As I write this column, the world situation looks critical and likely to "explode" at any moment into another war—perhaps World War III.

Airlifted Marines are landing in the Mediterranean area "in support of landings in Lebanon."

Dyeing Air Force Base, near Abilene, like other Strategic Air Command bases around the nation, went on a full scale 24-hour alert Tuesday.

Americans in Lebanon were warned to stay off the streets.

The Kremlin declares the right to act "to halt a dangerous situation near our border," as American troops continue to leave for "unknown destinations."

In the Midwest, thousands of Marines were landing, and the airport near Beirut was in control of American forces.

The United Nations postpones action on a U. S. resolution authorizing creation of the international force to protect Lebanon's independence from subversion by President Nasser's United Arab Republic.

RANGERITES view all of these developments in alarm and awe. They recall the past "police action" in Korea and the bloody battles of World War II—a n d wonder how this will affect them.

All we can do is wait—a n d hope for PEACE in a troubled world.

Ranger Beats Clyde 9-4 in All-Star Game

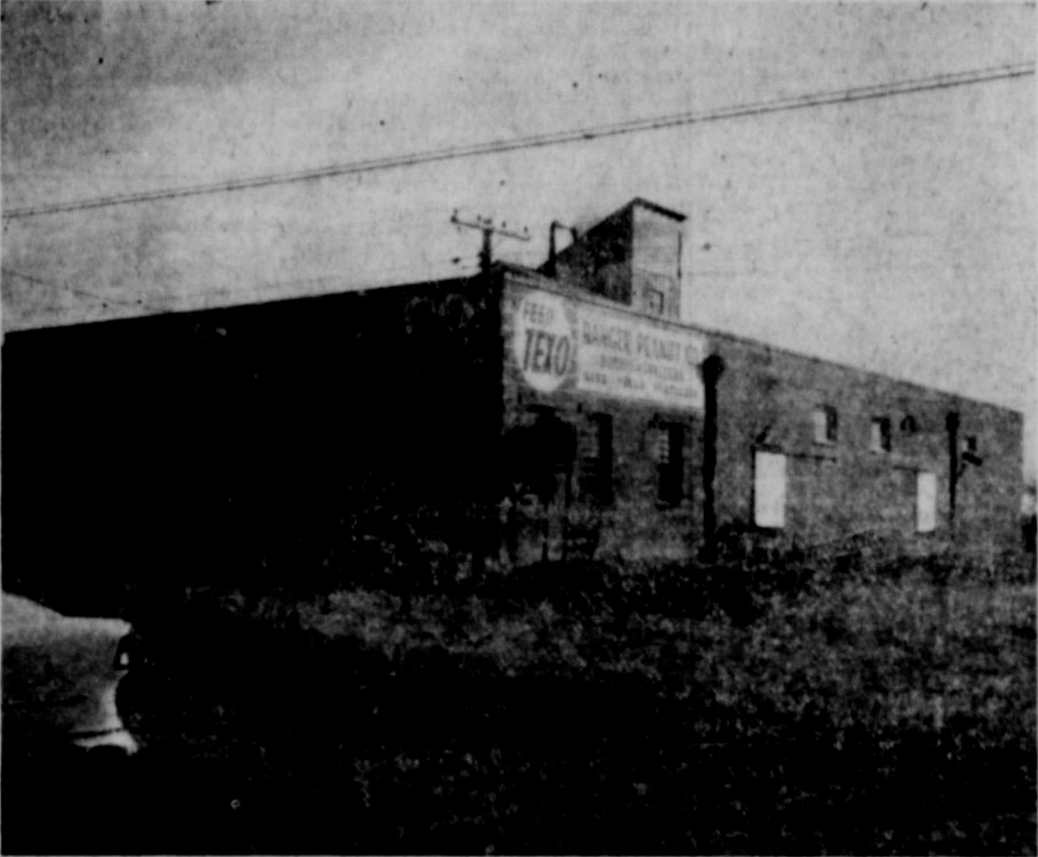
Ranger All-Stars slipped by Clyde in the second game of the play-off in Cisco Tuesday night.

Ranger Couple Attend Meet

Mr. and Mrs. Felton Brashier of Ranger Furniture Exchange were among the nearly 7,000 buyers and other retail executives attending the Southwest Furniture Market in Dallas.

The four-day market, open only to retail furniture store buyers and officials, opened July 14 and was to close today.

Officials of the Retail Furniture Association of Texas, sponsors of the summer and winter markets in Dallas, termed the July, 1958, Southwest Furniture Market "one of the best we have ever had."

Market officials reported that orders written during the opening days of the Market indicate total sales probably will exceed \$20,000,000, and estimated that "the Market will be responsible for an equal amount of re-orders during the coming months."

More than 300 manufacturers of all types and styles of furniture exhibited their new lines in more than 165,000 sq. feet of display space in three buildings on the grounds of the State Fair of Texas. This new merchandise will be available in the Southwest's retail stores next month.

Texas' 49th Division Will Be Realigned

(Editor's Note: Ranger's Service Battery is one of the National Guard units which will be required by the Army for early mobilization in the event of war and hence is the maximum number for which there is a justification for peace time support.)

There are 23 existing Infantry Division organizations in the U. S. Army reserve. Under the new guidance, 10 of these divisions will be retained as combat divisions and 13 will be retained as divisions with a mobilization training mission.

CAMP WOLTERS, Texas—The Texas National Guard's 49th Armored Division and the Texas Army Reserve's 90th Infantry Division are two of twenty-one National Guard and Army Reserve Divisions which will be fully organized under the Department of the Army's realignment of the reserve structure.

On March 31, the Secretary of the Army announced plans to reorganize the Army's Reserve components.

Since that time the Secretary of Defense has modified previous guidance so that "The Army has been authorized to develop a plan looking toward the retention of the present 37 divisions in the Reserve structure, that is, 27 National Guard Divisions and 10 U. S. Army Reserve Divisions, provided that this troop structure is maintained with no increase of cost or personnel beyond currently programmed levels."

The Army National Guard solution preserves the 27 Army National Guard combat divisions, reaffirms the essential importance of nondivisional units in the Army National Guard and provides the high priority units required by war plans. It also represents the maximum number of Army National Guard units which will be required by the Army for early mobilization in the event of war and hence is the maximum number for which there is a justification for peace time support.

Washington, D. C.—Surprising as it may seem, the old issue of the Texas Tidelands Bill.

In 1953, after 16 year of effort the Congress finally passed the so-called Tidelands Bill.

This supposedly settled the proposition that when Texas came into the Union, it reserved for itself 10 1-2 miles into the Gulf of Mexico.

Ordinarily, the ownership of a State extends 3 miles seaward. But the 10 1-2 mile boundary ownership was written into the law by the Congress, and confirmed the Annexation Agreement by which Texas became a State of the Union.

The Federal Government in violation of this provision admitting Texas as a State, contended that the Gulf of Mexico come under Federal jurisdiction beyond the 3 mile limit. The United State Supreme Court upheld this contention on the part of the Federal Government.

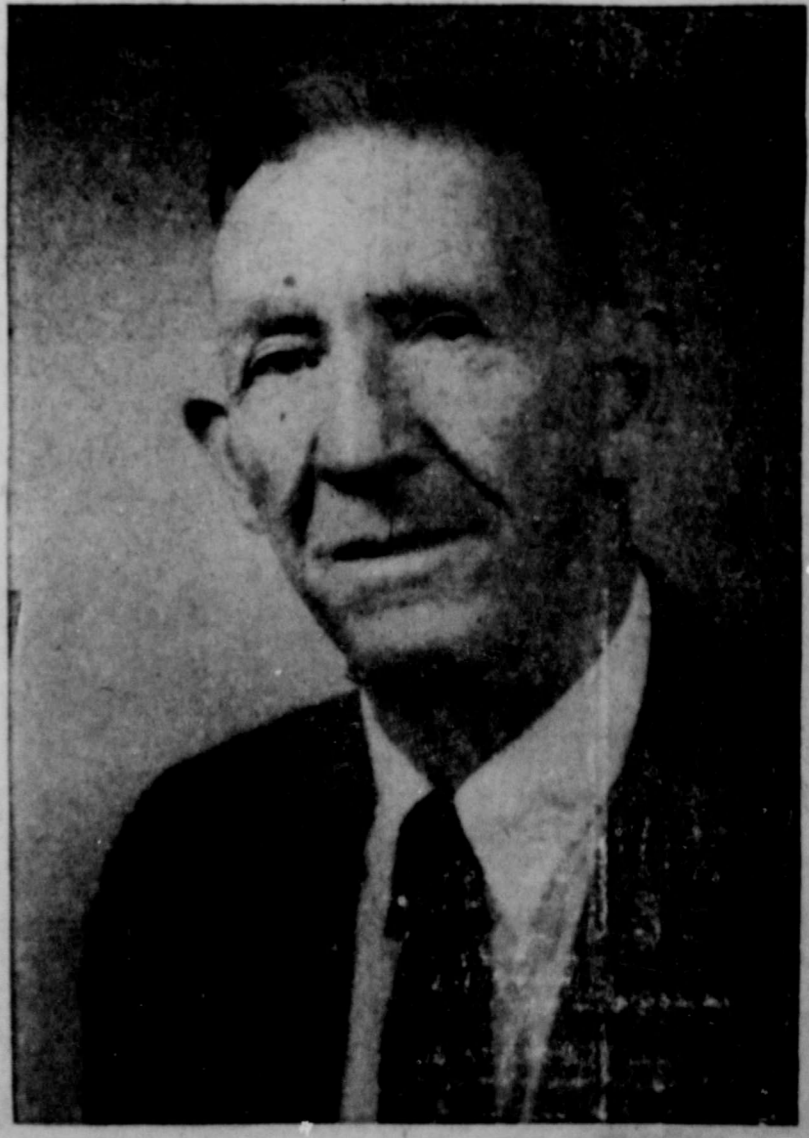
In 1953 the Congress supposedly settled the jurisdictional question by clearly confirming Texas' claim to 10 1-2 miles.

Now, the Attorney General of the United State has filed a 425 page brief, again contesting Texas title to the submerged land between the 3 mile and the 10 1-2 mile limit.

President Eisenhower clearly stated his sentiment in favor of Texas at the time the Congress acted in 1953. It became a strange paradox that his Attorney General now files a suit on behalf of the Federal Government to set aside what the Congress has clearly stated to be the Law. The Attorney General claims that the Tidelands Act passed in 1953 is not clear. The case is to be argued before the Supreme Court of the United States some time next fall.

In the meantime since 1953 the State School Fund of Texas has collected approximately \$75 million from oil companies explor-

Surplus Food Program Being Used For Political Purposes Clyde Garrett Says
Upon learning that a 'political football' is being made by one or two of the employees of the Government's Surplus Food Program (not the county's program) in that they are contacting, high-pressure and intimidating our old people who are receiving old age assistance—for whose benefit the program was primarily set up, and urging them to vote for my opponent, the present County Judge, I appeared before the Commissioners Court and pointed out such practices which are in strict violation of the Federal laws as well as in violation of the contract which the county has with the government.
Knowing our commissioners to be honorable and upright men and knowing they were aware of the fact that our county's Surplus Food Contract could be terminated by the Government if the program was used as a political football, I appeared before the court and pointed out just how our old people are being intimidated in an effort to obtain votes for my opponent, telling them the program might be discontinued if he is not re-elected. Following this I obtained affidavits from reliable and upstanding citizens, which appear below, and which number could be multiplied many times, which will convince any fair-minded person that my statements to the Court were not rumors. Be it said to the credit of a number of the employees of the Food Program, they have had no part in harrasing and intimidating our old people.

I am a member of the Church of Christ. After introducing herself, Mrs. Rosser said: "You remember that you are receiving surplus commodities, I want you to vote for John Hart for County Judge. 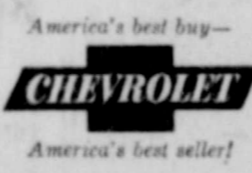

Vets Should Contact VA When Selling Home

A veteran selling his home and GI mortgage should first contact the Veterans Administration if he wishes to be released from the liability to the Government on his GI loan.

Such a release protect the veteran in the event the new purchaser defaults in payments, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas said today.

Onstot explained that a 1956 law allows veterans to be released from liability to the Government provided the new purchaser meets credit requirements and assumes the veteran's obligations to the Government on the GI loan.

The new purchaser need not be a veteran, Onstot pointed out, and the Government's guaranty of the loan is not affected by releasing the veteran from his liability.

In most states the only cost of obtaining the release is a small fee, usually not more than \$5.00 for a credit report on the proposed

buyer, he said. Release of the veteran from liability to the Government does not automatically release him from liability to the lender.

However, Onstot emphasized, VA will furnish the prospective buyer's credit report to the lender, and otherwise assist any veteran who wishes to seek his lender's release.

VA makes no charge for this service, Onstot said, although the lender may require the payment of a nominal fee for the processing of his release.

Milk Program Bill Signed

COLLEGE STATION — President Eisenhower has signed into law a bill providing for continued operation of the Special Milk Program, which makes more milk available to children.

The program will be available to the more than 5,000 summer camps, day camps, recreation centers and other child-care institutions, and schools which plan to participate in it this summer. It will serve three-quarters of a million children. This includes the schools which hold regular summer sessions as well as schools which operate during the summer to make up for time lost during the harvest season.

Enactment of the bill, which extends the program for three years, also makes it possible for school administrators to make orderly plans for continued participation when schools generally reopen this fall. Last school year, more than 75,000 schools and institutions took part in the Special Milk Program, serving nearly two billion half-pints of milk to children. This was in addition to milk served under the National School Lunch Program.

STATE NEWS

We have this week sent accounts to most of our subscribers, and feel assured that could they witness the immense sensation, caused by a \$2.50 piece right about this office, they would open the hearts and purses and wipe out our scores. Some of you have been reading the paper all last year without paying for it, and now we appeal to you to pay us for the old subscription and for the coming one in ADVANCE.

Money can be sent by mail at one risk. To our agents who have made collections for us, we say, don't delay remitting until some acquaintance visit Austin, but send through the Post Office at any time.

The Fourth being Sabbath, the morning of the 5th was ushered in by the firing of one gun for each of our thirty-three sovereign states which adorn the glorious galaxy. The booming sound was echoed back from an hundred hills and re-echoed through the whole extent of the country. At an early hour of our streets were thronged with hundreds of our citizens mostly wearing happy faces. At half past eleven the thundering cannon told us that the Quilman Rifles were marching to the Capitol in their blue and white uniforms and appropriate small cases under the command of their gallant Captain, Washington Hill.

We have elsewhere spoken of the prospects of this road, and now before our readers the following condemnation by the editor of the Galveston News. Our citizens must feel an interest in the completion of this road to Brenham, since it is impossible that the terminus can remain in the very center of the richest country in the world. The sole of building by the people themselves must heartily commend itself to every man. The company expects to complete the road from Hempstead to

the River within sixty days from the present time — it being an air line from Hempstead to the river, and grading very light. It is thought \$1000 per mile will complete the road but ready for the crosses, on this portion of the road. Thirty dollars a per month for first class hands are allowed, payable in the stock of the company, which it is supposed can be made the best paying stock in the state.
