Milk Program Bill Signed

COLLEGE STATION — President Eisenhower has signed into law a bill providing for continued operation of the Special Milk Program, which makes more milk available to children.

The program will be available to the more than 5,000 summer camp, day camp, vacation centers and other child-care institutions, and schools which plan to participate in it this summer. It will serve three-quarters of a million children. This includes the schools which hold regular summer sessions as well as schools which operate during the summer to make up for time lost during the harvest season.

Enactment of the bill, which extends the program for three years, also makes it possible for school administrators to make orderly plans for continued participation when schools generally reopen this fall. Last school year, more than 75,000 schools and institutions took part in the Special Milk Program, serving nearly two billion half-pints of milk to children. This was in addition to milk served under the National School Lunch Program.

At half past eleven the thundering cannon told us that the Quitman Rifles were marching to the Capital in their blue and white uniforms and appropriate small arms under the command of their gallant Captain, Washington Hill.

We have elsewhere spoken of the prospects of this road, and now before our readers the following condensation by the editor of the Galveston News. Our citizens must feel an interest in the completion of this road to Brenham, since it is impossible that the terminus can remain in the very center of the richest country in the world. The acts of building by the people themselves must heartily commend itself to every man. "The company expects to complete the road from Hempstead to

the River within sixty days from the present time — it being an airline from Hempstead to the river, and grading very light. It is thought \$1000 per mile will complete the road but ready for the cross-ties, on this portion of the road. Thirty dollars per month for first class hands are allowed, payable in the stock of the company, which it is supposed can be made the best paying stock in the state."

Train Robberies At Gordon, Ranger And Others Retold, With Footnotes

(Editor's Note: Train robberies on the T&P Railroad, in the days when the West was wild, are recounted here by Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmore of Ranger. This story includes an account of the successful train robbery at Gordon and the not so successful robbery in Ranger.

An interesting foot note is added by Mrs. H. C. (Dora) Croom of Ranger.)

By Ethel Brookes Gilmore Train crews on the T. and P. in early days had to keep their sense of humor, and at other times were called on to keep as calm as possible, and show the metal they were made of.

a chance the smoke stack would go, so he smiled and waved to the cowboys, and they rode along side of the engine into Gordon.

In 1896, five men rode up to a section gang, working the track three miles east of Gordon. They drew their guns and forced one of the gang to go up the track some distance and flag down the train.

When the first passenger train was near Gordon, Texas, two cowboys on fast roping ponies galloped up and roped the smoke stack of the locomotive.

Texas, a lithe, dark-skinned man, wearing cowboy gear, climbed into the cab at Stanton. He was holding a revolver in each hand, and ordered the engineer to pull out and stop three miles out of town.

It was thought that these robbers were pulled by Black Jack Ketchum and his gang. Black Jack was quite noted at that time. He holed up around San Angelo and San Saba. It was never proved that he actually committed these robberies.

Early the next morning the section gang found Black Jack by the track. He was too badly wounded to put up a fight.

When the train stopped, the three men rushed up to the express car and drew their guns, and told the express messenger to hand over the money.

Although one of the gang was badly wounded in the arm and chest, they managed to escape. The wounded man was arrested

a few days later at Merriam. Soon after this the other two were caught.

All three were tried and sent to the State Penitentiary. One died there before his sentence was up.

was supposed to have payroll money, in gold, on it for the Thurber T & P Coal Co.

My mother was so excited and nervous that she walked the floor until my father came in with his men on a load car, used on the railroad.

The children gathered around to listen, as our father related the account of the robbery, which follows:

About noon that day, five masked men rode up on horses. They came up to my father and told him they were to get the money off the train, and his job was to see the switch was thrown and some of the rails removed so the train could be wrecked. While the leader of the three robbers held a gun on my father telling him

what to do, the other two men guarded the working men.

My father realized that lives would be lost, so he told them to just let him flag the train and stop it. They agreed, with the understanding that if the train should fail to stop, his life would be ended with that of his men.

When he began to flag the train to a stop, one of his workers, Neal Anderson, called to my father and said, "Stop her Jim, for God's sake, stop that train."

My father was called to Palo Pinto several times to try to identify the men, in court, who were suspected of the robbery.

His trips to Palo Pinto were made by foot or (by chance) in a wagon or buggy. He would leave Gordon on Saturday to be in court on Monday morning.
