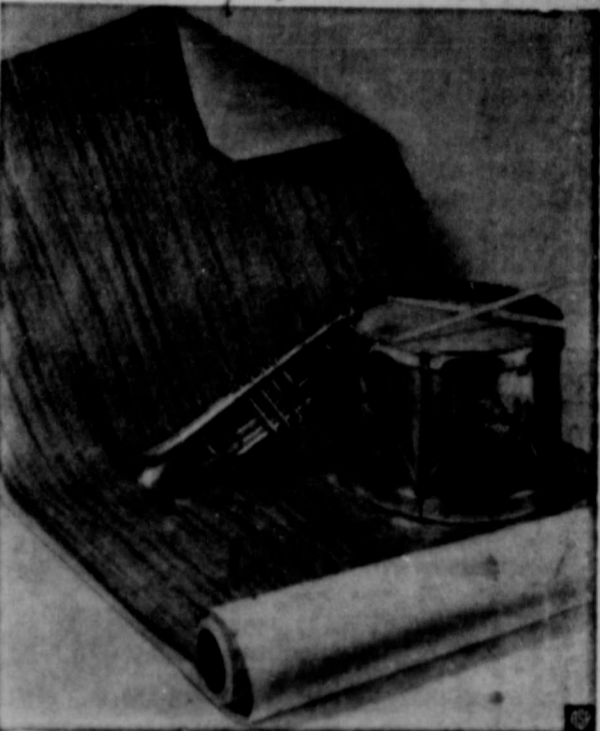

### Plastics Give Boys Room To Grow
