

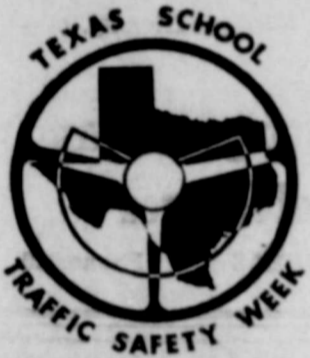
As I Meet Ranger

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Rangers Cop Opener With 28-0 Victory Over Paris

The Ranger College Rangers took to the air Saturday night in Paris and connected for a 28 to 0 win over the highly rated Paris Dragons.

The Ranger's defense, which was hitting terrifically, held the Dragons to few yards gained, never allowing them to penetrate past the Ranger 20 yard line.

It was a repeat of the 1958 season opened with the Rangers scoring four touchdowns. It was Kenneth Hart all the way, passing for two touchdowns and setting up two more with his accurate tossing to his talented, "gingerfingers" receivers.

Early in the first quarter full-back R. E. Duggan crashed over from the one yard line for the first TD. Passes of 17, 5, and 13 yards were the deciding factor leading to the touchdown.

In the second quarter, Hart passed to Dean Faulkenberry, the slot back, for 12 yards and six points. Again Hart set up the score by intercepting a Paris pass and completing one of his own to move the ball to the 12 where he hit Faulkenberry for the score.

After the half Wayne Cromer and Vernon Singleton dropped the Paris offense for successive losses of 12 and 4 yards, forcing them to punt. Hart then took over to complete a 43 yard pass to end Jim Hamilton to the four yard line. R. E. Duggan was then called on to power the ball over for the score.

Late in the fourth quarter the Rangers began to roll, or you might say fly again, when Hart really began to hit, completing tosses of 14, 8, 12, 4, 11, and 4 yards with Hamilton again taking the last tons of four yards good for the six points.

Hart had a perfect night kicking all four extra points, with Jackie Waggoner holding. James Hodgkinson, James Stanford, Howard Stallings and Vernon Singleton led the fired-up defense in the rout of the Paris offense. The defense seemed to be reading the Paris mail with the entire line sometimes collaborating to stop the Paris backs for no gain.

The Rangers had 122 yards rushing with Duggan being the workhorse, carrying the ball 12 times for a total of 57 yards. Hart and Jim Brock combined to complete 19 of 32 passes for a total of 220 yards. Hart getting 14 of 23 completions and Brock hitting 5 of 9. Faulkenberry and Hamilton led the receivers with six each for 82 and 90 yards respectively.

The Rangers will entertain the Cameron Aggies Saturday in Bulldog Stadium at 8 p.m. Cameron is rated one of the top Junior Colleges in the north.



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
