Glenn Hickman was the victor in the race for County and District Clerk, defeating the incumbent, W. F. Cone. Hickman is at present, tax assessor. This office has been consolidated with that of Sheriff and Tax Collector.
In Precinct No. 4 Andrew Acker of Nazareth was the winner over L. O. Norman o Arney for Commissioner. Acker will succeed E. C. Burks, who was not a candidate.

THINGS TO PLANT IN FALL GARDEN

Carrots if planted in fall will withstand cooler weather than turnips. Plant them in very finely pulverized land and cover lightly with powdered dirt 3-8 inches deep, wet sacks kept over rows will help to keep tiny seed moist till up.
Beets, Detroit Dark Red Varjety will also stand as much cold as turnips. Remember beet seed are in seed pods and should be broken by rolling. When beets are 3 inches high thin them to 4 inches apart in row to hasten maturity.
Swiss chard should be included in the winter garden. Cold weather has little effect on this vegetable.
Pinto beans planted now will yield tender snap beans before frost.
Chinese Red Rose winter radish planted now will yield tender radishes from November to January.
Ever bearing spinach should be included in fall planting.
Hot beds should be prepared now and seeded in lettuce, leafy variety and in spinach. These leafy vegetables if properly cared for will furnish the table with a fresh, crisp salad, so necessary to health, each day.
Fall garden is a waste of time and effort unless soil is thoroughly prepared. In turning under a growth of weeds or dried vegetables where most of us go wrong. By cutting the weeds and throwing them over the fence before plowing is begun you have taken the first step toward a successful garden. The turned under weeds, heat, dry out and prevent cultivation. Soil for fall garden should be very finely pulverized, almost as fine as powder, before seeds are sown. Wet gunny sacks kept over seed beds until plants are up are a great help in very hot weather. By observing a few precautions, it is entirely possible to have a fall garden planted now. This will help make up for the deficiency in summer gardens.

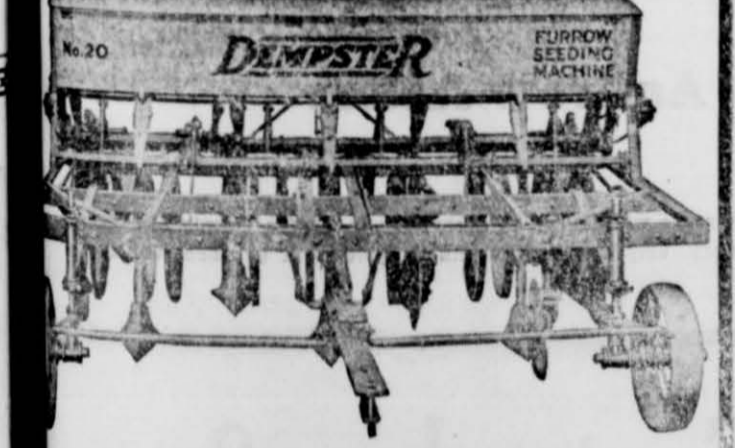

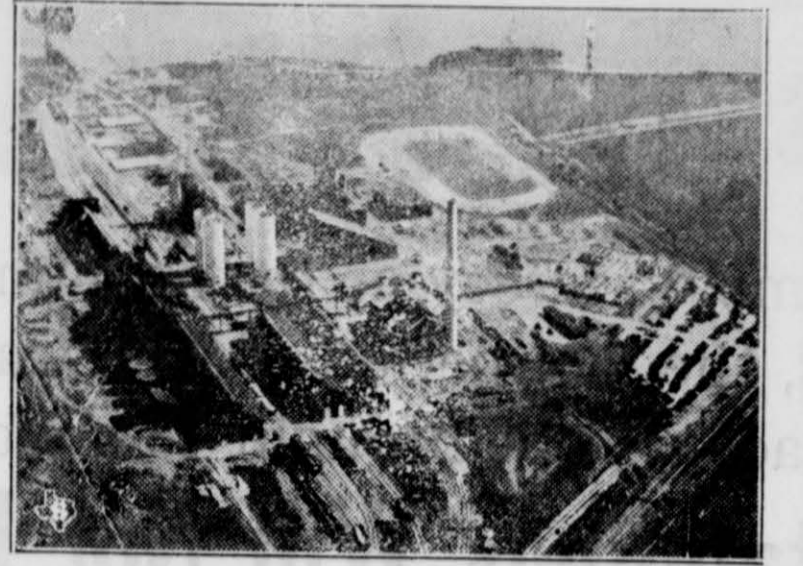

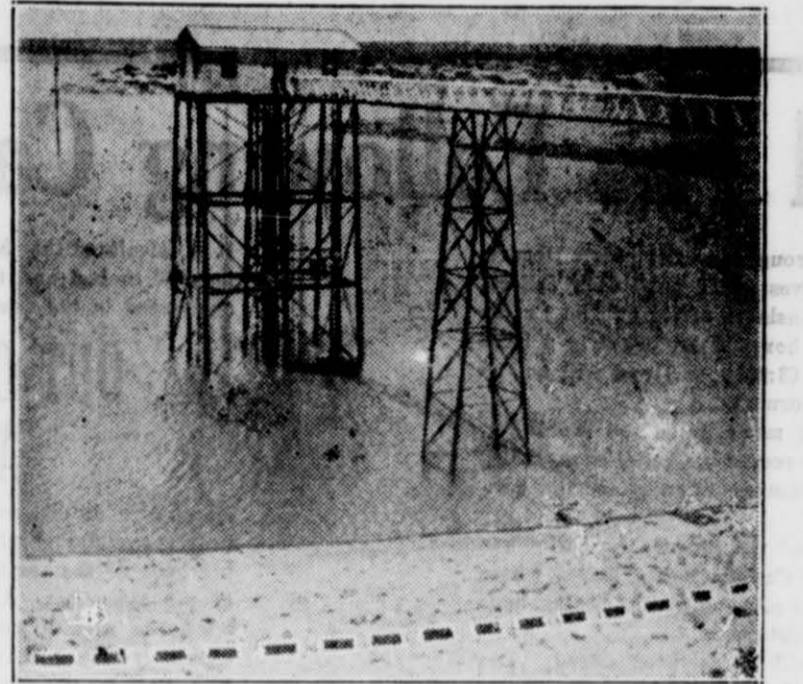

Rice Gets Plenty of Water When Gates Jam



The Gulf Coast Water Company of Bay City, Texas, bought 14,000-acre feet of water (5,000,000,000 gallons) from Lake Brownwood in a unique experiment. Lake Brownwood's flood gates were opened to allow the water to run 450 miles down the Colorado River to Wharton and Matagorda counties where it would be pumped out and used to irrigate the drought-stricken rice. Somehow the flood gates jammed and could not be shut. On July 14, more than 52,000-acre feet of water had gone from Lake Brownwood. Read The Following Carefully

No subscriptions whatever will be accepted through the Campaign Department this week but instead, candidates themselves will deposit their collections in the sealed ballot box—located in the business office of The Castro County News during banking hours only. The box will be locked in a bank vault at the end of each day's banking hours (3:40 p. m.) and will not be brought out again until the banks open next morning. By this plan no one, not even the Campaign manager or the Publisher, can possibly know the voting strength of the respective candidates, which precludes any possibility of favoritism and insures fairness to the greatest degree. Locked and sealed, with the key in possession of the Judges, the ballot box has been placed in the business office of The Castro County News, where it will remain each day from 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. until the closing hour of the campaign—8 o'clock Saturday night, September 5. When the final hour arrives, the campaign will be declared closed. The Judges will break the seals, unlock the box and immediately thereafter, or as soon as the votes can be issued on subscriptions contained therein, the last count will begin. The winners will be determined by merely adding the published vote totals, which appear in their final form in today's issue, to reserve votes and those contained in the ballot box. There will be no waiting; no complicated count—simply a matter of adding the totals and announcing the winners.
