O. C. Axtell In Precinct 2 For Commissioner

The number of candidates for Commissioner from precinct No. 2 was raised to three this week with the announcement of Mr. O. C. Axtell, pioneer Castro county farmer who lives two miles west of Sunnyside.

Mr. Axtell has been a resident of the county 25 years, is well known throughout this section of the Panhandle and is at present the Treasurer of the local county Wheat Allotment Committee.

During his residence in the county, Mr. Axtell has been active in civic matters, and has served as a school trustee for years.

"The Commissioner's office is one of the most important, to my mind, of any in the state," Mr. Axtell said, "because the spending of the people's money is entrusted to the Commissioner's Court. If the people of my precinct see fit to elect me as their representative on the court, I will do my best to render efficient and courteous service. I believe in rigid economy in the administration of county affairs and will strive to be fair to all."

PCA FILLS NEED FOR SHORT TERM CREDIT

The 1934 crop season will mean the beginning of a better system of credit for many farmers who are preparing to finance the year's farming by means of short term loans through the production credit associations which are being organized under the Farm Credit Administration throughout this State.

Under the Farm Credit Administration the Federal Land Bank of Houston will continue to make long term real estate mortgage loans; but the administration is also providing a long need system of short term production credit for farmers and stockmen. Loans to be used for producing crops and for feeding, raising and fattening of livestock. This is a comprehensive credit system and it is designed to be permanent.

Farmers and stockmen in this ally will be served by the new Production Credit Association which was chartered on January 6, 1934.

Information relating to these production loans may be obtained from the office of county Agent E W Thomas.

No Loans To Those Who Increase Acres

Houston, Feb. 21.—In order to facilitate cooperation with the production control program of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in counties where production control associations have not yet been set up, S. M. Garwood, production credit commissioner of the Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C., has instructed officials of local production credit associations covering such counties, to avoid making loans to farmers who are preparing to increase their production contrary to the program of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Through the county production control associations which are being set up, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration will prepare lists by counties containing the names of producers of particular agricultural product who are cooperating in the production control program.

As soon as the county council begins to function each applicant for a loan from a production credit association must show that he is on an approved list of members of a county production control organization, or present a certificate from the organization showing that he is not increasing production contrary to the program of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The appearance of an applicant's name on a list, or a certificate issued by the county council, shall be accepted by the production credit association as satisfactory evidence that the applicant is eligible for a loan in so far as his cooperation in the production control program is concerned.

Information as to who are representatives of such county councils, authorized to furnish such certificates, may be obtained from the county agricultural agent in each county, or from the State Director of the Agricultural Extension Service.

Order Sounds Death Knell Of CWA

An order to set up machinery to reduce local CWA forces was received this week from State headquarters, and was considered by local officials as sounding the death knell of the CWA in Castro county.

Definite instructions as to how much the work would be curtailed were not given, but it is believed that Castro county will be subject to the 10 per cent weekly cut in man allotment that is to become effective over the entire United States until the CWA has breathed its last.

For the present Castro county has an allotment of 185 men. A 10 per cent cut in forces would reduce this quota 18 or 19 men each week. Orders have been given to investigate all cases thoroughly, and that an attempt be made to cut off the less needy of the workers first, leaving the ones wholly dependent upon day labor, with no other means of support on the work a while longer.

Instructions are not as yet definite enough to firmly establish the future policy the CWA is to pursue in this county.

But it is fully expected that work will decline rapidly here, local officials said.

Year-Round Culling Brings Chicken Profits



Culling the hens four times a year should be done regularly by poultrymen, if star layers who set up profits are to be eliminated. In November, February, May and August, poultrymen should determine if each hen is laying. Those laying in November are excellent hens. Those not laying in February or May should be sold or eaten. Hens laying at all four cullings should be kept for breeders as well as layers. Above is a typical Texas culling scene. The fowling go to market in the cars.
