Half Of Customers Pay Late Monthly

Discounts will be allowed on city water billings if they are paid by a certain time, the city commissioners decided by adopting a resolution to that affect recently,

The new policy, to become effective with the May 15 billing will penalize delinquent property owners who have not paid by the tenth of the preceding month. The bills do not actually leave city half until about the twenty-third of each month but even that leaves about 17 days until the penalty will be enforced.

Lester Crossley, city manager, said that about 50 percent of the metered water users straggle in after the tenth of each month and the procedure causes extra work for the city's office staff. He said that in most cases, the
