

TRANSFORMATION OF A NATION'S HOPES

A year ago we in Texas straggled haltingly toward the holiday period and toward the climax of economic chaos, with only the prospect of a change at Washington holding forth a hope of stability.

Conditions were getting steadily worse, as President Hover called in the Wiggin, Mitchell, Vanderlip, Mellon crowd to contribute their disinterested services to the financial crisis.

How vast the change!

Now, with confidence restored, hope revived, the nation is going ahead in practical dealing with the heritage of grief, with plans for the recovery. The nation is being guided toward the goal of social prestige, instead of being dragged along by government-supported privilege and self-serving

The people of America, fred from domination of powerful, ruthless privilege, freed from governmental control impotent in the hands of the privileged class it recognized and paid homage to, have worked out to a degree the beginning of their own recovery. 


