Men often pray for unity and thank God for the many denominational churches at the same time that they might have the church of their choice. Such do not really seek unity, they want compromise. They are the ones that say we all can't understand the Bible alike. Such make a joke of the Bible, for it declares that we can understand it alike. "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one: as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us; that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." (John 17:20-21). Paul, under the direction of the Spirit, wrote these words. "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." (1 Cor. 1:10). Men can unite on what is taught in the Scriptures, but can't unite on what is not taught in the Scriptures. Men cannot unite on the doctrine of "Faith Only" for it is not taught in the Bible. Men cannot have harmony in teaching and practice until they are willing to give up the man made doctrines that caused the disunity. The Bible, by many, is interpreted in the light of human doctrines. In that case the human doctrine is the standard and not the Bible. If what they read in the Bible does not agree with their doctrine, then they change what the Bible says, and try to make it mean something else. For instance, some have tried for years to get the water out of (John 3:5). To them it means everything from the Spirit to the birth of a baby. Their doctrine, not God's, prevents them from accepting what the Bible teaches. Yet, they pray for unity! Remove the obstacles (Human Doctrines) and you can have the unity that Christ prayed for. Perhaps it is union, not unity that they seek. "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" (Amos 3:3).

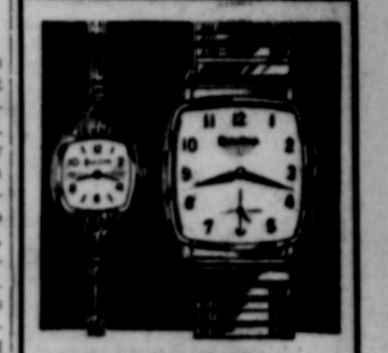
