

First 10 Months **Driest In History** In Ranger Area

ene area have been the driest of any similar period since the Abine Weather Bureau started keepng records for this area back in 1885, which was 71 years ago.

According to the Weather Bureau, it is even drier now than it was back in 1917, the second friest year. At the end of October of 1917 the rainfall totaled 10.68 is year the rainfall total was only 3.34 inches. Total normal rainfall for the first 10 months of a year for this area is supposed to be 20.16 inches, so we're 11.82 inches, most a foot, short.

Only about 1.91 inches of rain ell in the Ranger area last month ompared to a normal of 2.57 inches, and the largest amount, about .82 of an inch, didn't fall
