The decline in tax collections was also due partially to the in-creased number of employers qualifying for lower rates because of experience ratings. The state tax begins at 2.7 per cent, but most employers become eligible for a lower tax rate after 18 316 qualifying for such reduced rates as compared to 61,903 for the previous 12 months.
