

Court Workouts Begin For Dogs

The Ranger High School Bulldogs began workouts Tuesday for the 1960-61 basketball season. Returning lettermen making the initial workouts were Dean Richey, Charlie De Los Santos and Edward Mendez. James Henry was unable to make the first workout due to an operation on his arm, but he is expected to join the squad in a few days.

Reserve lettermen back from last year's squad were David Lockwood and Tommy Robinson. Three freshmen were present for the workout, were Arthur Mendoza, Johnny Comacho, Kyre Edmonds, and Richard Hicks. Freshman Ronnie Hinds is expected to join the squad later this week.

Four other newcomers are making a bid for the team. They are Bob Anderson, Richard Wilhelm, Jim Kounslar and Johnny Wells.

This year's squad will have above average height for a high school team, but will be lacking speed.

Coches Bill Young will have six boys on the squad that are six feet and over.

The team will be led by seniors Richey, 6 ft. 2 in., an all district selection last season and senior Henry, 5 ft. 11 in., a second team all district player last season. Two other seniors on the squad are Mendez, 5 ft. 10 in., and Richard Wilhelm, 5 ft. 7 in.

The three juniors on the squad will be Lockwood 6 ft. 3 in., and Robinson, 6 ft. 2 in., and Anderson, 6 ft.

Sophomores will be De Los Santos, 5 ft. 10 in., and Kounslar, 6 ft. 1 in., and Wells, 5 ft. 9 in.

The five freshmen are Mendoza, 6 ft., Kyre Edmonds, 5 ft. 11 in., Comacho, 5 ft. 8 in., Hinds, 5 ft. 8 in., and Hicks 5 ft. 8 in.

The squad will open their season with Eastland here November 18.

As I See Ranger

We will see the new look in the Ranger Police Department uniforms very soon. The Ranger policemen are going to replace their old visor type caps with western style hats. This improvement was introduced to the law enforcement agencies recently by the Texas Highway patrol. It is indeed an improvement in the uniform and I am glad that our policemen are following the trend.

The Ranger College Rangers have moved back into eighth place in the Junior Colleges in the South from a release for the National Junior College Athletic Association. Cameron is in first place in the northern division. If the Rangers could knock off the Cameron Aggies it would give them a big boost in the national ratings. It is possible that they could beat Cameron. They almost beat Tyler the leader in the south.

Here's something which may start you thinking. In the general election Tuesday a total of 7,074 votes were cast in Eastland County. Of that total vote more than half of the votes were cast in two precincts, Cisco and Eastland. Cisco had 2,039 voters and Eastland 1,671. That's a total of 3,710 votes which leaves just 3,364 of the other 11 precincts. It simply means that Eastland and Cisco now have the voting strength to elect any county official.

Of course that would mean the two larger towns would have to vote as a block, and they do not. Cisco is noted for block voting on occasions in county elections, but in Eastland you can't tell which way the voting will go. Both towns are on the conservative side, however. That accounts for the Republican's ticket's victory in this county. Nixon and Lodge led in Eastland County by exactly 300 votes. The GOP ticket built up a 482 vote lead in Eastland and Cisco alone, however. That means that the rest of the county favored Kennedy by a margin of 182 votes.

On the same subject, it is interesting to note that of the 7,074 county votes, 3,118 were cast in Precinct 1. Added to Eastland's 1,671 votes were Ranger's 1,257 and Olden's 190. The chart below shows the unfairness of the present commissioner precinct divisions in this county.

In other words the two southern precincts with 1,875 votes, have two commissioners on the court while the 3,118 voters in Precinct 1 have just one.

We have long maintained that the county needs re-districted. A fairer division, in our opinion, would be:

Deaton said the new Rotary president will be introduced by District Gov. Bob Blake of Brownwood.

Abej has been president and publisher of six newspapers in Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia, and he is now circulation director of the Reading (Pennsylvania) "Eagle-Times". He was born in Fort Worth, Texas, and attended Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois and the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Abej is president elect of Rotary International for the 1961-62 fiscal year. He will take office on July 1, 1961, as chief executive of that worldwide service club organization, which is comprised of more than 19,700 Rotary clubs

with a membership of nearly 500,000 Rotarians in 119 countries on six continents. For the 1960-61 fiscal year, he is a director of Rotary International and a member of the executive committee of the board of directors.

Abej has been a member of the Rotary Club of Reading since 1936 and is a past president of that club. He has served Rotary International as director, district governor and as committee chairman and member.

In Reading, Abej is a member of the advisory board of the Daniel Boone Council of the Boy Scouts of America and a member of the advisory board of the Salvation Army, and he has served as a committee member of the Young Men's Christian Association. He is a past director of the New York State Circulation Managers Association and of the Interstate Circulation Managers Association, and a director and past president of the Chamber of Commerce of Reading and Berks County, Pennsylvania. He has traveled extensively in 60 countries.

Revival In Progress At Assembly of God

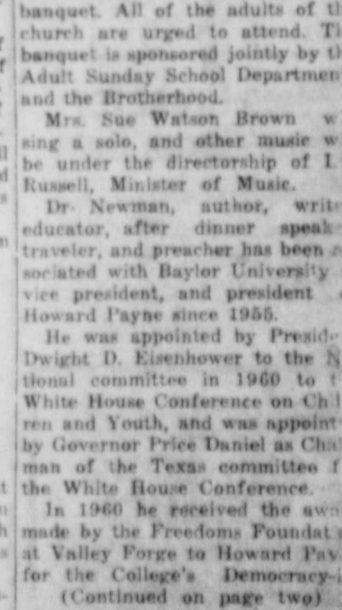
A revival is now in progress at the Assembly of God Church in Ranger and will continue through Sunday, November 20th. Services begin nightly at 7 p.m.

The 80,922 memberships assure Texas a place in the top five states in the American Farm Bureau Federation, the organization director said. Only Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, in that order, ranked ahead of Texas last year.
Ellis County now has the largest County Farm Bureau in Texas, with 1,545 members. A total of 111 of the 199 organized counties in the state exceeded the quotas this year, Shivers said.
The top ten counties, in terms of membership are: Ellis, 1,545; McLennan, 1,540; Hidalgo, 1,467; Williamson, 1,347; Hale, 1,274; Lubbock, 1,231; Bell, 1,221; Mills, 1,188; Ft. Bend, 1,151; and Hill, 1,115.
