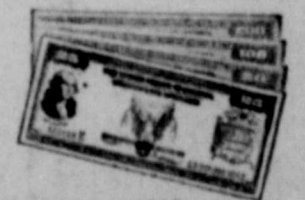

These Treats Make Hot Weather Bearable

BY DOROTHY MADDOX For a hot-day luncheon, frozen fruit salad serves as a combination main dish and dessert. Of course, a pitcher of iced tea goes with this luncheon, too. Ice Tea Recipe (10-12 servings) Pre-measure 1/2 cup loose tea (or remove tags from 15 tea-bags). Bring 1 quart of freshly drawn cold water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan. Remove from heat and while water is still bubbling, add all the tea at one time. Stir. Brew 5 minutes, uncovered. Stir and strain into pitcher holding an additional quart of freshly drawn cold water. (Do not refrigerate.) Serve in ice-filled glasses, with lemon and sugar to taste. Frozen Fruit Salad (About 8 servings) One can (1 pound 14-ounce) fruit cocktail, 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 1/2 cup liquid from fruit, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 package (3-ounce) cream cheese, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 8 marshmallows, quartered, 1 cup heavy cream, whipped. Drain fruit cocktail, saving 1/4 cup liquid. Sprinkle gelatin over 1/4 cup of liquid. Add sugar to the remaining 1/4 cup liquid and heat; pour over gelatin. Combine cheese and mayonnaise; stir in gelatin mixture, mixing until smooth. Combine in a 6-cup mold or refrigerator tray. Freeze, without stirring, until firm. Serve on salad greens.

Motorists Asked To Get Vehicles Inspected Early

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today urged motorists to secure their 1961 vehicle inspection stickers "before the time gets short and the lines get long." Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. said approximately half of the inspection period has expired and only about one-third of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations when the April 15 deadline approaches. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law, Garrison said. "The 4,800 authorized inspection stations over the state are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline," he said.

Garrison called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to five per cent. "The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident," he pointed out.

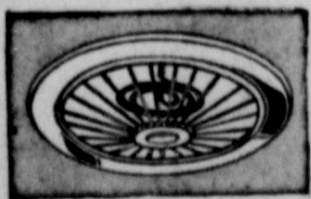

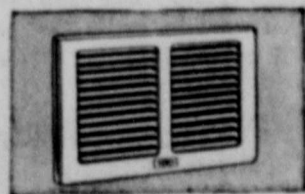

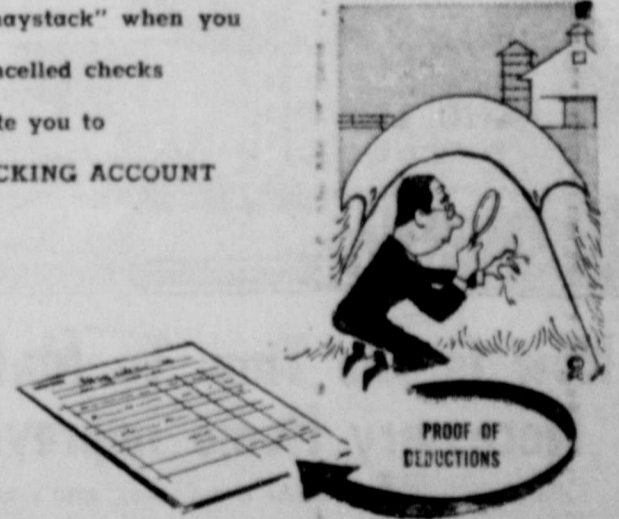

Apple Slices Are Fine With Mixed Cheese Dip

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

Ever serve "applesnacks"? They are crisp slices of red delicious apples for the nibbling tray served with an interesting three-cheese dunk. Friends in the State of Washington gave us this idea.

Three-Cheese Dunk
One cup cottage cheese, well drained, 1 cup grated cheddar cheese, 2 ounces bleu cheese, mashed, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon horseradish, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 3 green onions, finely chopped, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, pepper. Blend cheeses together. Add remaining ingredients. Pile in bowl. Serve with crisp, fresh apple slices.

Then from California came this salad recipe:

Belvedere Salad (4-6 generous servings)

Three-quarters cup macaroni, 1 cup fine olives, 1 (8 1/2-ounce or 2-ounce) can tuna, 2 hard-boiled eggs, 2 cups finely shredded cabbage, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt. Cook macaroni in boiling

coarsely. Dice eggs. Combine macaroni, olives, tuna, eggs and cabbage. Blend mayonnaise, mustard, vinegar and salt, and toss lightly with salad mixture. Drain oil from tuna, and flake.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

A staggering 11.7 billion dollars are spent for meals outside of the home each year in the United States among more than 200,000 eating places including restaurants, cafeterias, lunch counters and hot dog stands according to Texas Restaurant Association estimates.

The food service industry now ranks fourth among all American industries accounting for billions of dollars in buildings, equipment and payroll each year.

Estimates place the number of eating establishments in Texas around 12,000 to 13,000. Assuring safe standards and quality of this vast amount of food service is the responsibility of food inspectors operating under local ordinances.

Generally local ordinances are based on minimum standards and recommendations set by State and national health authorities who keep abreast of latest developments in the food handling industry.

Education is the keynote of safe food handling practices in local areas. Local health departments conduct food-handling courses aimed at instructing foodhandlers in safe methods of food service—ranging from the right way to wash glasses to the proper temperature for storing lettuce.

For areas not served by a local health department or maintaining its own food service course, the State Health Department's Public Health Education Division maintains a team of highly trained foodhandling instructors who travel about the State conducting

food handling courses in cities of varying population.

These three-day courses are directed toward every phase of food service, but concentrate on safe and sanitary handling of various kinds of food which need special care and attention.

The major rule is: hot things, hot; and cold things, cold. The urgency for proper sterilization of utensils is also stressed and the various bacteria responsible for the majority of food poisoning are described and identified.

Understanding and appreciating the danger existing in food contaminated with bacteria organisms enables the food handler to conscientiously guard against them for the better health of his customers. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division Texas State Department of Health.)
