, the progressive income tax will fulfill the prophecies of Karl Marx by destroying the free capitalist system.

The present tax law sets a top limit on what any man or woman can earn by work, by risk, by inspiration. So I propose to substitute a flat rate tax on incomes of from 10 to 15 or even 22½ percent. I suggest that the present system of exemptions be retained and increased to \$1,500 for each person. Thus a family of four with \$6,000 income would pay no income tax.

The Gallup Poll shows that the American people believe such a tax system would be fair for all income groups.

The history of the taxation proves that when you reduce taxes you end up with increased revenue. I will tell you more about this before July 28th.

This is because people try to earn more, risk more, work harder because they can keep more. But in the process of earning more, they pay bigger taxes even at lower rates.

This can be supplemented also with a Federal Sales Tax on everything sold at retail except food, rent, housing. This would make the low income group exempt from income taxes they paid by controlling their spending on fancy clothes, fur coats, perfumes, etc.

The wealthy tax payer would pay higher taxes even at the same rate because he will spend more. But he has the same choice as his low income neighbor. He can reduce his own taxes by buying a \$2,000 car instead of a \$10,000 car. If he wants to live up and spend his big income, he pays higher and higher taxes for what he buys.

All of the low income people will pay little or no taxes. Nobody will have to fill out the complex and annoying tax forms now used. No agent will come knocking on your door two or three years later with a demand for more tax with interest plus penalties.

This would end the system that causes Americans to refrain from working harder, earning more, and risking more because the more they earn, work, or risk, the higher their tax rate goes.

We also will have a right to do as we please with our money. Now we are slaves to an income tax law that can take 100% of our income if the government desires and give it all away to our foreign friends. I will have much more to tell you about this before July 28th.

water vapor collecting agent. These natural particles will not produce ice crystals only in extremely cold temperatures, therefore there is a range of temperature in the atmosphere where even though there is plenty of dust and salt particles available no ice crystals can form.

In this particular situation, the iodide crystals are supposed to do their job. They are effective at the temperatures where natural nuclei are not. Thus they induce

a greater percentage of precipitation to fall from the clouds.

It is generally understood that silver iodide alone will not produce precipitation. The silver iodide generator alone cannot make it rain. Precipitation cannot be produced from a cloud or storm unless it is going to rain or snow naturally.

Silver iodide crystals introduced properly into the clouds will only serve to increase what precipitation will fall naturally.

Ordinarily, the local generator will not affect the weather in the immediate locality of the machine since the crystals must rise up into

clouds and since they are carried along by the wind, it may be many miles from the generator before they finally become effective.

Before the project is started in any given region, a complete study is made of the area including terrain, historical weather, rainfall normals and patterns, streamflow and other items. This study, made by specialists in each of these fields, gives an idea of what to expect if an attempt at the cloud seeding operations is made.

It tells, on the average, how many and what types of storms will influence the area, what type of generators will be required in order to effectively seed almost every known of storm affecting the area along with other averages.

Tests show that each generator will cover an area from 30 to 45 degrees wide. Naturally, the further away from the generator the silver iodide crystals are carried, the less dense they will be until finally the crystals will be so far apart as to have very limited effect.

Basically, a heavy concentration of silver iodide is needed to produce best results.

Reason for the far spacing of the generators is that sufficient time has to be allowed for the crystals to rise to the altitude above the freezing level where they will become effective. If the temperature is below freezing on the ground then the silver iodide crystals will become effective very quickly and as soon as they reach the clouds. On the other hand, if the freezing level is near 10,000 feet, it may take the crystals one or two hours to reach the clouds.

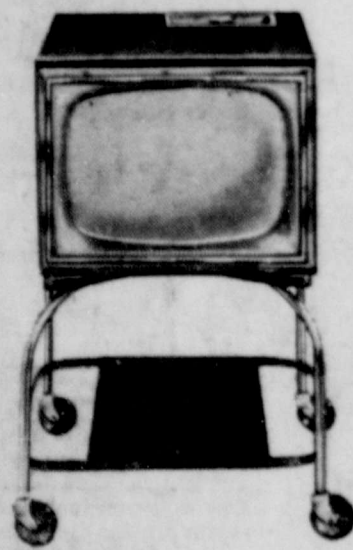
