## New Use for Wheat May Be Possible

USDA scientists have discovered a possible new use for wheat. In laboratory tests, acid-modified wheat flour has proved equal to commercial sizing material for imparting strength to paper.

Some papers made with modified flour graded 43 percent in bursting strength, 20 percent in tensile strength and 93 percent in folding endurance. Papers treated with modified-flour size were comparable to papers treated with widely used commercial sizes in brightness, opacity, freedom from discoloration and other desirable properties.

Successful chemical modification of wheat flour by reacting it with ethylene or propylene oxide was first reported by ARS in June of 1959. It was found that these chemically modified flours mix readily with water to form a free-flowing paste, a quality desirable in industrial paper making. USDA chemists also reported that chemically modified flour could be stored with a moisture content of 5 percent or less.

On the basis of recent performance tests with laboratory-scale equipment, it is expected that at least one of the acid-modified flours will perform satisfactorily in high-speed paper making machines, according to workers at the ARS's Northern Utilization Research and Development Division, Peoria, Ill.

Northern Laboratory scientists believe that if modified flours are introduced into the paper-making industry, substantial new markets for wheat could develop. Their interest in wheat flour for this purpose is based on availability of flour as a raw material in large quantities at relatively low cost, and the broad industrial potential of a material that combines starch and gluten, both valuable for adhesive qualities.

### Increased Pork Production Shows Profit in Texas

During 1959, Texas ranked 15th in pork production in the United States. The 409 million pound production figure was far short of the total consumption of pork in the state, says Lloyd Bergema, extension livestock marketing specialist of College Station.

During the period 1945-49, Texas hog growers produced an average annual 300,000 of 2.248 thousand head, which accounted for 2.6 percent of the total U. S. pig crop. During the period 1955-59, however, Texas accounted for only 1.8 percent of the total U. S. pig crop. The average annual pig crop for this period was 1,715 thousand head. This is a 24 percent cut-back in the annual state pig crop, in a 10-year period, explains Bergema.

It is somewhat surprising that Texas producers would reduce hog production to this extent when feed supplies are so abundant, the specialist observes. Grain sorghum production in the state during 1959 was more than twice the 1948-57 average. The estimated grain sorghum supply on Oct. 1 of this year was in excess of 9 million tons, or 60 percent of the grain sorghum supply on Oct. 1 United States. For the first 8 months of 1960, grain sorghum prices have averaged 82.5 percent that of corn.

Agriculture Gives  
Ten Year Outlook**

**SOARING SIXTIES?**  
With one year of the new decade now past, the question of just how high the 1960's will soar in the United States of course remains to be answered.  
There have been many forecasts, most of them optimistic, and one of the most optimistic of all is a study published by the U. S. Department of Labor, entitled "Manpower Challenge of the 1960's."  
The main thesis of the study is that American manpower potential is great enough, with an improving technology, to increase the production of goods and services by about 50 percent from 1960 to 1970. In other words, beginning the decade with a gross national product of \$500 billion, the study surmises to show a level of \$750 billion can be achieved by 1970.  
This would mean that by 1970 the expanding U. S. population could be provided with a 25 percent increase in its standard of living. The population is expected to increase from 180 to 208 million over the decade, a growth of 28 million, or 15 per cent.  
It is predicted that employment will continue to grow faster in the service industries than in the technology advances, proportionately fewer workers will be needed to produce the goods we need. More workers will be needed to provide the increasing services required as the standard of living goes up.  
The forecast is that biggest increases in demand for workers will be in occupations requiring the most in education and training. It is also foreseen that the shift from an agricultural economy to one that is predominantly industrial will continue.  
By 1970, according to the study, there will be about 80 million women workers, six million

more than in 1960. This would represent a 25 per cent increase for women, as compared with a 15 per cent increase for men. One out of every three workers will be a woman.  
During the past decade, professional, office sales workers as a group exceeded for the first time in U. S. history the number of workers employed in manual occupations, in skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled jobs. During the coming decade, this trend is expected to continue. The fastest growth will occur among professional and technical occupations, especially engineers, scientists and technicians.  
Such predictions are of major importance in planning for the future of agriculture as well as the future of U. S. business and other activities.

**Dried Honey  
Developed By  
USDA Engineers**

Dried honey, a new product resulting from a drying process devised by U. S. Department of Agriculture research engineers, gives bakers and candy makers an opportunity to use this wholesome sweetener to a greater extent than ever before.

When reconstituted with water, dried honey has substantially the flavor of fresh liquid honey, and its free-flowing granular form provides new convenience and economy in handling. This product is expected to increase the use of honey, especially in baking. The stickiness of liquid honey and its tendency to crystallize have so far limited its use by bakers.  
Dried honey may also be used in packaged baking mixes, for extra sales appeal and to give home-makers a convenient means of using honey in making. Honey adds to the flavor, color, texture, aroma, and keeping quality of baked goods.

The process used to dry honey is essentially the same as that for preparing full flavor fruit juice powders. It consists of vacuum-dehydrating liquid honey rapidly, in a mechanically agitated thin-film evaporator, to yield a molten mass nearly free of water. This molten material is then fed between two chilled metal rollers, which squeeze it into a thin sheet while cooling it to room temperature.

The sheet is taken from the chilling rolls in the form of brittle flakes, which are ground into a coarse powder suitable for packing in sealed containers. Because the drying process requires only a few seconds, most of the original honey flavor is retained.

Storage tests show that dried honey will retain its flavor and color for a year at normal room temperature. Caking occurs at higher temperatures, but it can be retarded by mixing sugar with the honey before drying or by keeping moisture low with a desiccant in the package.

Honey "essence," a byproduct, is obtained by condensing a n.d. collecting the water removed from the honey, then distilling from it a liquid with highly concentrated flavor. In making fruit juice powders, the essence is added to the powders to restore full flavor, but since dried honey has adequate aroma and flavor, the honey essence can be sold separately as a natural flavoring material.

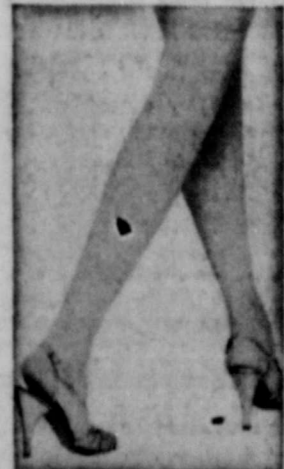
