WHAT'S... COOKING?

Before this paper comes out again, it is going to be time for you to vote. We don't care, particularly, which way you vote, and it wouldn't make much difference if we did, but we want to join the others in urging that you DO vote. That is why we have elections—to find out what you think about things. And nobody can do a very good job finding out if you stay at home or go fishing. Everybody already knows who they are going to support for president, so there is no use arguing about that. We might mention the Amendments, however, which you are also going to have to vote on. You can't go wrong by supporting every last one of them. It might be possible to pick a flaw with one or two of them here and there, but by and large the Amendments all call for a few changes that need to be made, and they should all pass. The Amendment which effects every boy and girl in Texas, and thus every home in Texas, is the 4th Amendment, which concerns our school teachers. It would help to provide a better retirement program for them and would help to attract more teachers to the profession, and if you do not vote for anything or anybody else Tuesday, go to town and vote FOR this 4th Amendment!

Ordinarily we do not like snap green beans, but even the snap beans were good on that turkey dinner the women of the Martha Dorcas Clats of the First Methodist Church served to the 1920 Club Banqueters Thursday night. The turkey and dressing were out of this world. The coffee was something ultra special. The program was first class from beginning to end. Miss Vivian Simmons, looking like something they write poems about (which reminds us that we now have a purpose in life) sang a couple of beautiful solos. Fred Baumgardner and Miss Jackie Cornelison, a fine artist student from Breckenridge, played beautiful dinner music on the organ, and the speaker was outstanding. To sum it up in the words of the Rev. Ralph Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church, "I thought the whole thing was perfect."

The tragedy over at Baird this past week which resulted in the young high school quarterback being shot and killed by a man whose service station had been robbed four nights in a row by prowling teen-agers is indeed sad. Here one young life is lost and another life is ruined because someone made a mistake. The man who did the shooting is a young man, himself, only 25 years old. We do not suppose there is enough money on earth to have caused him to pull the trigger if he had known what the results would be. We wonder how many times the dead boy's parents wished they had kept him at home that night. We wonder how many times the boy's companions wished they had been in the safe shelter of their homes rather than where they were. But it is too late now. Polls In Ranger To Open 8 a.m. Close at 7 p.m.

Citizens of Ranger having a poll tax or an exemption will vote in their usual place Tuesday with the residents of Precinct No. 3 voting at the City Hall, and residents of Precinct No. 4 voting at Young School. The polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Albert Koenig, Ranger election head for this year, has handed the Times a letter from the State Democratic Executive Committee of Texas, signed by Jim Lindsey, chairman, pointing out the great importance of Democrats going to the polls and voting for the official nominees of the Democratic Party.

The letter stated: "It is important to get out as large a vote as possible on general election day for the entire Democratic ticket, especially for our Party's candidate for Governor. For every 25 Democrats who vote for another Party's nominee or for a write-in candidate or who simply fail to vote for our Democratic nominee for Governor, your precinct will lose one vote in your next county convention, and your county will lose proportionately in the next State Convention. Article 13.24 of the Texas Election Code provides that the county convention shall be composed of one delegate from each precinct in such county, for each 25 votes cast for the party's candidate for Governor in such precinct as the last preceding general election... which county convention shall elect one delegate to the State Convention for each three hundred votes cast for the party's nominee for Governor at the last preceding general election." Thus, Koenig points out, it is not only important for everyone to vote in order to express their wishes in regard to the various candidates, but it is important to vote in order to keep up the voting strength of each precinct at the next county conventions, and therefore the next state conventions.

In case there is some confusion on how to vote "FOR" one of the constitutional amendments, it is pointed out that each amendment, from one to eight, will have two choices underneath, one "FOR" the other "AGAINST." If you wish to vote "FOR" an amendment, scratch out the "FOR" unscratched and untouched. The paragraph that is not scratched out is the one that will be counted.

RJC Regents Go To Austin

Dr. Price Ashton went to Austin Saturday, and was to be joined there Sunday by Morris Newnam, Pete Brasler, Joe Nussle and Joe Dennis, all members of the Board of Regents of Ranger Junior College, who are working in the interest of pending legislation that would increase by 29.43 percent the amount of money now available from the state for support of the junior schools. The new legislation, which is said to have an excellent chance of passing by the next legislature would allow \$300 annually for the first 350 students and \$250 annually for the next 350 students. It would increase RJC's allotment from approximately \$111,500 now, to about \$129,500 for the same amount of students. Ranger Junior College now has slightly more than 600 students and ranks among the top 10 in enrollment in the state. Ranger is the smallest town in Texas supporting a junior college.

Jail Clean As Hound's Tooth

Ranger's city jail was as clean as a hound's tooth Saturday morning with nary a guest, as nothing at all happened from midnight Friday up until press time today. Police Chief Pounds said as long as everybody behaved his office was perfectly willing to sit back and roast by the fire.

Ranger Band Features Fast Formations

The Ranger High School Band, performing between halves at the Friday night football game between Ranger and Ballinger, featured some fast-changing formations that had the fans cheering as they pulled a "Pre-Election" stunt that was cleverly staged. The band went into formations honoring both presidential candidates and both vice-presidential candidates, playing appropriate music for each, and wound up by making a prediction on the election. The prediction was a huge question mark, while the musicians played "Whatever Will Be, Will Be." The band went into six difficult formations, making one quick change right after another, and the drill which might have been expected to take up the whole half-time, lasted only two and one-half minutes. Under direction of Dan Whitaker, the band is concentrating on precision drills and fast formations this year in all their stunts.

College Returns \$42 For Every \$1.00

Dr. Price Ashton, speaking before the Ranger Lions Club Thursday, told members of that organization that Ranger Junior College returned \$42.00 to Ranger for every \$1.00 the city put up to support the school. Speaking on the rapid progress of the college during the past three years, Dr. Ashton said there was an enrollment of 600 students today compared to 189 students three years ago, and that Ranger was the smallest town in the State of Texas to be able to boast of having a Junior College. He said Ranger Junior College now ranks among the top 10 out of the 31 Junior Colleges in the state, and he compared its enrollment of 600 students to the average of from 130 to 250 students in most of the other schools. Dr. Ashton said this past year the college received \$197,000 from the state to be used in its operation, and other income for the college increased its total money received to about \$207,500, most of which was spent right here in Ranger. Although Dr. Ashton did not make the comparison, it is public knowledge that taxes paid by the people of Ranger to the college amounted to about \$5,000. Comparing this figure to the \$207,500 taken in and spent by the college, means a return to this community of about \$42 to \$1.00. Dr. Ashton said legislation was now under way at Austin that will make Ranger Junior College a permanent institution from now on, and he said it had one of the brightest futures of any school in the state. The new Community Cafeteria is nearing completion on the campus, and Dr. Ashton said all of the interior work would be finished within a week. Laying the outside brick will not take very long to complete the building. It will provide one large hall for large community banquets as well as providing facilities for students. It will be equipped with all the newest cafeteria furnishings, and will have about 4,000 feet of floor space.

Omar Burleson To Speak Here

Omar Burleson of Anson, congressman from this district, will speak on Main Street in front of the Gholson Hotel at 4:30 Monday afternoon, it is announced. Burleson will be traveling in a bus load of Democrats from the Abilene area who are out working on behalf of all the Democratic candidates in the election next Tuesday. Everyone is invited to make note of the time and arrange to hear Burleson.

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Republican Have 50-50 Chance In Co.

Eastland County goes to the polls Tuesday to do its part in electing a president, among other things, and the best opinion available from the "political experts" is that it is an even 50-50 toss-up between Democrats and Republicans on which man will get in. The county, like the state, voted for Dwight Eisenhower four years ago, and might do it again, but favoritism for the two candidates has seen-sawed back and forth all summer until it is a difficult proposition today to tell just where most of the support lies. In 1952 county voters gave Eisenhower a margin of 4518 votes to 3386 for Adlai E. Stevenson, his Democratic opponent. The President's immense personal popularity has lessened little if at all in this county, but some observers say that the county, with a large farm vote, may shift back into the traditional Democratic column because of dissatisfaction with the Republican farm program. Four years ago Eisenhower carried two of the larger cities in Eastland County, but Stevenson came out on top in Ranger. Eastland went for Eisenhower by a margin of 1073 to 619; Cisco voted 1279 to 728 for the Republican candidate, and Ranger cast their margin for Stevenson, 831 to 678.

Threat of War

What effect the threat of war that now hangs over the world will have on the election is unforeseeable. The Republicans and Texas Democrats for Eisenhower have used "Peace and Prosperity" as their slogan throughout the campaign, and in Eastland county have carried on an active crusade, including newspaper, radio, billboard and direct mail advertising. Democrats, on the other hand, have done little in behalf of their candidate in this county. One once before 1952 had the county voted Republican. That was when Herbert Hoover was elected president. Eastland voters who live west of Daugherty will vote at City (Continued on Page Four)

The boys in the backfield did everything they were called upon to do, rushing for 390 yards and passing for 70 more for the prodigious total of 460 yards, but it was the left-half line that stole the show. Sued's rugged performers as Yarborough, Cantrell, Bagwell, Jowers, Cruise, Bradford, Hagaman and others held the Bearcats to no first downs at all and a lousy 28 yards rushing in the first half, and to a net total of 21 yards rushing and 12 yards passing in the last half. All night long the line opened up holes in the Ballinger forward wall big enough to drive a tank through, and they spent almost as much time in Ballinger's backfield as the Bearcats themselves. Paul Hinds was his usual brilliant self in running the Ranger show, all except on one play, and if we had had a psychiatrist and a coach handy we would have had time out on the field and had his head examined. With the backfield able to pick up anywhere from 5 to 10 yards every time they carried the ball, the Bulldogs were down on the 19 with fourth down and two to go. Hinds decided to pass and lost the ball. We haven't checked on it, but Hinds said he by now is the highest scorer in the loop in district play. He chalked up 16 points of his own against the Bearcats, and had 30 points of his own in the Cisco game. The Bearcats lone touchdown came early in the third quarter when Ranger fumbled the kickoff at the beginning of the second half. They took over on their own completed pass for 12 yards they picked up their only 3 first downs and a touchdown. Halfback Rodney Flanagan took the ball over, and fullback Jerry Candler ran it across for the extra point. Ranger's first touchdown was the result of a 90-yard drive that started on their own 10 following a Bearcat punt. Wharton, Basham and Wulford took turns running the ball up to the 31, at which point Hinds stepped back as cool as a polar bear on ice and heaved a pass to Cantrell that was good for 42 yards to the Bearcat 27. Wharton drove through the line for 12 and then went around left end for 15 and a score. Hinds kicked the first of his game total of four extra points. Soon after the start of the second period David Wharton broke loose for a 60-yard touchdown run that didn't count because the man in the striped shirt brought the ball back and penalized the Bulldogs for 5 yards offside, but the Bulldogs never lost possession of the ball until they had scored again with Hinds going off tackle from the 18, and kicking the extra point, making the score 14-0. The Bulldogs kicked off after this one and the Bearcats ran (Continued on Page Four)
