## GRAND JURY RETURNS FIVE INDICTMENTS

A navy recruit lost his rifle and when told he would have to pay for it protested.

## Pony League May Start With Meeting Friday

Organizational plans for an official Pony League, Little League's big brother, are to be discussed at an open meeting Friday night at the Chamber of Commerce, beginning at 7 p.m.

The move to organize a Pony League was originated by W. C. (Bill) Bradshaw. Under the present planning, two teams will be organized with a sponsor selected for each team.

Both units will play both home games and games with out-of-town groups. Cost to the sponsors for sponsoring one of the teams is not expected to be as great as the cost for sponsoring a Little League team.

The Pony League is composed of boys 13 and 14 years of age and continues where Little League draws its ineligible mark at 12 years of age.

Each year at least 20 boys graduate from Little League play, thus leaving two years of play before they could become members of the 15-year-old team organized here by Carl White or the American Legion team being sponsored by the Carl Barnes Post.

Anyone interested in the forming of a Pony League has been invited to attend the organization meeting Friday night. The governing body of the league will probably be organized at that time.

## Veterinarian Tells Of Bang's Disease Control Methods

Dr. Henderson stated that three years ago a law was passed by the State Legislature giving the dairymen of Texas five years to meet these requirements and have their herds clean of the disease. Ranger Junior College will open its 1956 football season with a game against Paris Junior College at Breckenridge, Tom Hestand, athletic director, announced today.

Ranger opened its season against the highly-rated Paris College last year and came out with an upset, 12-7 triumph.

From the ten game schedule set for this fall, only four of the ten Ranger Junior College contests will be played on home soil.

Following Paris, the Rangers travel to Tyler for an encounter with Tyler Junior College, a consistent power, then return home for a contest with McMurry "B" of Abilene.

After an open date, they host San Angelo and Tarleton on successive dates then travel to Abilene for a date with the Hardin-Simmons "B" team. Back on the road the next three consecutive Saturdays, the Rangers journey to Kilgore, Arlington and to Kerville to meet the Schreiner Institute Mountaineers.

## In Little League Play Possible 4-Way Tie Exists For Twinbill

Ranger Little League will finish its second week of play here tonight at Little League Park with two teams all knotted up for the loop lead and with the other two trailing only slightly.

Already off to a different start than that of the 1955 season when the Yankees ran away with the championship without losing a contest, all teams have been beaten at least once during the first round of play that has matched each of the four teams.

The Dodgers took it on the chin from the Indians who previously had not won a game Monday night, 10-4, while the Giants pulled into a second-place tie having lost only to the Indians.

The Yankees appeared headed for another good season in the year's first contest, when they slipped by the Giants, 8-7, but since the opening date have not won a contest.

Thus, the Giants and Dodgers are currently tied for the league lead with two victories and one defeat each while the Indians and Yankees are battling for survival with one win and two losses each.

And that is just the way things could shape up tonight in another twinbill starting at 6:30. With the Giants meeting the Yankees in the first contest, and the Dodgers and the Indians following in the finale, the league could rock along until Monday night with the same team standings. However, Little League baseball is entirely unpredictable, and there is every possibility that the championship race could be thrown into a four way tie.

Each team would have a season record of two wins and two losses if the Yankees dump the Giants and the Indians master the Dodgers.

## Severe Weather Conditions Bring Light Showers

The Ranger area measured .25 inches of moisture after a series of light showers, sometimes hardly more than a drizzle Wednesday morning, Wednesday afternoon and early this morning.

Eastland County bordering on a severe weather warning area Wednesday afternoon from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m., but none of the isolated tornadoes or damaging winds forecast developed in the immediate vicinity.

A series of short unstable lines moving across the state were responsible for the warning. The warning area stretched from Oklahoma City to Mineral Wells to Big Springs to Lubbock and back into Oklahoma City.

The severe weather warning was lifted at 8 p.m. however.

Some small tornadoes were reported in the Lubbock area, which evidently never hit the ground or left no damage in lightly populated areas.

Olden reported the heaviest rain locally, with a shower that deposited .60 inches of moisture Wednesday afternoon.

## Hanson Quits RJC For McMurry Bid

J. D. Hanson, glittering hurdler and sprinter for the Ranger Junior College track team and a grid letterman, said Wednesday that he would enroll at McMurry College at Abilene this September.

Ranger Junior College Athletic Director Tom Hestand had been counting heavily on Hanson to return to school and football in the fall where he would have been a solid choice for a starting position at halfback and a limited amount of quarterback chores.

Previously, Texas Tech had announced that Hanson would enroll at Lubbock at midyear but Hanson changed his decision Wednesday.

Hanson would have had to finish the fall semester at Ranger Junior College to be eligible at Tech, whereas he will be eligible at McMurry in September.

He is the son of Mrs. Alice E. Hanson of Eastland and lettered in football, basketball and track

for four years before entering Ranger JC in 1954.

The 21-year-old hurdler set new records of 23.3 and 14.7 in the low and high hurdles in the Pioneer Conference meet at Stephenville and was high individual with 14.4 points after finishing second in the 100-yard dash, fourth in the shot put, and turning a leg on the second-place 440-yard relay team.

Hanson's best times of the season were 14.4 in the high hurdles, 23.3 in the low and 9.6 in the 100-yard dash. He owns the only 100-yard dash victory in junior college competition over Robert Fischel of Arlington State, the Pioneer JC champion.

Hanson defeated Fischel in 9.7 in a four-way meet but Fischel won the Pioneer 100 in 9.7 after tying the conference record of 9.6 in the prelims.

The former Maverick shared the Class B state schoolboy low hurdles record of 19.4 with two others until Donald Beard of Thordale ran a 19.3 in the 1956 meet. (Continued on Page Four)

Not even for one million dollars.

### LEGAL NOTICE

**NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC**

Under the Laws, Rules and Regulations governing Lake Leon as passed and put into effect as of July 12, 1955, ARTICLE X, Section 9 has been revised as follows:

The doing of any act forbidden to be done by this ordinance, or the failure to do any act required by the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, which, in case of a lawful conviction thereof shall be punishable by the infliction of a fine of not more than \$200.00 plus cost of court. The fines collected shall be payable to the District and shall be credited to its recreational fund. In case of assessment of fine hereunder and the refusal or inability of the guilty persons to discharge and such fine together with cost of Court incurred by reason of the prosecution of the offense, the Court may order any such person committed to the County Jail to serve out any such penalty at the same rate of credit as would be done in case of correction of a misdemeanor under the Laws of the State of Texas. It, however, is provided, that no such imprisonment shall be ordered by the Court of Jurisdiction unless this District makes provision to reimburse the County for the confinement and maintenance of any such person at the same rate per day as would prevail in the case of confinement of a county prisoner, or upon any other basis of a compensation which may be agreed between the County Commissioner's Court and the Directors of this District. The penalty hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalty provided by the Laws of the State of Texas, or by the laws of the United States of America, and may be enforced or imposed under complaints filed by the District, its Peace Officers, or any other interested person, in an appropriate court of jurisdiction.

Any person, persons, firm or corporation found guilty of violation of any section or sections of this ordinance shall upon request of the District, surrender his permit or lease for suspension or cancellation by the District. In event of such suspension or cancellation by the District, any fees which may have been paid by the permittee for such permit, shall automatically be forfeited, and the District shall not, in any event, be liable for the return or refund of any part thereof.

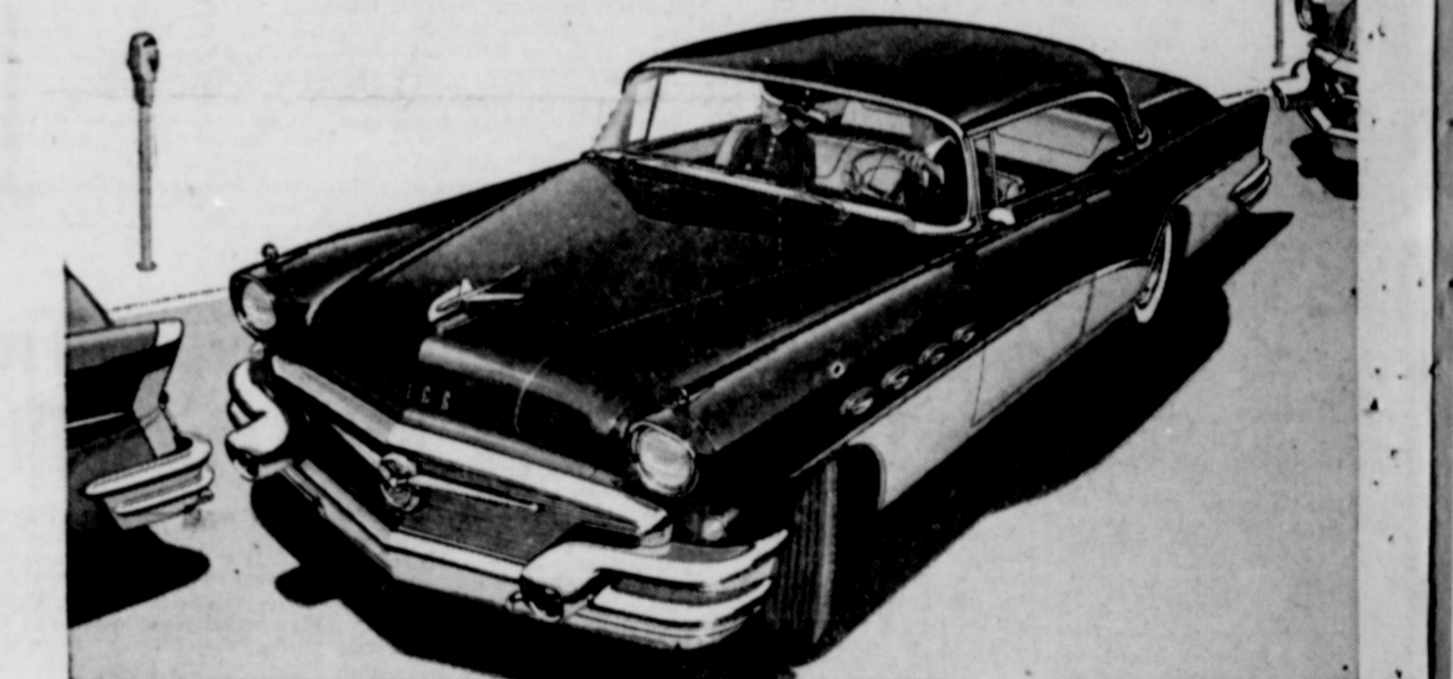

(Continued From Page One) of the disease by the deadline. PLAN A

Regulations governing the establishment of a certified Brucellosis-free herd:

A herd may be certified as brucellosis-free by conforming to either one of the following two procedures:

1. The owner shall present the entire herd for a periodic blood test at intervals of not more than 60 days, until all infection has been eliminated. The herd may be certified as brucellosis-free when it has passed three consecutive negative tests, with the first and the certifying (or third clean) test not less than 12 months apart.

2. It is provided that where there is no evidence of infection on the first test, a herd may be certified as brucellosis-free when it has passed one additional clean test, conducted not earlier than 6 months from the date of the first test.

a. All suspects must be removed and held separate and apart from the negative animals of the herd and presented for retest between 30-45 days after first showing suspicious, or more often at the discretion of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or the attending veterinarian.

b. The owner may, or may not, have his heifer calves officially vaccinated under this plan, but should he decide to have them officially vaccinated, they shall be officially vaccinated as follows:

1. They shall be vaccinated by a licensed accredited veterinarian with a brucella abortus vaccine that is approved by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas and the United States Agricultural Research Service (formerly called Bureau of Animal Industry).

2. All heifer calves shall be vaccinated between the ages of six and ten months.

3. Each officially vaccinated calf shall be identified by being tattooed in the ear (right ear preferred) with the digit or digits of the month, a "V" and last digit of the year. (For example: A calf vaccinated in April, 1954 would be tattooed 4-V-4).

Such other means of identification as may later be mutually recognized by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas and the United States Agricultural Research Service may be used. All official vaccinations must be reported within 48 hours by the attending veterinarian to the office of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission for approval.

c. The owner shall make herd additions only as follows and all official health certificates and official vaccination certificates of herd additions shall be forwarded immediately to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas for approval.

1. Cattle from certified brucellosis-free herds without test, if accompanied by official health certificate indicating status of herd of origin.

2. Officially vaccinated-animals

up to 30 months of age if accompanied by a certificate of official vaccination; if the animals are over 30 months of age, they shall be required to be negative to the blood test.

3. All other cattle over 6 months of age are required to be negative to a blood test within 30 days prior to movement; after movement they shall be placed apart from the regular herd on the owner's premises for 30 days and then shall be negative to a retest before admittance to the regular herd.

d. Following every blood test all animals designated as reactors shall be permanently branded on the left jaw with the letter "B" according to law and within 15 days the owner agrees to dispose of reactor animals by consigning them for immediate slaughter purposes only to a slaughtering establishment maintaining either federal or municipal veterinary post-mortem inspection. Immediately following the disposal of the reactor animals, the owner shall clean and disinfect that part of his premises that may be infected at his own expense and as the State Veterinarian or any other authorized representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas as may direct. A report of the disinfection giving date and type of disinfectant used shall be submitted to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas by the supervising veterinarian.

e. After the establishment of an accredited herd, the owner shall have his herd blood tested annually, at his own expense, by an accredited veterinarian. If annual tests are negative, the herd will be re-certified. Failure of the owner to comply with the provisions of this plan shall be deemed sufficient cause for cancellation of the agreement.

### PLAN B

Regulations governing test, official calfhood vaccination, and the temporary retention of reactors until they can be disposed of for slaughter without excessive loss to the owner under provisions of law—no indemnity:

This plan is designed for herds which show a rather high incidence of infection with some active abortions or herds that contain blood lines which the owner feels he cannot afford to lose.

1. The owner shall present the entire herd for initial test and identification.

a. All reactor animals must be permanently branded on the left jaw with the letter "B" according to law, and if possible, kept separate from all other animals that are negative to the brucellosis test.

b. Present all previously negative animals and official vaccines over 30 months of age for an annual test and permanent identification until the herd is transferred to Plan A and becomes eligible for certification.

c. When reactor or adult vaccinated animals, that are positive to the blood test, are disposed of, they shall be disposed of for immediate slaughter purposes only, to a slaughtering establishment maintaining either federal or municipal veterinary post-mortem inspection.

d. Known reactor animals, after being identified according to law, may be retained in a herd under this plan not more than three years from the date they react to the brucellosis test.

e. After the last reactor animals, have been removed, the owner shall clean and disinfect that part of his premises that may be infected, at his own expense and as the State Veterinarian or any other authorized representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission

may direct. A report of the disinfection giving the date and type of disinfectant used shall be submitted to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas by the supervising veterinarian.

2. The owner shall present all female calves, between six and ten months of age, for an official brucellosis vaccination. They shall be officially vaccinated as follows:

a. They shall be vaccinated by a licensed accredited veterinarian with a brucella abortus vaccine that is approved by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas and the United States Agricultural Research Service (formerly called Bureau of Animal Industry).

b. All heifer calves shall be vaccinated between the ages of six and ten months.

**BUILDING YOUR HOME**

When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details!

1. **Yoursite:** Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but find out—

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plat or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run

pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. **Zoning Ordinances:** For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

Unless the local governing body changes its zoning ordinance, no filling station, for instance, can go up next to you in a residential area. Neither could you turn your home into a store. In any case, you should find out what your neighborhood zoning rules are.

3. **Building Codes:** Be certain that the plans and construction will meet the requirements of the local building code as to size, location and structure. Municipal ordinances usually impose strict standards for the building, the plumbing and the electrical wiring. In many cases only licensed building tradesmen are permitted to make the installations.

4. **Financing:** Financing contracts protect both you and the lender. Unless you pay cash, you will use credit to pay for your house, most likely a deed of trust or a land contract. Your installments often include principal, interest, insurance and taxes. Under a land contract the lender holds title to your house until you pay for it. If you fall behind, the holder can take the house back. With

a deed of trust, the lender has a lien which he can foreclose if you default. You may get some of your money back on the principal; but you may also have to make up any loss the lender makes in re-selling the house.

Well worked-out contracts can help make your dream house come true. A construction contract or a so-called "earnest-money" agreement or receipt is no job for an amateur. Too many legal details are involved. Your lawyer is trained by education and experience to protect your best interests in contracting and closing real estate deals.

You know what you want. You should be careful to get what you want through careful planning and a properly prepared and executed contract.
