Hundreds Are Expected at Lake On Fourth

ROAMING THRU RANGER WITH RON...

Tuesday—I turned over the calendar to find it the First of July. This set me to thinking (which is a difficult process) about what the month holds for Ranger, for the county, the state and the nation.

So—I dusted off my crystal ball and gazed into the future. Here is what I came up with...

This will be the hottest July on record in Eastland County, as temperatures soar and continue to soar. Sunbathers and sunburners will run rampant over the nation, due to the heat wave.

RANGER will not find a ski jump at Lake Leon on the Fourth, nor will they find one anytime in the immediate future. My crystal ball may be wrong, but it says one will not be built this summer.

ELECTION time draws around, here, on July 26. Altho' I refuse to predict the winners, the future holds an exciting election in the county—and some of the races will be close!

ALASKA will be the 49th state by the time you read this. If it isn't—I'll throw away my crystal ball and never make another prediction.

TEXANS will grow long and loud about being the second largest state in the union, and there will be plenty of letters of protest. But—come December—they will be up to the idea.

The GIANTS will take the Little League title in Ranger at the end of the season, which comes this month. Runners-up will be the INDIANS. And I predict—the YANKEES will win one or two more games this season.

RANGERS will become transposed into a top-notch ball team, giving the other Teen-Age Leagues tough competition. But they will not come out on top—due to a late start of fine ball-playing.

This month will see three houses in Ranger under construction, with perhaps one completed. A good number of remodeling jobs will also get underway.

Business will boom next Monday, on Dollar Day, as Ranger celebrates its biggest event—to date.

FOURTH OF JULY will see at least two major collisions in the county, but I refuse to predict the seriousness of the crashes.

RANGER FISHERMEN will walk away with most of the prizes at Lake Leon this Friday, and Ranger skiers will make a good showing in the skiing contest. I predict at least 10 fallen skiers and one scheduled skier who will fail to appear.

TEEN TOWN dancers will be the "hit" at the "Down Beat" program in Fort Worth. They will come back with all sorts of honors.

The JIMMY ARRENDALE HOSPITAL FUND DRIVE will be completed this month, with most of the proceeds coming in on Jimmy Arrendale Day, July 13.

Going out on a limb—I predict one major tornado will strike in Eastland County this month. It will do relatively little damage, however.

In the meantime—things will go along as normal. Farmers will bring in their grain, baseball will continue to attract crowds, fishermen will make some remarkable catches, and Ranger citizens will continue demonstrating their friendly spirit.

Cox Puts Foot Down, SCS Leaves C'house

Members of the Soil Conservation Unit moved out of the courthouse here this week and an investigation by a reporter brought to light an unannounced show-down meeting held Monday by the County Commissioners Court. The called meeting resulted in the Court taking no action on the request by the Soil Conservation Service for new and larger office space. Commissioners previously had announced that the action would take place at the regularly scheduled meeting next Monday.

Talking to participants in the three-ring affair, this reporter found out that County Treasurer Richard Cox put his foot down when asked by the Court to move out of his office on the second floor of the courthouse. Cox was asked to take up new office space on the third floor in a room behind the old 88th District Courtroom.

Cox told members of the Court they would have to take their action into the 91st District Court if they wanted him to vacate the office now being used.

The County Treasurer, who is seeking the Democratic nomination for District Clerk in the July primary, told the Court it would take a mandamus to get him out of the office.

County Attorney Earl Conner Jr. told commissioners they had the power to move Cox if they

could find "suitable" office space in the courthouse. Cox said the office offered him wasn't "suitable" at all.

Apparently all members of the Commissioners Court except J. B. (Tip) Arthur favored moving Cox into a new office and making the space he now has available for the Soil Conservation Unit. Arthur let it be known he was on Cox's side in the matter.

The Soil Conservation Unit wanted the office so that it could remain close to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office. The two Federal agencies work closely together, one being the field worker and the other the money lender.

The SCS was forced to move out of the ASC office because of lack of space. They moved across the street from the courthouse to the second floor of the Petroleum Building.

One commissioner said he didn't like the idea of one office holder telling the entire commissioners court what it should do.

None of the commissioners seemed willing to take the matter into court, however.

Water Carnival Set Friday

A water carnival, jointly sponsored by the Eastland and Ranger chambers of commerce, is expected to attract hundreds of Fourth of July fun seekers to Lake Leon Thursday and Friday.

All preparations for a fishing rodeo, skiing contests and boat parade have been completed for event, the first ever held at the large lake, halfway between the two Eastland County cities.

Hundreds of fishermen—and women and children, too—are expected to wet hooks in efforts to collect cash prizes being offered, and several dozen amateur skiers are due to compete for the ready cash.

Fishing will begin at 12:01 a.m. Friday. Weighing in of the fish will get underway at 11 a.m. and continue until 4 p.m. Two judges from Eastland and two from Ranger will be in charge.

Prizes of \$10 will go to the adults catching the biggest catfish, the largest bass, biggest crappie and largest number of fish on a string. Children under 15 years of age will win \$5 in each of the categories.

Two \$15 prizes will be awarded to the best trick skier and to the best all-around skier. Two prizes of \$10 each will go to the best man and best woman performers on two ski. Best single-ski exhibitions will win \$10 each for the man and woman judged the best.

In addition, the oldest and youngest skiers present will also win prizes of \$10. A special division for 14-year-olds and younger will have a \$10 prize and a \$5 prize for best all-around skiers.

Judges for the skiing contests will be Mr. and Mrs. J. Aston, owners of the Aston Ski Club of

Fort Worth. They will bring one or two outstanding professional skiers to give exhibitions for the event. The Fort Worth skiers will not compete in the regular contests, however.

Skiers wanting to participate in the contests can register free at both the Eastland and Ranger chambers of commerce offices. Registrations will also be accepted at the lake on the Fourth.

A ski course of 315 yards has been set up at the lake. It is marked with yellow innertubes for slalom contestants. A time limit of three minutes has been set for ski entries.

Committee members announced that they would furnish a 75 foot rope for ski contestants. They also said all skiers are expected to be ready to perform before their numbers are called over the public address system.

One of the outstanding events of the day will be the boat parade. Lake Leon Boat Club members are in charge of the parade and they have invited all boat owners to join in the parade.

Boat owners are to have their boats at the new Staff Bridge at 10:30 Friday morning. The boats will then line up and pass in review at the dam beginning at 11 a.m.

The Ranger Volunteer Fire Department will furnish the public address system, and master of ceremonies for the day will be David Fry of Eastland.

There will be no charge for fishing at the lake all day Friday. The Eastland County Water Supply District Board of Directors has announced that fishing permits

Bank Deposits Increase During Past Year Here

Deposits at Ranger's banks are up over this same time last year, and show an increase in the last few months.

Commercial State Bank deposits have increased from \$2,159,721.03 as of June 23 of this year. This figure represents an increase of \$171,159 over last year.

Total liabilities and resources at the bank total \$2,615,939.69—each — as compared with \$1,597,211.03 in 1957. Loans and discounts in June totaled \$841,669

as compared with \$751,278.81 in 1957.

Total assets and liabilities at the First Federal Savings & Loan Association are \$878,984.78 each, as of June 30 an increase of \$71,899 over last year. One year ago, this figure stood at \$806,985.33.

Six months ago, assets totaled \$864,232.15 (Dec. 31, 1957)—a figure \$14,762 less than present totals.

Savings accounts total \$792,158.18, and general reserves total \$62,148.54.

Liabilities at the Commercial State Bank include \$50,000 in capital stock, with a \$50,000 surplus. Reserves total \$52,291.50, an increase of \$12,452 over last year.

Resources include loans and discounts totaling \$841,699, stocks and bonds in the amount of \$1,142,692, and cash and exchange. These figures have increased during the past year.

WFAA TO AIR EASTLAND PEANUT MEET

Burleson and White To Address Growers

Cong. Omar Burleson and State Agriculture Commissioner John White have agreed to address members of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association when they hold their annual meeting in Eastland Wednesday, July 2.

The two will join Sen. Ralph Yarborough on the speakers stand for the occasion. Hundreds of members of the Association and others who are interested, are expected to attend the one-day meeting.

Sen. Yarborough, junior United States senator from Texas, will be the principal speaker at the meeting. The meeting, beginning at

10 a.m. will be held in the air-conditioned Majestic Theatre where adequate and comfortable seating will be available.

The Senator will speak on the current farm situation in Congress. His talk will be of special interest to farmers and to businessmen who serve farming areas. Yarborough's address will be open to the general public and everyone is cordially invited to attend, a spokesman said.

Congressman Burleson, U. S.

Representative of Texas' 17th District, is expected to attend and will talk on farm legislation originating in the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives.

Commissioner White will address the group during the luncheon.

The Murray Cox Farm Program, heard daily over Station WFAA, Dallas, will originate from the meeting site at Eastland. The program will feature the current peanut out-look.

There will be a brief business session following the principal addresses. There will be reports on work done by the Association during the year.

Super Highway 20 Easements Bought

The State of Texas Wednesday acquired the first right-of-way for the new Super Highway 20 in Eastland County.

This marked the first time the State has purchased right-of-way in Eastland County.

Right of way controlled access highway easements were filed in the County Clerk's office Wednesday afternoon by State agents.

The State has acquired a little over three miles of 100 yard right-of-way, a check of the Clerk's records revealed.

The three mile stretch of right-of-way was secured from a number of landowners in the northeast part of the county. Records show the right-of-way secured runs from the Eastland-Erath County line west to just below Ranger Hill. That is the only section of Highway 80 which is not new four lanes.

Highway 80 in that section has been the county's death trap this year. Seven persons died in one accident at Palo Pinto Creek bridge, and two others were killed near the Strawn intersection. The new route will not follow the present route exactly. At places it will be on the north side of Highway 80 and at others on the south side. The new course will straighten out the three mile stretch.

Oscar Cummings Dies Monday

Oscar M. Cummings, 80, a Ranger resident since 1934, died at 10:30 p.m. Monday. Funeral services were held in Killbuckworth Chapel Wednesday at 3 p.m. with the Rev. K. C. Edmond, pastor of the Eastside Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial was in Bulluck Cemetery. Born April 25, 1878, in Williamson County, Mr. Cummings was a member of the Baptist Church.

He is survived by his wife; two sisters, Mrs. Mittie Sawyer of Killbuck, and Mrs. Rosa May of Killbuck; and several nephews and nieces.

The Women's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church met Monday, June 30, at 3:30 p.m.

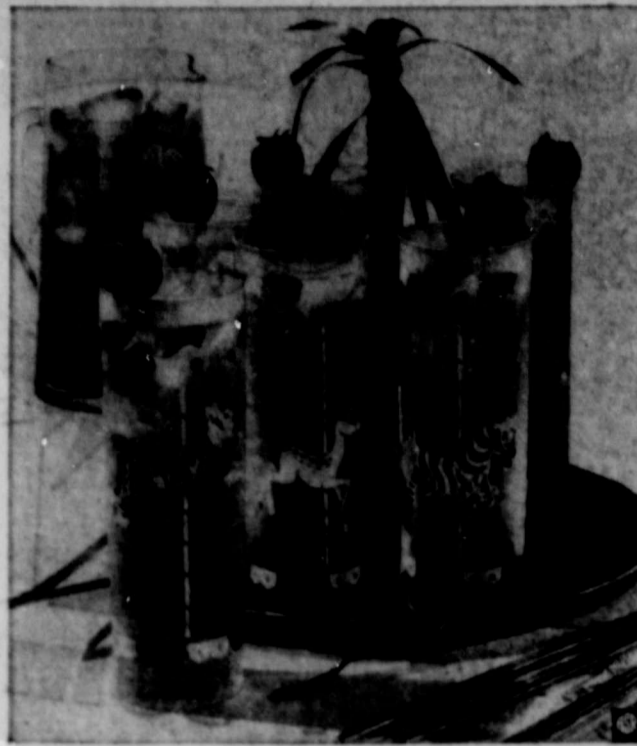
Mrs. Tom Stewart opened the meeting with a prayer. The president, Mrs. A. J. Ratliff, presided over the meeting.
