ALFALFA WILLIAM PLANS INVASION OF TEXAS.

Alfalfa Bill Murray, governor of Oklahoma and selfelected idol of the farmers of the United States, is a native Texan. He is out for the "presidency or nothing." He was born in Grayson county. He was educated in Texas. His history is a household word in the Southwest. Now he hopes to gather in a few delegates to the Chicago convention to push along his cause when the hour of balloting comes. Hugh C. Jones is the vice chairman of the Oklahoma board of public affairs. He was the speaker for the state-wide Murray-for-president rally at Eastland last week. He addressed a large crowd at Cisco and extolled the virtues as well as the qualifications of Alfalfa William. Hugh C. Jones was born at Kentuckyton in Grayson county and was reared in McLennan county. He moved to Oklahoma in 1906. He had held many offices including that of law-making, a member of the state board of education. and when Alfalfa William captured the governorship among the first appointments was that of Jones, who was named vice-chairman of the state board of public affairs. These Oklahoma officials who are native sons of Texas worked in Texas cotton fields and on ranches in their boyhood years and are said to be strong for the grass rooters and their material and moral uplift.

Regardless of the McAdoo declarations on Texas soil, the North Dakotans preferred a New Yorker as their presidential candidate and when they entered the primaries they swatted with their ballots an idol of the grass rooters of the Southwest.

Washington bureau lets it be known that a bill drastically cutsing salaries of all government employes is being drafted by the special house economy committee which is a demoeratic committee. Chairman Byrns, who is a Tennessee democrat, by the way, predicts a bill cutting salaries prob-Estimates made by Chairman Byrns as to savings to the government by the salary slashes ranged from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 depending on the percentage of cuts to be made. 

YOAKUM, Texas. L. G. Wade YOAKUM, Texas. L. G. Wade, a postal employe here who has successfully predicted five earthquakes in Is months as a result of his hobby of studying such earth movements, warned today that temblors may be expected at any time along the Louisiana and Texas gulf coast.

With only a high school education, Wade has evolved the theory that the prediction of tremors rests upon the composition of matter which responds to variations in gravitation and magnetic influence.

Using his theory, Wade reports that the coastal area of Texas and Louisiana now appear to be shifting to the southeast, with a source of pressure from the underground strata to the northwest. These conditions cause him to predict a quake in this region in the near future.

Although Wade has been able to accurately foretell five tremors in 19 months, he says it is not yet possible to determine future occurences to the exact minute and hour. He believes he can define the area where they will occur and fix the time within

By the use of his theory, Wade wrote an article in the spring of 1931 predicting that temblors would be felt in Southwest Texas in the fall of 1931.


