H-SU Campaign Drive Underway

ABILENE—The Hardin-Simmons University financial campaign is now in full swing throughout this West Texas area.

The Eastland County Commissioners Court Monday refused a request by Clyde Garrett to go on record as opposing alleged political misuse of the County's surplus food program...

Garrett, seeking the post now held by Judge Hart, charged Hart with making a "political football" out of the surplus food program.

He also charged that employees handling the surplus food program have been handing out cards urging Hart's re-election while they were distributing the food.

Judge Hart denied both charges. He called in his secretary, Mrs. Leon Bourland, to answer the first charge.

Pointing out that she knew that it was against Federal regulations to use the surplus food program as a political talking point, she said she would certainly like to know if anyone has used her name.

Garrett, who formerly served as county judge, replied that "satisfy me as far as you are concerned," but added, "Someone could have used your name."

Commissioner J. B. (Tip) Arthur of Eastland made a motion that the Court go on record as being opposed to any use of the program in a political manner.

Commissioner B. M. Bennett of Gorman said, "I ask this Court not to go on record on this thing because I think it is politically bound." And Commissioner R. L. (Bob) Carter added, "It's just all politics to me."

Commissioner Arthur said, "I think it's a little more than politics."

Then Garrett asked, "If this is politics, where is it?"

His reply came from Carter, who said, "If it's not politics what is it? If you all weren't in the race it never would have been brought up."

Sheriff J. R. Williams, who was seated in the courtroom, entered into the heated discussion when he told Judge Hart, "A man made a complaint to me that if he didn't support you he would be cut off."

Judge Garrett To Speak Here

Judge Clyde L. Garrett will be the principal speaker at the regular meeting of Ranger's Rotary Club Wednesday noon.

Judge Garrett will be a guest of Felton Brashear, Sr., who invited him to speak here. His topic is unannounced.

Hart, addressing the Court said, "I hope you will not pay any attention to all of these rumors."

Garrett snapped, "It is not rumors."

Grass Cover In County Termed Best In Years

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by members of the Eastland County Soil Conservation Work Unit). Prolific grass is a basic heritage in our area. A few more summer showers and our grass crop this year will be by far our best in recent times.

Recent grass clipping tests by local Soil Conservation Service work unit personnel show higher yields of winter and spring grasses than have been recorded in many years.

Grass growth is much better this year than last even though we had more rain in the spring of 1957. This year we had better cover and we saved more of the rain. After the three driest years in history—1954 through 1956—most of our range was in poor condition with very little cover.

In the period of 1954-1956 many completely bare areas were found on this site and very few places would clip over a thousand pounds of grass per acre.

Our most remarkable recovery of grass growth has been on our daley prairie range site. This site has a very light soil and is often locally referred to as mesquite flats. Many areas on this range site will now clip over 5000 pounds of grass per acre.

In the period of 1954-1956 many completely bare areas were found on this site and very few places would clip over a thousand pounds of grass per acre.

Campaign workers in a four county area were named Friday night at a dinner held in Eastland. Chairmen include Harvey Kimbler Eastland, general chairman; Charles Layton, Eastland; Harold Barrett, Ranger; H. N. McBeath, Breckenridge; Ed Crow, Cisco; Joe Pat McHaney, Baird; a n d Gene Frazier, Albany and Moran.

H-SU is conducting a campaign for \$1.5 million for the erection of a new \$500,000 chapel auditorium and a \$1 million student center. The university does not now have a chapel. Behrens Chapel was destroyed by fire last November.

All student assemblies and worship services now must be held in Rose Field House where students sit on bleachers.

Dr. Evan Allard Reiff, president, said at one campaign meeting this summer that "a Baptist university just cannot get along without a chapel." He also emphasized the pressing need for a student center which he called the "living room" of the campus.

Baptists, he said, often tell young people what they cannot do, but we need to provide something they can do.

Three major gifts have substantially aided the campaign. The Baptist General Convention of Texas contributed \$100,000, William Fleming, Fort Worth rancher and oilman, gave \$50,000, and George S. Anderson of Abilene, H-SU trustee and benefactor, gave three downtown Abilene buildings to the university endowment fund.

pounds. In this period with such light cover moisture penetration was seldom over one foot even after flood producing rains. In this period areas with best cover would be down around three feet after big rains. In the winter season of 1956-57 this land grew a fair cover of winter grass. In the spring of 1957 this land wet down some deeper, and rains last fall showed much better penetration. Grass growth last winter and spring was truly remarkable and shows the high potential of production for this site. Most of this production has been Texas winter grass. Texas winter is high quality forage in winter and early spring, but the mature forage now present is of low grazing value. The better forage plants for summer grazing on this site (Buffalo, vine mesquite, Side-oats gama, etc.) are in a vigorous stage of growth and spreading rapidly.

Our present big need on most native grazing land is an improvement of forage quality, although many pastures because of overstocking still need more cover to adequately utilize our rainfall. Practically all pastures because of abuse during the drought contain a low percentage of our most desirable grasses. This improvement of composition of better quality forage producing grasses can only come about through range management which will allow these grasses to produce a fall seed crop. Some of these better quality high forage producing grasses are Side oats grama, Little bluestem, Indian grass, Buffalo grass, and Sand love grass. These grasses had not generally recovered sufficiently last fall for a heavy seed crop. This year they are in more vigorous condition, have deeper root systems, and should make a good seed crop where they are given the opportunity.
