The wondering attention of the nation again centers upon Tennessee. The objects of interest this time are rawboned, 22-year-old mountain lad and his 9-year-old, golden-haired child bride.

It was only a few days ago that news of this unusual marriage trickled to the outside world, but it already is creating a flood of criticism.

Though the girl's parents and her brawny husband can see nothing strange about the romance, theirs being a region in which girls marry young, ministers and social workers from afar are castigating it as a crime against society, and blaming the state for permitting such al-

Before the whole affair dies down, the nation may receive another unfortunate impression of the state of Tennessee. Another-because the notorious "Monkey Trial" also gave it something of a black-eye.
