

## Bulldogs And Rangers To See Action This Week Rangers Meet Dragons In Paris Sat. in Opener

The Ranger College Bulldogs will open the 1959 season against the Paris Dragons Saturday night in Paris.

The Rangers have eight days of practice and two scrimmages behind them. They scrimmaged Tarleton last Saturday, when each of the teams came up with two touchdowns, but the Rangers looked more impressive in their scoring than the Plovers. The Rangers moved the ball easily against the big Tarleton line, but fumbled away most of their scoring chances.

Their defense looked good against the Plovers except in the passing department.

Tuesday the Rangers showed moments of greatness against Cisco Junior College in a scrimmage, but they also showed moments of weakness. Again, as in the Tarleton scrimmage, they had trouble holding onto the ball. The defense against the Ramblers looked real good, holding the Ramblers to very few yards gained. The Ramblers failed to complete any impressive passing, although they had men in the open on several occasions. The defense rushed the passer and made him hurry his throwing, which was wide of the mark.

The Rangers will leave here Saturday at 7 a. m. Game time will be at 8 p. m. in Paris. The Rangers downed the Dragons 15-0 in the 1958 encounter. The Dragons will be looking for revenge this year and they will have the material to field a good team. It was reported that the Paris coach had 120 hopefuls to select his squad from.

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### 6000 School Buses Carry 2 Million Pupils Each Day

Texas' largest transportation system is now in full swing—the State's fleet of more than 8,000 school buses. Furthermore, for the next nine months, these buses will carry the bulk of nearly 2,000,000 pupils to and from school each week day.

It is truly a Texas-size task to transport all these pupils — it is an even greater task to transport them safely. No one will deny the school bus driver has a tremendous responsibility.

But, says the Texas Safety Association, motorists are also charged with the safety of our school bus riding pupils. The State law is very precise on this point and reads as follows:

#### Sec. 104. Overtaking and Passing School Bus

a. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus, which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

b. Every bus used for the transportation of school children shall bear upon the front and rear thereof a plainly visible sign containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than eight inches in height.

c. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

### GI Education Bill Amended

Regulations under the Korean GI education bill intend to prevent abuses of "course hopping" have been made less stringent under new legislation, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, said today.

For example, he said, Korean War veterans who decide to go on to master's and doctor's degrees, after getting their bachelor's degrees, can now do so.

Under the GI educational benefits, Congress limited veterans to one change of program to keep veterans from shifting goals several times under educational and training programs.

The Veterans Administration discovered the provision prevented it from paying benefits to a veteran who won his bachelor of arts degree and then continued to qualify for higher degrees of master and doctor.

All effects of the amending legislation can be obtained at any VA office, Onstot said.

## Registration Starts Mon. At College

Registration for the fall semester at Ranger College will be held next Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 14 and 15 beginning at 9 a. m. until noon, and from 1:30 p. m. until 3 p. m. in Cooper Library.

Registration for evening classes will be held the same evenings from 6 to 8 p. m. in Cooper Library.

Both day and evening classes will begin September 16.

Requirements for admission to freshman standing at Ranger College may be met in one of two ways. By presenting a high school diploma, or by individual approval and entrance examination.

Tuition is \$50 per semester for 12 hours or more, and the matriculation fee is \$10.

Graduates of Ranger College receive an Associate of Arts degree. All courses will transfer to any reputable institution of higher learning. Courses leading to Bachelor degrees in Agriculture, Business Administration, secretarial studies, accounting, education, foreign language, industrial arts, journalism, mathematics, physical education, science, social science, speech, art, and music education are taught.

Students entering pre-dental, pre-engineering, pre-law, pre-medical, pre-nursing, pre-veterinary and pre-pharmacy can take the first two years of work at Ranger College.

Sixty hours of college work are required for graduation from Ranger College, including 12 hours of English, six hours of math, six hours of science, six hours of American history, and six hours of government.

Schedules are available in the main office of the college from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. each week day and 8 a. m. to noon on Saturday. Students who desire help in planning their courses are invited by school officials to visit the school this week and talk with the instructors.

Evening classes will be held four nights a week this fall. Each class

meeting two times each week. Classes begin at 6 p. m. and run until 10 p. m.

A wide selection of courses are available in the night classes. These include history, business math, shorthand, English, government, education, office machines, typing, algebra, sociology, biology, chemistry and accounting. Also laboratories pertaining to subjects requiring them.

Ranger College serves this part of the state with an institution of learning equal to the leading junior colleges of the state. A place where a student may obtain the first two years of college work in any chosen profession.

Ranger College provides any number of extra-curricular activities along with the regular courses. Football, track and basketball in the sports department. Band, orchestra and a precision marching group, the Rangemasters are provided in the music department. These activities provide for the complete development of the students in Ranger College.

### Bulldogs to Shoot For Mountaineers

The Ranger High School Bulldogs got a severe test from Class A Rotan last week and came up on the short end of the score. The test they got last week will be a minor affair to what they will experience this Friday night when they travel to Mineral Wells to try the Mountaineers. The Mountaineers, Class AAA, are big and rugged, with lots of experienced players back this year.

It is going to take an all-out team effort on the part of the Bulldogs to pull this one out. It will be a lot tougher than the game against Rotan. The Bulldogs failed in every department in the Rotan game. Only thing that the Bulldogs showed against Rotan was team spirit. They never gave up and were in there playing until the final gun. They are going to have to be a lot tougher in both defense and offense to be a match for the Mountaineers.

Available at the High School and school business offices are tickets for the Mineral Wells game, according to an announcement from Charlie Garrett, principal.

A total of 100 adult tickets are on sale for \$1 each and student tickets are 25 cents each. These are general admission tickets only.

The Bulldogs will have one thing in their favor in the game Friday night and that will be one game in experience where the Mountaineers will be playing their first game of the season. On the other hand the Mountaineers will be playing at home. They will have the advantage of more returning starters from last year than the Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs will go into the game with the same lineup as last week. There were no injuries suffered in the Rotan conflict and they are at top strength physically.

### Social Security Records Should Be Checked

A question the Social Security Administration would like to hear asked more often is, "Have my earnings been properly credited to my social security account?"

Most people know something about their rights and benefits under social security but many do not know they have certain obligations, too. For example, have you checked your social security record in recent years? Do you know whether all your earnings have been correctly credited to your account? If your answer is "No" to these questions, you should take action now. Social security records should be checked at least once every three years and the sooner a worker checks the easier it is to correct any errors in his earnings record. This advice applies to everyone but especially to household workers who may work for several employers at the same time, or who may change jobs frequently, or who may not work steadily.

It's good business to verify that your earnings have been properly credited to your account just as you make sure you receive credit for your bank deposits and insurance premiums.

Remember that your social security retirement, disability, and survivors benefits will be based on your social security account. Therefore, it's good business to check the record of your earnings. It's an easy thing to do. Just write the social security district office, Box 3168, Abilene, Texas, and ask for OAR-7004, Wage Statement Request. When your statement comes back in the mail, check it carefully against your own records. If you believe that there are any errors — that all of the earnings that should have been credited to your account are not shown — get in touch with the Abilene social security office, or meet a representative of that office when he is in your vicinity. Check his travel schedule at your local post office.

He is one of 261 district governors supervising the activities of more than 10,200 Rotary clubs which have a membership of nearly 500,000 business and professional executives in 113 countries throughout the world.

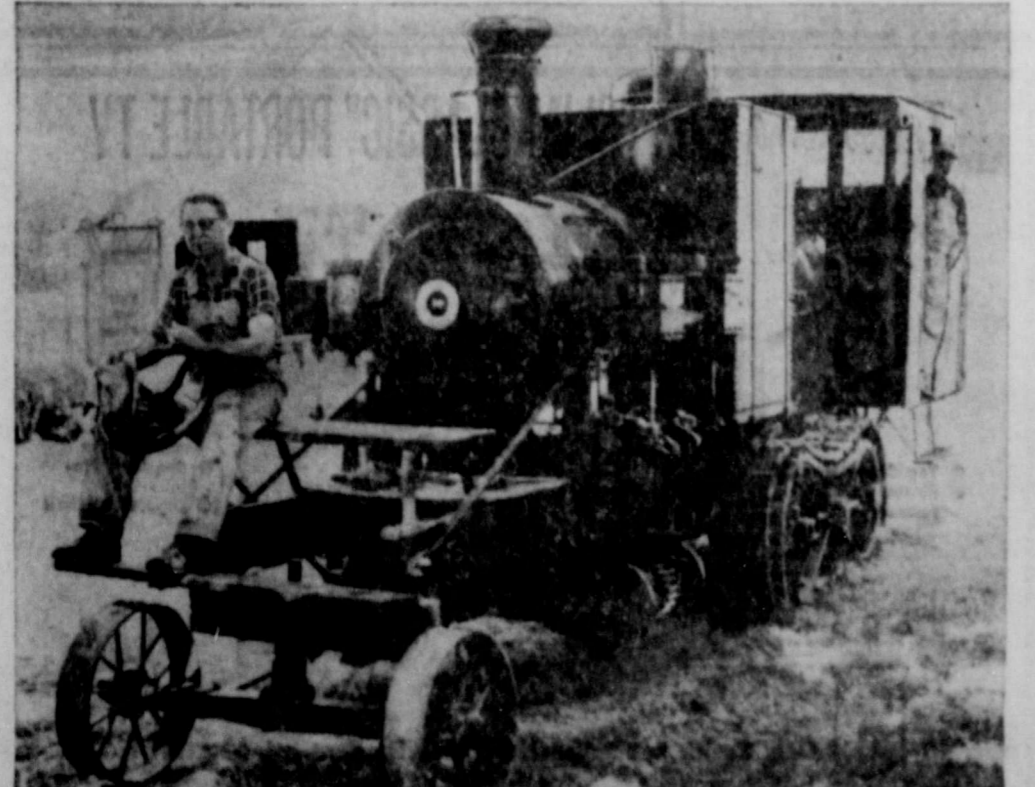
Whenever Rotary clubs are located, President Brown asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Ranger because they are based on the same general objectives — developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. President Brown added. During the past fiscal year, 274 new Rotary clubs were organized in 62 countries, bringing the total number of Rotary clubs to an all-time high of more than 10,200, and four countries were added to Rotary's roster — British Guiana, Ghana, Madagascar and Nepal.

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**STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES**  
Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to

**Peanuts Remain Top Choice of Baseball Fans**

Peanuts are the most popular snack of baseball fans says the National Peanut Council. Some time ago, the Potato Chip Institute said that, "Potato chips outsell all other packaged food, including the former best seller, peanuts, at ball games . . ."

"That's a foul," says Bill Seals, president of the Peanut Council, who is sort of a Ford Frick of organized peanuts. And, he has the statements of all 16 clubs to prove that peanuts lead in both leagues.


The box score shows that peanut sales are in first place over popcorn, cracker jack and potato chips at 14 of the 16 parks and run a close second at the other two.

Popcorn is in first place in two parks, second in 13 and third in one. Cracker Jack is second choice among Boston Red Sox fans, third at six parks, fourth in one and not sold in eight.

Potato chips, which claimed the popularity crown, are not even sold in eight major league parks. In the remaining eight they trail other snacks, running third in four parks and last in the other four.

In contradicting the potato chip claim Seals said, "The potato chip people ought to be ashamed of themselves. No one is apt to be misled by such a wild statement. Baseball and peanuts are as American as Yankee Doodle. They have been going together for years. The peanut popularity record continues unbeaten like Babe Ruth's home record."

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proceed past same at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rules applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally

pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or a main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

### Hunting, Fishing Exemptions For Under 17, Over 65

AUSTIN — Exempt fishing permits are not required of all fishermen under 17 and over 65 years, according to the fiscal director, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "These are only courtesy cards, more or less," said the director. "Certified drivers' licenses or other legal documents are just as valid."

With the exception of deer hunters, the same holds true for exempt licenses when hunting in the same age group must have exempt licenses when hunting deer because of the license tags that must be fastened on the deer kill.

Persons residing on their property who wish to hunt on this property must have an exempt license. This license is not valid for any other piece of property, however. If you do not reside on the property, you will need a regular residence license. Persons under 17 and over 65 need only the one (age exempt) license in "I" cases, but only if they hunt deer. Otherwise any valid identification will do just as well.

It is not necessary to send applications to the Austin office. All regional offices, which are located in larger cities, can provide exempt hunting and fishing permits. "To save time," said the director, "send your applications to the nearest regional office, or contact the local game warden. In every case provide valid identification with your request."

Eggs can be simple and strict-  
 ly for the family or they can shine  
 as any party or company food.  
 They add bright color and taste  
 appeal to buffet dinners, lunch-  
 eons, hors d'oeuvres trays, salad  
 plates and snacks. Supplies are  
 plentiful now and prices are rea-  
 sonable.

Hard-cooked eggs are the  
 brightest social lights. Many de-  
 lightful taste combinations can be  
 created with hard-cooked eggs.  
 Start by cutting freshly cooked  
 eggs lengthwise or crosswise. Slip  
 out the yolks, mash with a fork,  
 and add your own chosen mixture.  
 Mix to desired consistency and re-  
 fill the whites.  
 You might try some of these—  
 Mix one of the following with your  
 yolks:

- 1/2 cup grated cheese
  - 1 or 2 slices of bacon, crisply  
 cooked and minced
  - 1/3 teaspoon curry with 1/3 cup  
 chopped ripe olives
  - 3 Tablespoons minced or grated  
 onion with 1/4 teaspoon minced  
 parsley
  - 3 tablespoons minced chicken,  
 veal, shrimp or mushrooms.
  - A tablespoon of minced pimen-  
 to
- These amounts will fill 6 eggs.  
 In keeping your eggs fresh, you  
 will want them to retain the best  
 flavor. This is obtained through  
 proper storage of the eggs. It's  
 best to keep eggs in a covered  
 bowl or pan, away from strong-  
 smelling foods. Without a cover,  
 eggs lose moisture faster and may  
 absorb odors. Always keep them  
 in the refrigerator, since eggs  
 stored at room temperatures may  
 lose as much in quality in three  
 days as those kept two weeks in  
 a good refrigerator.

Broken light bulbs remaining in a  
 socket may be screwed out by  
 pushing a large cork into the light  
 base. The cork removes the danger  
 of cutting the hands or getting a  
 shock.

Ivory piano keys sometimes turn  
 yellow because of water or insuffi-  
 cient sunlight. To clean these  
 yellowed keys, use a soft flannel  
 dampened with wood or denatured  
 alcohol. Then be sure that your  
 piano keyboard is left uncovered  
 part of the time. On some new  
 pianos, plastic keys are being  
 used. These may be cleaned with a

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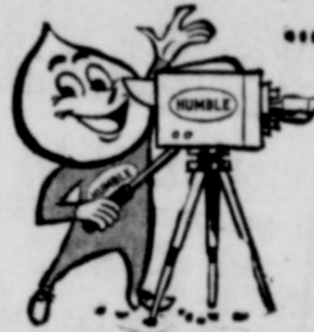
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
