Wild Animals Not for Pets Say Warden

Warnings that individuals who catch young wildlife for pets or for sale are being issued by the Game and Fish Commission. "We get complaints every day that persons have been picking up young of the wild, particularly fawns," says J. B. Phillips, assistant director. "This is strictly against the law and wardens have been instructed to make arrests and file cases."

Every day complaints come in that fawns have been picked up, some of them when the mother deer is close by. He pointed out that the wild animal usually takes care of itself much better if left alone. Permits are required for raising wildlife in captivity and the permit must be held before the animal is captured.

At the same time, complaints also are being filed against persons catching protected birds or destroying nests. Among them were several filed in Austin against persons who invaded a shallow rookery on the Highland Lakes with air rifles and sling shots.

Baby birds are used to bait trot lines. If the bird is a protected species complaints are filed and the guilty person usually is given a stiff fine.

Public Urged to Visit Dairies During June

The dairy industry is big; it's essential, modern, diversified and has stability, said A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist, today as Texas and the nation celebrates the silver anniversary of June Dairy Month.

Dairying, he added, is the greatest single source of farm income in America. One out of every five dollars in cash receipts from farm products comes from dairymen. The dairy industry, Meekma noted, utilizes milk production from 17 million cows on more than a million of the nation's farms. The milk is processed in approximately 35,000 dairy plants and the equivalent of 60 billion quarts, in the form of fluid milk and its products is distributed annually to the nation's customers.

Sales of milk and dairy cattle for beef purposes in 1959, Meekma said, amounted to more than \$6 1/2 billions and represented 19.9 percent of all cash farm receipts for that year.

Driver and Vehicle Records Division

(Editor's Note: Following is the second of a series of articles appearing in this newspaper detailing the evolution and organization of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the numerous vital services this agency provides for the people of Texas.)

The Driver and Vehicle Records Division, composed of four bureaus, is charged with the basic responsibility of enforcement and administration of the drivers license, motor vehicle inspection and the safety responsibility laws of Texas.

Specific duties performed are those of issuance of licenses, evaluation of records in traffic safety matters, maintenance of files on drivers and vehicles, identification of problem drivers and the initiation of corrective or suspension action against those motor vehicle operators who either will not or cannot adhere to statutory minimum standards established to insure an orderly and safe flow of traffic on the public streets and highways.

Approximately 33,000 reports, applications and other type communications are received daily for analysis, evaluation, processing, issuance of license, filing or preparation of replies by the technical and clerical personnel of this division.

License Issuance and Driver Records Bureau
As of Aug. 31, 1960, there were 4,567,899 currently licensed drivers operating motor vehicles on the public streets and highways of Texas. During the past two year period, this bureau processed applications and issued licenses to 5,614,531 Texas drivers, including 552,825 original permits issued to new drivers in the state. Slightly more than 2,532,000 reported incidents of motor vehicle accident involvement and convictions on moving traffic law violation charges were received and placed in the individual case history files of those persons experiencing such driving difficulties.

Driving records were checked and information provided in response to 561,453 requests received from licensees, enforcement agencies and courts throughout the state. Abstracts of driving records were prepared and forwarded to various individuals, agencies and organizations in response to 1,474,552 applications received during the past two year period. Filing of reported incidents of motor vehicle accidents and moving traffic law violation convictions in the license records of Texas drivers resulted in the files of 207,120 such persons being referred to the Driver Improvement and Control Bureau for initiation of improvement or corrective action.

The magnitude of the records operation is reflected by the tremendous increase in the number of licensed drivers in the past 10 years—from 2,715,231 as of Aug. 31, 1950, to 4,567,899 on Aug. 31, 1960.

This continuing increase which has brought more than 1,000,000 additional records into the bureau since the Department moved into its present quarters in October, 1955, has created a serious space problem.

Driver Improvement and Control Bureau

During the immediate past biennium, this bureau analyzed, evaluated and initiated improvement or control actions against 207,120 Texas drivers whose licensing records indicated inability or unwillingness to share the streets and highways with others in a safe and orderly manner.

The effectiveness of the improvement approach, rather than suspension of driving privilege, is reflected by the fact that it became necessary to suspend the licenses of only 50,930 of those persons who were either convicted on charges which carry a mandatory suspension of license or failed to respond to the various attempts to improve substandard driving practices.

Other improvement actions initiated against those licenses with less extensive adverse performance records included the writing of safety or remainder letters to 39,695 drivers, the citation of 50,678 licensees to report for review or special examination, personal interview with 29,598 drivers and the filing of a petition for formal hearing in 16,719 cases. A total of 10,632 Texas drivers were placed on probation during this period.

Safety Responsibility Bureau
In the administration of the Safety Responsibility Act, it is necessary for this bureau to review, evaluate and establish case files in 251,212 reported incidents of motor vehicle accident involvement during the past two year period.

Suspension of driver licenses and motor vehicle registrations were involved in 62,052 of those cases after operators and owners of motor vehicles failed to provide evidence of financial ability to take care of damages sustained by others in one of the manners prescribed by statute, in response to a written notification from the department.

Police demand orders were prepared and forwarded to enforcement agencies for service in 35,127 cases when persons suspended for non-compliance with the requirements of the Safety Responsibility Act failed or refused to surrender driver licenses or motor vehicle registrations, after proper written demand had been made.

Morris Newnham Forms New Ice Machine Corp.

Morris Newnham of the Ranger Frozen Food Co., has recently returned from the National Restaurant Convention held in Chicago, Ill.

He was among the 45,000 restaurant owners and equipment dealers who attended the convention.

Newnham viewed the new ice-making equipment from every manufacturer in the United States. He has formed a new corporation for renting, sales, and service of ice making equipment. The new corporation will be distributors for three major ice making machines. The corporation will have as their bases of operation, Ranger and Dallas. The new corporation, Ice Machines, Incorporated, has one half of Texas as their sales territory. Distribution area will be from Shreveport, La., to Midland, Texas, south to Waco and north to the Oklahoma border.

Ranger Man Receives State Board Citation

E. E. Crawford of Ranger, a pharmacist for 50 years, recently received a citation of achievement from the State Board of Pharmacy, Austin.

The citation reads in part, "for having faithfully fulfilled 50 years of devoted service; and through continued interest has made important contributions to the medical and technical progress of pharmacy; in recognition of a long and meritorious career, we, the State Board of Pharmacists present to him this citation of Achievement."

Crawford came to Ranger in 1918 and has been in the drug store business continually since that date except for a period in 1958 when he thought to retire but later decided to become active again.

Condition of five persons injured in a three-car crash a few feet outside of the Eastland city limits was described as improved today.

Three of the injured were from Eastland and two from Arizona. C. W. Hoffmann Jr., 21, of Eastland, underwent an operation Monday on his knee. He suffered a fractured knee cap and cuts and is reported to be in good condition.

Donna Pugh, 18, also of Eastland, suffered a fractured jaw and cuts. Jamie Stamey, 19, received severe head cuts and bruises. Miss Stamey has been released from the hospital.

Wilma Huggett was transferred to Harris Hospital at Fort Worth Monday. She remains in serious condition with a double jaw fracture, broken ankle and lacerations. She was driver of the Arizona car.

Ann Jorgenson, a passenger in the Arizona car, remains in Eastland Hospital. She suffered a dis-

(Continued from page one) and established individual files on 9,150 approved motor vehicle inspection stations operated in Texas during the past two year period. Hundreds of requests for necessary supplies and certification stickers used by the inspection stations were handled on a daily basis. In tabulating and auditing weekly reports submitted by each of the licensed motor vehicle inspection stations, it was ascertained that adjustments as repairs were required on 3,606,423 of the 8,347,894 vehicles inspected during this two year period before they could meet the minimum standards for approval as safe vehicles. It was necessary to suspend the licenses of 164 inspection stations and to disqualify 169 mechanics for failing or refusing to adhere to minimum inspection standards, procedures and practices during the past biennium.

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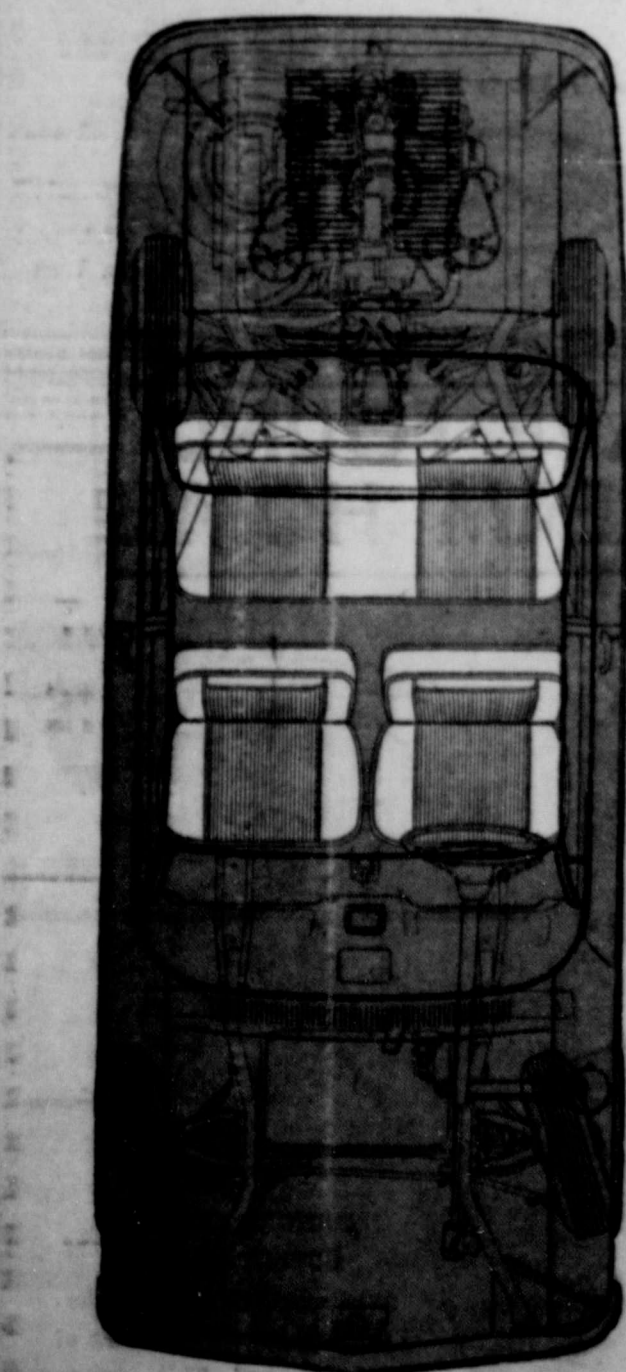
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
