

As I See Ranger

The champion fisherman this week is not the people that won the prizes at the Angler's Rodeo held at Lake Leon this past weekend, but Mark Calhoun, son of Bill and Arlene Calhoun. Mark wasn't entered in the Rodeo, and didn't make his catch in Lake Leon, although the fish he caught doubled the size of the fish that took first prize in the Rodeo. Mark's catch was a bass weighing ten and one-half pounds. He caught it on a cane pole and fishing with a minnow at a private lake near Mingo. Mark can put in a bid for the biggest catch in this area, for it is very unlikely that anyone will match his catch in the near future.

In number of entries, the Angler's Rodeo could be called a failure, but considering the weather conditions it will probably be called a success. Some 274 hearty souls braved a high wind and threatening thunderstorms to try to tempt fish to take a lure in the rodeo. The fish seemed to be willing to take a lure, but the weather prevented many of the more timid anglers from participating in the event. And the weather kept those that did enter, from working the lake in all but the most secluded and sheltered spots. Therefore, what had been anticipated as the biggest Rodeo of the Angler's Club had ever held turned out to be many anglers shy of last year's record number of entries.

He said that he asked a fellow worker who was a native of Amarillo, if it ever rained there. Bradshaw Issues Statement On Junior Colleges

Floyd Bradshaw, candidate for reelection for State Senator, District 22, issued the following statement concerning the support of Junior Colleges by the state. The State of Texas should assume full responsibility of financing Junior Colleges. The people of Ranger, Cisco and other areas of Texas that have the balance of the 33 Junior Colleges must be relieved of the local Junior College tax. You have educated hundreds of children that could never have gone to college had it not been that they could stay at home and get two years of college.

Last session the legislature created three new Senior Colleges. Next session the legislature will be asked to assume the total support of the University of Houston. This school has some 15,000 students. Why should the taxpayers of Ranger, Cisco and Weatherford be asked to shoulder the full support of Senior Colleges and only get partial state support for your Junior College? Junior Colleges are no longer regional colleges that teach local residents students but take them from any county in the state. The local people are taxed to support students from other counties who do not pay the Junior College Tax.

"The experience, seniority, and the fact that I hold important committee chairmanships such as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee will allow me to accomplish constructive programs for you," said Bradshaw.

Scott Bailey Issues Formal Announcement

Scott Bailey, 29 year old native resident of Cisco, issued the following formal statement in connection with his candidacy for State Representative of the 76th District, which is composed of Callahan, Eastland, and Shackelford Counties. Bailey, born and reared in Cisco, is one of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin D. Bailey Sr. He attended the Public Schools of Cisco and is a graduate of Cisco Jr. College. After graduation from Cisco Jr. College, Bailey attended the University of Texas and received a bachelor of science degree from North Texas State College. He resigned his position as a high school teacher of history and government in order to conduct a campaign for state representative.

Bailey, a veteran of the Korean Conflict, saw service as an enlisted man in the US Army. His service included active duty with the 17th Infantry Regiment in 1951 and when old Randolph College closed, reopened it as Cisco Junior College. He was a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, and was a Shriner. He served in the Army during World War I.



Plant Disease Of The Week

The leaves of oak trees are often attacked by fungal and bacterial leaf spots. The oak leaf diseases are more common in areas of high humidity or rainfall. While the diseases are not likely to kill a tree, they may weaken it and make it more susceptible to damage by drought, pests, winter injury or from other troubles.

Several of the leaf spots may cause premature leaf shedding. Leaf blight, another common disease, can be recognized by the depressions on the leaves of infected trees.

Small trees—up to five years or until they have established a good root system—should be protected. A Faxed or insoluble copper fungicide spray should be applied when the new leaves start to come out in the spring. One or two additional applications of the spray may be needed at three to four-week intervals. One gallon of the spray is needed for each foot of tree height for good coverage. Small trees can be sprayed with hand-operated, compressed air or hose-on sprayers. Special equipment is required for spraying the larger trees.

If bacterial leaf spots are absent, a combination of captan and zineb may be used throughout the remainder of the year as needed. If powdery mildew is a problem, karathane or wettable sulfur can be used. Karathane should be used with care since it may stain brick or other parts of houses.

Diseased leaves should be composted for at least two years before returning them to the soil around the trees. The proper use of water and fertilizer will help keep trees healthy and in top condition.

Local agents can supply information not only on oak leaf disease but also on many other diseases which attack trees and plants.

CELERY HAS VERSATILITY



Celery, which housewives usually fix in one or two ways, is to professional chefs one of the more versatile vegetables. Not only that, but all of the stalk (leaves, trimmings, and outer stems) can be utilized in tasty dishes.

Head chef Carl Buckel of St. Augustine's venerable Ponce de Leon Hotel shows off his culinary art in a galaxy of celery dishes. Appropriately, The Ponce is but a short distance from the Sanford celery area, one of Florida's two big celery regions.

In Chef Buckel's words here are nine of his celery recipes:

Cream of Celery Soup
Take the trimmings from a stalk of celery and chop finely together with a small onion. Braise with a little water and a tablespoon or so of butter. When celery and onion are transparent, sprinkle with a handful of flour and mix well. Cook slowly and cover for 10 minutes. Pour in a pint of white stock and bring to a boil. Cook 15 minutes more. Strain, removing bits of celery and onion. Pour into an equal quantity of milk. Return to heat but do not boil. Season with salt and pepper and a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Add a few of the small stem pieces of celery. Makes about a quart.

Celery Bordelaise
Clean and cut celery stalks into three inch lengths. Cook in a small amount of water for 5 minutes. Then braise celery in brown gravy or drippings from a beef roast until soft. Add some marrow from a beef bone. Place in a moderate oven for about 10 minutes.

Creamed Celery
Clean and cut celery stalks into one-inch lengths. Boil in a small amount of water until soft. Strain and mix with a cream sauce. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Stuffed Celery
Clean tender heart stalks of celery very thoroughly. Cream together equal parts of Roquefort and cream cheese. Stuff celery hearts.

Celery Mayonnaise
Dice 1/2 cup celery and 1/2 cup apple finely. Mix with cup of mayonnaise. Use as dressing on fruit or congealed soups.

Celery Stuffing
Use your favorite basic stuffing recipe, then add half as much chopped celery as stuffing by volume.

Essence of Celery
Use good rich chicken stock. Add plenty of chopped celery trimmings, and simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Strain and serve for soup course.

Celery Aspic
Take 1 quart essence of celery and add 2 ounces of plain gelatin. Simmer for 5 minutes. Pour into mold and cool. Put in refrigerator to set.

Fried Celery
Clean and cut stalk of celery into 3-inch lengths. Cook in a little water until soft. Cool. Dip piece in beaten egg then dredge with bread crumbs. Fry in deep fat until golden brown.
