Rain, Wind, Mud And Bearcats Down Bulldogs

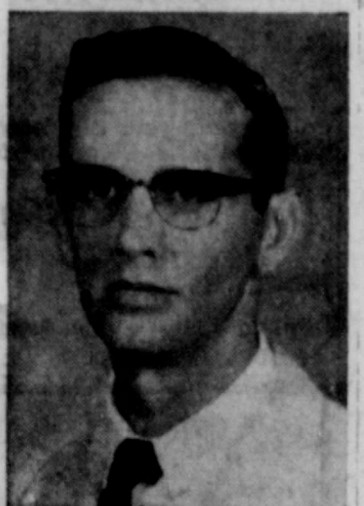
De Leon slipped in under the cover of darkness and heavy fog to pull a game out of the mud late in the fourth quarter Friday night with the score of 24 to 20.

College Enrollment Increases Over Original Count

With ten days of the 1959-60 school year gone, Ranger College has an additional 11 students to its enrollment over the initial registration.

There has been five fulltime day students and six fulltime night students gained since registration day Sept. 16.

The latest enrollment report shows there is 43 fulltime night students in the college night school. They are carrying a total of 428 student hours. In the Ranger College day school there is a total of 121 fulltime day students, carrying 1977 student hours.

In the Breckenridge Branch there is 51 students carrying 421 hours.

These figures show that there is a total of 217 fulltime students enrolled at Ranger College. These 217 students are taking a total of 2826 student hours. This gives 188.40 full time student equivalent.

Rangers Down Austin 18 to 6 Gain 2-1 Rating

The Ranger College Rangers made a comeback Thursday night by defeating the Austin College "B" Kangaroos 18 to 6.

Although the score indicates a fairly easy win, the Rangers didn't look very impressive against the smaller team. The Rangers, both offensively and defensively, looked at times like a smooth operating machine, but at other times they looked like a high school second unit team. The win over the Austin "B" was one of the easiest wins they will get all year. The preliminaries are over. It is going to take first class, hard-played football for any way the remainder of the season. They can't play football against the other teams they will encounter this year like they did against the Kangaroos, and expect to come out in front.

The first quarter got off to a slow start with each team having to punt on fourth down one time. The Rangers drove to the Austin 12 yard line and with fourth down and 12 yards to go, tried a field goal with Kenneth Hart doing the kicking. The try was no good, and Austin took over on the 20 to end any threat in the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter Ranger recovered an Austin fumble on Austin's 31 yard line to set up the first touchdown. R. E. Duggan, fullback, powered over from 11 yards out on a slant over right tackle. Hart's attempted kick was no good on the extra point try.

Things really got exciting then when Ranger blocked an Austin punt on the 60 yard line. But Austin came right back and intercepted a Ranger pass and Edwards ran it back to the Ranger 47 yard line. The Kangaroos then put on a drive down to the Ranger's 5 yard line, where Dean Faulkenberry, Ranger's slot back intercepted a pass on the four yard line. The Rangers then put on their most impressive drive of the night with Jim Brock and Kenneth Hart going to the air to move the ball down to the Austin nine yard line with passes of 7, 29, 20 and 10 yards. Hart then hit Jimmy Knickerbocker with a 9 yard toss and six points. Again Hart's kick was no good for the bonus point.

The Austin score is an indication of the do's and don'ts attitude of the Rangers in the game. The Kangaroos mounted a drive that carried the ball down to the Ranger's ten yard line, from there the Rangers took over on downs, and moved the ball out to the 25. Two five yard penalties and a nine yard loss put the Rangers on the six yard line. From there Hart was hit by the entire right side of the Austin line and Robert Richardson, Austin tackle jumped on the loose ball for the Austin score. The extra point run failed to materialize.

The Ranger's final score came following a series of interceptions and a recovered fumble. First Austin intercepted a Ranger pass. Two plays later Jim Brock intercepted an Austin pass, only to give it right back by tossing to Edwards, the Austin safety man. But Ranger countered by getting an Austin bobble. Then R. E. Duggan took over again, hitting the Austin line time and again for substantial gains with the final plunge good for 3 yards and six points.

Wayne Gravely, Ranger center, seized up the game by intercepting an Austin pass, and from there time ran out.

Defensively the Rangers looked better on pass defense than in any other department. Jim Hamilton, Jim Brock, Wayne Gravely and Dean Faulkenberry repeatedly broke up the Austin passes.

The Rangers will travel to Oklahoma next week to take on Murry State College.

Pups Suffer First Loss to Eastland By 14 - 6 Score

The Ranger Junior High Pups got a fast six point lead Thursday afternoon against the Eastland Dogies, but failed to keep the lead as the Dogies racked up a 14 to 6 win.

The Pups blocked a Dogie punt on the Eastland 29 yard line to set up the Ranger score. L. H. Pounds scored from 11 yards out, running from the right halfback position on a reverse. The extra point try was no good.

From there it was Eastland all the way. They countered on the following kickoff, running the ball back to their 46 yard line, and from there Manuel Herrera, halfback went 46 yards for the tying 6 points. The extra point try was no good, and the first half ended with the 6-6 tie.

Soon after the half, Eastland began to roll again as Fuentes, the other Eastland halfback, intercepted a Ranger pass on the Eastland 36 yard line. This started a goal yard drive with Herrera again carrying the last yard for the score. Garry Graham, fullback, ran the extra point. That ended the scoring of the game, although Eastland had started another drive when time ran out they were on the Ranger 10 yard line.

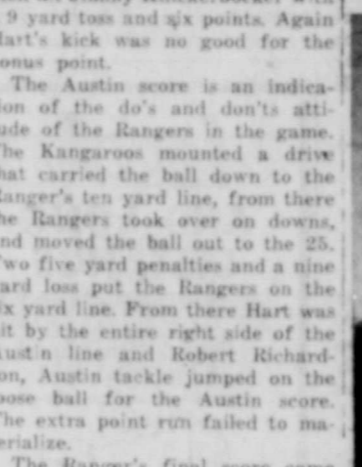
Six indictments

An Eastland County Grand Jury returned six true bills Thursday afternoon, then recessed until Oct. 2.

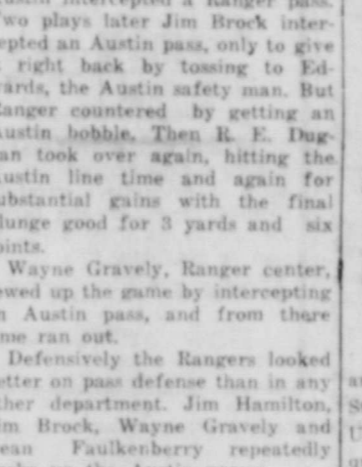
Two indictments were returned for driving while intoxicated, one for burglary, one for second offense DWI, one for swindling and one for theft of goats.

Ranger Group To Leave Sunday On Tour Of SAC

The group of Texans from this area that are to be guests of the Strategic Air Command of the United States Air Force and Convair Division plant in Fort Worth, will leave Sunday for Fort Worth where they will start the tour.

The tour will include touring and briefings at the Strategic Air Command Headquarters at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, Convair Air Force base and the Convair Division plant in Fort Worth. The group will be flown to Nebraska in a VC-97 Stratocruiser, the time in flight for the trip will be two and one-half hours.

Taxpayers Urged To Use Full Name In Correspondence

Taxpayers writing to the Internal Revenue Service or calling the Internal Revenue Service are advised to be very careful to use the same name that appears on their tax return, by Arthur E. Fagle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office.

The Dallas District office deals with more than two million taxpayers in the northern half of Texas. Fagle explained, "There are more than 2000 J. Jones who filed an income tax return in the Dallas District during the past year. The chances are good that there are several people with exactly the same name as yours who have filed a tax return. Thousands of taxpayers move each year so the Internal Revenue Service cannot rely upon the address as a method of identification. When taxpayers use an initial, a nickname, or only part of their name, this complicates matters and our problem of identifying the taxpayer becomes greater."

The Dallas District writes thousands of letters each year to taxpayers to determine whether he is the J. Jones who used to live on Main Street in Dallas or the J. Jones in East Texas or possibly West Texas.

If the tax people write you for information they would appreciate your returning a copy of their letter with your reply. The IRS letter helps determine which taxpayer the tax problem belongs to.
