This was slightly smaller than the 1925-29 average of 23 per 1,000 and considerably less than the 1932 depression record of 54 per 1,000. Most of the foreclosares still are by commercial banks and insurance companies.

One out of every five farms that changed hands last year was trial. classed by the bureau of agricul tural economies as a "force sale." The 1930-34 average wa one out of every four, compare with one out of every 28 in 1910-

"In spite of the efforts of Federal credit agencies to relieve the till widespread evidence that the mortgage debt is a major problem

n the farm," the bureau said. Between 1930 and 1939 the total farm mortgage debt was re uced from \$9,600,000,000 100,000,000, a reduction of per cent. This reduction, the bereau said, was almost entirely the result of forced selling.

Where Does Everybody Stand?

Nothing serves to illustrate more piognantly the lack of direction in the world's current wars than the vacillating alliances among nations. Sacred principles may not be so much at issue as purely material and imperialistic de-

In a general way, we are told, it is democracy against Fascism. Do or die. Fight to the finish. On that basis, the sides ought to be fairly easy to line up: England, France and China on the side of democracy, among the big powers; Germany, Italy, Japan with recently adopted Russia on the Fascist side. There should be a clear line of demarcation, with the opposing ideologies as represented by these nations pitted agains each oher.

Try it out on paper, and see how it works. With democracies labeled "D" and pro-Fascist nations tagged "F," this will give you a rough a idea:

1. Germany (F), Italy (F) and Japan (F) together in anti-Comintern pact.

2. Germany (F) signs up with Russia (F).

Italy (F) and Japan (F) oppose Russia (F).

4. France (D) and England (D) oppose Germany (F).

5. Britain (D) and France (D) are being wooed by Japan (F).

6. Germany (F) gives assistance to China (D) in war against Japan (F).

Russia (F) fights Finland (D). 8. Italy (F) aids Finland (D).

How can the baffled little man who's standing along the ropes with a worried look on his brow choose sides? If he's one of the democratic neutrals, he has a general idea that he's rooting for the allies. But he can't be sure. Britain and France are said to be lending receptive ears to Japan, while Germany, arch enemy of democracy, is in there pitching for China. It doesn't add up.

Maybe democracy isn't in the scrap at all. It could be that this highly illusive national virtue ducked out just in time and is even now hiding behind an island somewhere, resentful that its name is being used in vain over the spilled blood of a lot of nice young men.

Bored On Sunday? Try Rattler Hunt

By United Press SWEETWATER, Tex.-Persons who suffer from Sunday afternoon boredom should take a tip from J. H. Vanlandingham, Sweetwater electrician. He hunts rattlesnakes.

The Sweetwater man, with T. J. Riddle and Martin Bensen of Winters, chose the first spring-like Sunday afternoon of the year to practice their dangerous sport. The score: 31 rattlesnakes killed. nobody bitten.

The hunters' equipment was a .22 caliber rifle, a hand-mirror, and a long stick with a wire loop on one end. Forearmed with the knowledge that snakes hibernate in rocky dens during cold weather and arouse themselves at the first signs of warm weather, the hunters begin their search on the Ray Boothe Ranch south of Sweetwat-

At the first likely-looking "den," Vanlandingham took out his mirror, reflected sunlight into the dark cavern and saw one sleepy rattler. The snake was killed with the rifle, and pulled from his hiding place by means of the wire-looped stick.

The snake-shooters almost got more than they could handle at the next "den." The light was reflected into the hole and the three men saw a mass of writhing rattlers. One by one, the snakes were killed with the rifle and their bodies pulled from the darkness with

the wire loop. When the den was empty, the three men found they had killed 31 snakes-ranging from 20 to 70 inches in length.
