\$50,000 More Wheat Checks Are Distributed

Approximately \$50,000 was distributed this week to wheat farmers taking part in the government's acreage reduction program.

This is the second bunch of checks to be distributed here and the money was divided among 228 farmers.

This leaves only \$5,000 yet to be paid for the first adjusted payments, County Agent E. W. Thomas said.

"It will be remembered that we had a split payment plan and the other half will be due June 1st. In reality, therefore, the tax payments will amount to 75 or 80 per cent," Mr. Barnett said. The total valuation for the city amount to \$542,061.

John A. Nolen Enters Race For Sheriff's Office

John A. Nolen, prominent Castro county farmer, living in the Easter community this week tosses his hat into the political ring as a candidate for sheriff of the county.

Most everyone is acquainted with Mr. Nolen, either personally or by reputation and he feels that he will not need a formal introduction to most of the voters.

Mr. Nolen has been a resident of the county for five years and a resident of the state for 11 years. He stated that he had never sought public office before and this will be his first attempt.

In asking the support of the voters he invites a thorough investigation of his record as a man and a citizen, and feels that his background gives him the experience which will enable him to handle the office in a highly efficient and satisfactory manner.

"Good judgment, attention to duty, the respect of the people and the desire to do the right thing, constitute the big qualifications of a man in the sheriff's office," Mr. Nolen said. "I think that I have these qualifications. I shall endeavor to see every voter, but in the meanwhile I solicit the active support of my friends and the consideration of those with whom I am not personally acquainted."

Old Judge Bean in years gone by meted out justice in no uncertain terms. Finding a Chinaman shot to death, a gun on his hip, \$30 in his pockets, Bean fined the dead man \$30 for carrying concealed weapons and confiscated the pistol. The town and the saloon were named after the famous Broadway dancer of old times, Lilly Langtry, who once passed through there on the train and made a big hit with the Judge. In the picture, Judge Bean is the man with whiskers at the right.

Sanitation Project Started In County

We have started a county-wide health and sanitation program in Castro county which is a part of the state and federal health and sanitation programs now in progress.

This project, which is made possible by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, is under the direction of the county Health Officer and a county Sanitary Supervisor.

There are two divisions of this project: one to gather health and sanitation statistics; the other is the building of sanitary pit privies in the county.

In the next few days we will have a sample sanitary pit privy erected on the court house grounds for inspection by the public.

These pit privies can be obtained by furnishing materials only, all labor to be furnished free from C. W. A. rolls.

There will be men call on every home in Castro county gathering statistics and explaining the construction of these sanitary pit privies.

We would appreciate the co-operation of everyone in this work and the courteous treatment of the men that call on you.

"Not a single fire loss was paid in 1933 for a loss in 1933," Mr. Barnett said. "There was one loss paid by an insurance company but it was on a 1932 fire, and does not properly belong in the record of 1933. On the basis of that record we feel that we certainly are entitled to a key rate reduction."

About 1300 Qualified To Vote In County

About 1300 poll taxes have been paid in Castro county, according to J. H. Flanagan, tax collector.

This figure will top the high set in 1932 when 1229 poll taxes were paid.

It is estimated that there are some 200 or more exemptions making the total number of qualified voters in the county about 1500.

Cotton Option Checks Received Here This Week

Twenty-three government checks amounting to \$6,158 were received by County Agent Thomas this week and were distributed to cotton farmers taking advantage of the cotton option contracts made possible through the AAA.

This money represents loans up to 4 cents a pound on cotton which is being held by the government. It may be sold by the owners at any time. The government will loan as high as 15c a pound on the staple.

World's Worst Hick

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE WORLD'S WORST HICK HALCOMB, Candidate for Representative, 120th District, Castro County, Dimmitt, Texas.

You'd just as well get used to everybody that wants you to do anything addressing you as "Dear Old Pal," and besides we are both brothers in that Mistook and Taking Fraternity of the Brotherhood of Scribes:

To get right down to brass tacks and be brief and to the point, I want you to agree to introduce a bill when and (if) you are elected to the legislature.

As an enclosure in this letter you will find a proof of my column for this week's paper. It is self explanatory, but in case you don't read it, I'm in a jam, or is it jamb, and I have discovered a real field for Texas legislation. My car, only 40 days old, got temperamental and did a thing that it shouldn't. It don't make a difference whether I was sober or not, cause the insurance policy says so. But I want to collect PLENTY of insurance.

The insurance company wants to pay as little as possible, and right there is where you come in. Together with Judge J. H. Broadhurst of my county, I have searched all the laws of the state of Texas, and we can't find a single law that will make the insurance company do what they otto by a newspaper man.

Furthermore, these boys don't want to pay the damage my car has sustained over to the mortgagee (French word meaning GMAC) and about the only way we can come to terms is to let them take my car over to Amarillo and bring it back as good as new, and charge me \$50.00 CASH for the trouble. You know that if a newspaper man had fifty dollars he wouldn't want an insurance policy, and he darn shure couldn't use a NEW car, or at least he shouldn't use a new car without an insurance policy, so it amounts to one and the same thing. Besides, as I outlined in my column, I want my car as is, so I can fish and hunt and attend football games without my wife (Eddie Faye) vetoing the propositions on the grounds of ruining a new car.

Which brings me down to the Bill I want you to introduce. Here are just a few fertile suggestions that I would make, of course, you can frame the bill to suit yourself.

To Be Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas: SECTION I. That all sections of House and Senate Bills relating to and passed by all previous called and regular sessions of Texas Legislature be and are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1. Newspaper men of the State of Texas being exempt from jury service, prayer meetings, school trusteeships, singing conventions, christening services, and weather predictions, this class of citizens are hereby, hereafter and henceforth, exempt from any and all regulations pertaining to automobile accidents, the

just and logical settlement of same, as outlined by all previous laws of the State of Texas.

"Sec. 2. That in the rare case of, if and when a newspaper man has a car, and the even rarer case of, if and when said car being new, and then the rarest case of, if and when said car being new, the said newspaper man sustains damages (to his car, not himself), it is hereby enacted, empaneled and set forth that:

1. The company selling, bartering or giving said car to said newspaper man, be required to change the brakes, tires, ventilation, or whatever the assigned (meaning the newspaper man) assigns as the cause of accident that sustained the damage. That every car in the State of Texas of the same model, brand or trademark, so designated by the Assigner, be taken out of service up to and including the dates necessary to make the necessary changes as outlined, so that the pursuit of life and happiness may be maintained in the Empire State of Texas.

2. That the company manufacturing said car for marketing in the State of Texas is hereby required to make (within ten days after the accident) public apology to the newspaper man in person, and to the Press Association of the State of Texas, for having placed on the open market of the State of Texas, a motor vehicle, manufactured for the purpose of conveying both business and pleasure, which is faulty in construction.

"Sec. 3. That the insurance company carrying any and all motor vehicles, owned by newspaper men in, on and over the state highways and lateral roads of the State of Texas, are hereby required to settle IN CASH for such damages as may be asked by said newspaper man, up to and including the amount of value that may be appraised, as to the condition of the car prior to the said wreck, by a committee of one man designated by the assigner.

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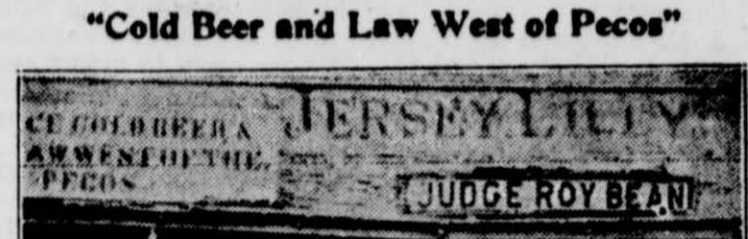
