# Let's Look At Ranger

(For the past several weeks this column has been looking at Ranger. Now, for a change, let's look at Ranger through the eyes of a relatively newcomer to our city. The following article was written by Mrs. Harold Prescott, and bears out some of the points that we have been trying to get over for the past several weeks.)

#### A LOOK AT RANGER BY A NEWCOMER

Nestled snugly against the hills of time, wrapped in the dreams of past glories, sleeping beneath tranquil skies, you are a veritable Shangri-La. Separated from the outside world and all its problems of progress by a chasm of indifference and an inability to face the fact that time will not stand still. Remote and unreachable in your eternal existence, you do not realize that the only difference between a rut and a grave are its dimensions. Rest in Peace!

The restful tempo of your daily life is as restful as a rocking chair and as lulling to ones ambitions. Would that the world was not engaged in a death struggle for the survival of the human race, then this town could be the recovery ward for all strife torn victims of the battle of daily living. Would that the dire problems that face those outside your own little world could never affect the citizenry here in, but unfortunately, the immunity which protects you from the outburst of energy of new generations or the constructive criticisms of new citizens, is after all an aura of the imagination and will not protect against the fall-out of progress explosions of nearby communities, nor will it serve as a respiratory aid when you are choking on the dust of progress kicked up by neighboring towns. You will become a ghost town literally as well as figuretively.

There is no town in existence that has better people than this one. Friendly and warm, they live a way of life that has become almost non-existent in our modern society of dishonesty, avarice, low principlos and even lower morality. People here are always ready to help the as fortunate, assist others in time of trouble and sorrow, willing to walk the extra mile for a friend. It has been said that a town is only as big as its people but that does not hold true here, for the biggest people in the world live in this town. The churches here are indicative of their religious nature. The schools display partial interest on part of the citizenry toward education. Civic clubs are present as are social and welfare organizations. Why then the business inertia that permethe town? Why the somnolent approach to productive growth? Why the reluctance to improve?

Experience has proved that where stagnation of a town exists, a ottle-neck is present, Usually at the top. Do we have one here? The bottle-neck is a person or persons, hungry for prestige and power, who order to sate their napoleonic desires, manages to get their grimy little hands around the throat of a town and slowly squeezes it

With the wealth of assets this town holds, the wonderful people who live here, the location of the town itself on two major arteries of transportation, its proximity to larger cities, an ample supply of fuel and water, there is no reason why this could not be a flourishing and thriving community, rather than one whose census is dropping rapidly. Softeone has failed this town and its people, not through lack of ability, but rather through lack of desire. The citizens of this town deserve the right to good business, in a clean well kept town with streets in good repair, a park equipped with playground material, markers on residential streets and most important of all, adequate educational facilities for their children.
