Back in 1903 a rather ridiculous looking machine was just sputtering into being. Last year that machine—envolving from the ungainly horseless carriage into the sleek and wwerful modern automobile-claimed 407 lives during the Fourth of July holiday.

Thus the net gain in our efforts to avoid holiday self-

destruction seems to be about zero. Yet there is a lesson to be learned here.

Fireworks deaths on the Fourth have been almost eliminated because thinking persons revolted at such senseless killing, and state by state the sale and use of dangerous fireworks were prohibited.

No one, of course, is advocating that the sale of use of automebiles be banned. But we strongly urge the outlaw ing of their misuse. Most people want to use their cars safely. But in every

society there is always a minority of reckless and irresponsible drivers who turn a deaf ear to all appeals for prudent and commonsense behavior. It is for this group that the National Safety Council and
