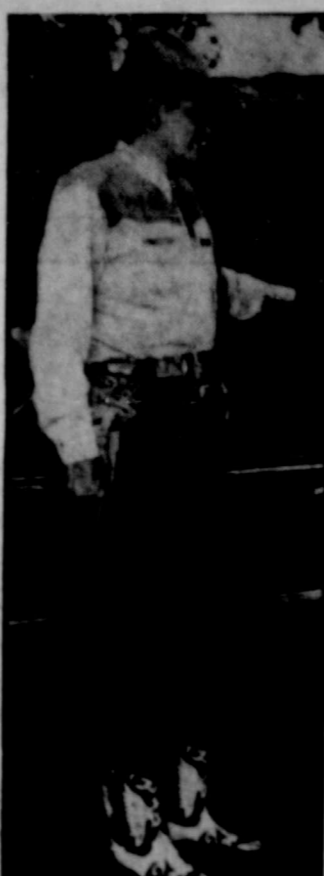

Eastland County Helps Push U.S. Turkey Supply

One and three-quarter turkeys for every family in the United States—that is what the record 1956 crop of over 76 million birds amount to, and Eastland County will supply a lot of those birds.

In 1956, the U.S. produced slightly more than one turkey—44 million—for each U.S. family. Back in 1936, only 17 million turkeys were produced, a little more than one-half a bird for each family, the bureau says.

Thus, a report at Northwestern Life Insurance Co. points out, we are producing this year approximately four times as many turkeys as we raised a quarter of a century ago. Several factors have contributed to this enormous increase; new varieties which could be marketed much younger; reduction in labor required and in bird mortality, through new scientific methods, which has made year around marketing possible; attractive packaging and display in modern food stores; and in the case of the 1956 spurt in production, a favorable feed situation and the memory of good profits on the 45-million-bird crop of 1955. Today's turkey, as sold dressed in food shops, averages about 12½ pounds.

How is it that this native American bird, which has sometimes been proposed as the United States national emblem in place of the eagle, ever happened to be named "turkey"? Because, says the report, it was at first confused with the guinea-fowl, which in those days was a delicacy imported into Europe by way of Turkey and was therefore dubbed with the name of that country.

Good Weekend To See Trees In Autumn Color

Rangerites with time on their hands this weekend may well take a drive through the country-side if they want to get a good look at all the trees in their autumn colors.

Hard, killing frost of the past few days has put a finishing touch on all the leaves but they are not dead enough yet to have fallen to the ground. Brilliant splashes of color can be seen on all farm roads out of Ranger, and especially in areas around Lake Leon.

growers have to contend with diseases that pester their flocks. Like taxes, diseases in flocks are things that are always with us. So, the research department and virus laboratories of Texas A & M have decided to hold four schools, in widely separated parts of the state, showing growers how to do something about these diseases.

The people we have mentioned have set out to get one of these schools for Ranger and a better place could not be found. Eastland County is soon going to be the No. 1 County in Texas in the turkey industry. It is already pushing for the leadership right now, and the No. 1 spot is as sure to come as night follows day. So when they locate a school in Ranger that pertains to turkeys, they are locating it right in the big middle of the turkey industry. It is said that growers and processors a n d county agents and feed dealers from 15 counties will be here.

The turkey industry is going to be a great thing for this area. You can rest assured that where the birds ARE, that is where everything else connected with the industry is going to locate. We look for all kinds of processing plants to locate here. Heavens, it saves freight and hauling of live birds! Process 'em where they are. This area will also be a great marketing center because buyers will come here. Why run all over the country trying to buy turkeys when you can get all you need at one place? All kinds of allied industries, such as feeds and supplies, will find business good here, just on account of turkeys.

The turkey industry is one thing we can latch on to and push because we've already got that. It is here now, and getting bigger.

You don't have to be a millionaire to get in the turkey business. In fact, you can get financial help to start. And you don't have to own but a very small piece of land. And there is not much chance of the market becoming saturated, either, not with freezing and processing and packing and merchandising what it is today, and with people eating turkey the year round instead of on Thanksgiving and Christmas. Talk about talking turkey. That's one thing Ranger needs to do, literally.

Lot of Fixing Needed for Holiday Meals

A lot of fixing is required for the traditional Thanksgiving and Christmas menus of turkey and all the trimmings. But its fun and preparation time is reduced if you study your holiday season cooking project in advance. How much to buy? It takes from 1-2 to 3-4 pound of ready-to-cook weight turkey per person. This allows for second servings and leftovers. Unfrozen ready-to-cook turkeys should be cleaned thoroughly and pin feathers removed with tweezers or paring knife. Feel inside the bird along ribs and remove any bits of lung. Cut out the oil sac above the tail. Wash the turkey inside and out under cold running water. Place in gas refrigerator at once. Keep in constant refrigeration and use within 2 days of purchase.

A frozen ready-to-serve turkey should be thawed in original wrappings in refrigerator 2 or 3 days, or thaw the unwrapped turkey in a pan set under cold running water 4 to 6 hours. A wrapped frozen turkey may be stored in the refrigerator one day, then thawing completed under cold running water. Once the turkey is thawed, proceed as for unfrozen turkey.

Cook giblets (liver, gizzard, heart) and neck as soon as possible in salted water to cover. Simmer over low gas flame in a covered pan 2 to 3 hours, or until the liver will be tender in about 20 minutes and should be removed from the pan. Chop the cooked giblets. Remove and chop the meat from the neck. Stuff chopped meat and stock in separate covered containers in refrigerator.

Prepare dressing immediately before stuffing and roasting the turkey. To save time the day of roasting the bird, the dry ingredients may be combined and stored in advance at room temperature and the liquid ingredients may be combined and stored in the re-

frigerator. To stuff the turkey, allow approximately 1 cup dressing per pound of ready-to-cook turkey. Allow the same amount of dressing for a turkey weighing more than 20 pounds as for 20 pound weight, for the body cavities of large birds are approximately the same size. Extra dressing may be baked separately.

Rub inside the turkey with salt. Tuck wing tips under back. Fill the neck and body cavities lightly with dressing for it expands during cooking. Over-packing gives a compact, undesirable dressing and may cause the turkey to break or tear apart. To close the neck cavity, skewer the skin in place in back of bird. To close the body cavity, place several short skewers across it then lace around them with heavy twine or cord. Tie drumsticks to tail.

It is important to stuff the turkey just before roasting. Stuffing and freezing or storing in the refrigerator before roasting is not recommended. Preparing the dressing in advance and freezing the turkey and dressing separately is not recommended. The dressing will become soggy.

The turkey, no matter what size, should be cooked in a pre-heated oven at a temperature of 325 degrees F. Cooking time depends on size of the bird. If the turkey is roasted unstuffed, cooking time should be reduced approximately 5 minutes per pound. Doneness of meat may be judged by whether the drumstick can be moved up and down easily and whether the thigh meat or thickest part of the drumstick feels soft when pressed with the fingers.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

"YOUR HONOR, I OBJECT."

Second guessers and Monday morning quarterbacks always have brilliant hindsight. How well they pinpoint the boobies the coach made last week!

So it is with the trial in a law suit. After the jury brings in the verdict people can tell you how your lawyer should have conducted the trial.

But as with football, it's somewhat harder to look forward into the swirl of maneuvers and predict in advance how a particular move will make out. The future holds many surprises.

Our system of justice rests up on the "adversary" theory of a trial where both sides fight for real stakes in dead earnest.

Our U.S. Supreme Court, for example, will not give an "advisory" opinion to anybody — as to whether a proposed law would be constitutional. The court decides that point only in a real law suit with real people fighting for real stakes.

Our courts have an aversion to deciding a point of fact or law where each side does not present its views on the merits with skill, vigor, and good faith. They know how plausible one side can sound until the adversary has his inning.

So, during a trial the pressure is on. Each side tries to present the facts favorable to its cause and prevent the other side from presenting matters which are not properly admissible under the rules of evidence.

To make matters worse, unless your lawyer acts at once, say, when the other side offers a piece of testimony, he loses the right to get the court to strike it from the record at a later time.

Fully to protect you, your lawyer must plan your case so that if things go against you, he can take your case "on the record" to a higher court if he feels that the trial court has erred. But alas,

often he cannot claim the error unless he made a point of it at the proper instant during the trial.

If you ever sat on a jury, you may have wondered why some lawyer always objected to every little thing. He ought to have known, you think, that he was making the jury angry with him.

Well, this is why: If he had not, for example, moved to "quash the indictment," or objected to certain evidence, the higher court might not let him raise the point on appeal.

So even if he antagonized everybody in the court, the lawyer by the rules of our system of justice, still had the duty of "protect-

ing the record" so that if need be he could also protect his client in the higher courts.

At every stage of a lawsuit, your lawyer must remember to make points against the possible day that a panel of thoughtful appellate justices will sit down calmly to review what was done in the excitement of a trial.

Hints On Use Of Range Broiler

The broiler of your range affords an adventure in cooking that saves time while producing a delectable meal. All you need to add is bread, a salad and dessert and the meal is complete and ready to serve. In broiling, as in all meat cooking, low temperature methods are recommended since experiments prove they give less shrinkage and a more tender product. Broiling may be done by either of two methods—full-flame broiling or low-flame broiling. Both provide moderately low temperature broiling and render ideal products. Low-flame broiling takes a longer broiling time, but permits use of oven and broiler at the same time.

Preheat broiler compartment 5 minutes with heat control at "B" position. Leave control at this position for complete broiling period.

Low-flame broiling: Preheat broiler compartment 5 minutes. If using oven at same time, set heat control at temperature required for oven cooking. If oven is not in use, set heat control at 350 degrees F.

There's an easy way to clean broiler pans, too. To avoid unnecessary cleaning, preheat the broiler compartment, but do not preheat the broiler pan, for placing cold food on hot metal causes sticking. When broiling is finished, remove food and drain all drippings from the pan. Sprinkle the grid and pan generously with soap or detergent and cover with a wet cloth or wet paper towels. Let them stand while the meal is served, then remove the cloth or towels and wash the grid and pan. It is as easy as washing a dish.
