Hot Chicken And Cool Soup For Supper



A cool soup drink teams up with skillet barbecued chicken for a savory and thrifty warm-weather meal. Round out the menu with rice, spinach, crisp salad, fresh fruit and cookies. The chicken is a plump tender broiler-fryer done to a rich brown in a little over a half hour. This young roasty chicken is one of the best buys for your food dollar the year around. Real cool is this soup beverage, whipped up in a trifle. Combine 2 cans (10 1/2 oz. each) condensed cream of celery soup, well chilled, with 2 soup cans of ice cold milk. Shake, mix or blend and pour into four tall glasses. YIELD: 4 generous servings.

Skillet Barbecued Chicken 1 broiler-fryer chicken cut in pieces 3 tablespoons molasses 1/4 cup prepared mustard 2 tablespoons salt 1 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup water 1/2 cup vinegar

Wash and dry chicken. Combine molasses, prepared mustard, salt and pepper. Add water, vinegar and oil; blend well. Dip chicken into sauce. Cook in heavy skillet over medium heat, brushing with additional sauce until tender, about 30 to 45 minutes. YIELD: 4 servings.
