A placard cadng "Horse meat served here n letters four by one-half inche nust be posted where customer

All living groups, such as so orities, co-operatives and dormi private homes, and the State law does not require them to reveal whether or not they are serving horse meat.

Horse meat is not new to the meat markets. It cost more than beef in Europe, following World War I, and has been sold for sev eral years in Oregon and Wash ington, Adams said.

The local markets get their meat from animals raised and slaughtered in Nevada, where the central packing house is located. An average horse yields approximately 800 pounds of edible

Moscow Covernment Now Frowns on Franco Spain Rail Union Chiefs Claim Road Seizure Unnecessary

• WASHINGTON-The sharp claws of the Russian bear, victory-bound across the marshes of Poland, are stretching southward toward Spain-which Moscow considers not only distinctly unneutral but a silent ally of Adolf Hitler.

Only the other day, the Soviet Information Bulletin, official publication of the Russian embassy in Washington, thrust truculent criticism at the Madrid government of Generalissimo Francisco

The semi-diplomatic incident came on top of the Russian-Polish border dispute, which the United States and Great

Britain have offered to mediate. It also followed Pravda's "separate peace" charge against Britain-thus muddying farther the politica Made Worse waters of understanding among the "Big Three"

fighting Germany. The Bulletin charged that the Franco government-which is fully recognized and on technically friendly terms with the Anglo-American Allies-is Hitler's cat's paw.

While American Ambassador to Madrid Cariton J. H. Hayes is doing his best in the difficult position, the Bulletin said flatly that Franco had lied when he stated the Spanish Blue Division had been withdrawn from the Russo-German fighting front.

Since Spain is far removed from the vast Russian front, the Bulletin's charge was regarded as a plain indication that Moscow is dis-satisfied with the tolerance the United States and Great Britain have

Now there are signs that Pennsylvania Avenue and 10 Downing Street intend to take a sterner attitude toward Spain and reports to the effect they may force Franco to break with the Axis by threatsning to cut off all food shipments from the United States and Britain. February oil shipments to Spain from both the United States and Creat Britain have been cancelled.

. ONE OF THE BIG UNANSWERED QUESTIONS of the recent railroad crisis will remain unanswered-whether it was necessary for President Roosevelt to seize the earriers.

Bisset's office is a "middle man" between Mexican business men and Canadian buyers and sell ers, and it also handles Canadian relations with the Mexican press

Canada sends large quantities of newsprint and wood pulp to Mexico, as well as agricultural machinery and supplies. All Mexico-Canada shipments move by rail through the United States, which allocates freight space to

the two countries.
"After the war," Bissett said, "Canada expects to be able to compete in any part of Latin America on full equality with any nation.

He said Canada had undergone

'tremendous" industrial development, and will be able to manu facture for export a larger varety of goods than before the war. He said Canada had built 3 10,000-ton freighters in the last four years, and will have built 400 by war's end. Many of the ships are lend-leased, but will return to Canadian possession with the armistice. They will form the neucleus for a shipping fleet to carry Canadian products to every part of the world. He emphasized that post war shipping in Canada will be in private hands, although the government will contin ue to subsidize shipping, probably through mail contracts.

Bisset said French Canadians will play an important role in Can-ada's expansion into Latin America, because by culture and religion, both extremely important assets, they are more akin to Latin Americans than either Americans or English Canadians.

A group of 16 French Canadian students recently arrived in Mexico for three months of study in the national university, and they will be followed by other groups which is part of Canada's groundlaying for her postwar "penetra-

SIX GERMAN DIVISIONS ARE CLOSING IN ON YANKS, BRITISH

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS in Algiers, (UP) American and British invasion forces "are in a tough spot" on the Anzio beachhead, fighting with their backs to the sea against an enveloping ring of six German divisions, eyewitness accounts from the front said

Moscow Government Now Frowns on Franco Spain Road Seizure Unnecessary

Special to Central Press

• WASHINGTON—The sharp claws of the Russian bear, victory-bound across the marshes of Poiand, are stretching southward toward Spain—which Moscow considers not only distinctly unneutral

but a silent ally of Adolf Hitler, Only the other day, the Soviet Information Bulletin, official publication of the Russian embassy in Washington, thrust truculent criticism at the Madrid government of Generalissimo Francisco

The semi-diplomatic incident came on top of the Russian-Polish border dispute, which the United States and Great Britain have offered to mediate.

It also followed Pravda's "separate peace" charge against Britain-thus muddying farther the political waters of understanding among the "Big Three" fighting Germany.

The Bulletin charged that the Franco government-which is fully recognized and on technically friendly terms with the Anglo-American Allies-is Hitler's cat's paw.

While American Ambassador to Madrid Cariton J. H. Hayes is doing his best in the difficult position, the Bulletin said flatly that Franco had lied when he stated the Spanish Blue Division had been withdrawn from the Russo-German fighting front. Since Spain is far removed from the vast Russian front, the Bulle-

tin's charge was regarded as a plain indication that Moscow is dis-satisfied with the tolerance the United States and Great Britain have shown for Spain, Now there are signs that Pennsylvania Avenue and 10 Downing

Street intend to take a sterner attitude toward Spain and reports to the effect they may force Franco to break with the Axis by threatening to cut off all food shipments from the United States and Britain. February oil shipments to Spain from both the United States and Great Britain have been cancelled.

. ONE OF THE BIG UNANSWERED QUESTIONS of the recent railroad crisis will remain unanswered-whether it was necessary for President Roosevelt to seize the carriers.

Union chiefs charge it was merely a flare for the dramatic which prompted the action. Tom Cashen, switchmen's chief, says there was no excuse for it; that the president could have declared an emergency under the railway labor act and "frozen" conditions for 60 days. Cashen adds that F. D. R. did exactly that 13 times in the past seven years to avert a crisis.

Government officials are not so sure, however. Section 10 of the act providing for such a move, technically was set aside on the basis

of labor's no-strike piedge in war-time, they explain.

In iteu of Section 10, F. D. R. issued an executive order creating a railway labor panel to which the unions could appeal directly in case of a wage deadlock. The executive order was issued on the theory that no strike threat would arise,

Moscow Covernment Now Frowns on Franco Spain Road Seizure Unnecessary

Special to Central Press

• WASHINGTON-The sharp claws of the Russian bear, victorybound across the marshes of Poland, are stretching southward toward Spain-which Moscow considers not only distinctly unneutral but a silent ally of Adolf Hitler.

Only the other day, the Soviet Information Bulletin, official publication of the Russian embassy in Washington, thrust truculent criticism at the Madrid government of Generalissimo Francisco

The semi-diplomatic incident came on top of the Russian-Polish border dispute, which the United States and Great Britain have offered to mediate.

It also followed Pravda's "separate peace" charge

against Britain-thus muddying farther the politic waters of understanding among the "Big Three" fighting Germany.

The Eulietin charged that the Franco government—which is fully

recognized and on technically friendly terms with the Anglo-American Allies-is Hitler's cat's paw.

While American Ambassador to Madrid Carlton J. H. Hayes is doing his best in the difficult position, the Bulletin said flatly that Franco had lied when he stated the Spanish Blue Division had been withdrawn from the Russo-German fighting front.

Since Spain is far removed from the vast Russian front, the Builetin's charge was regarded as a plain indication that Moscow is dis-satisfied with the tolerance the United States and Great Britain have shown for Spain. Now there are signs that Pennsylvania Avenue and 10 Downing

Street intend to take a sterner sititude toward Spain and reports to the effect they may force Franco to break with the Axis by threatsning to cut off all food shipments from the United States and Britain. February oil shipments to Spain from both the United States and Great Britain have been cancelled.

. ONE OF THE BIG UNANSWERED QUESTIONS of the recent railroad crisis will remain unanswered-whether it was necessary for President Roosevelt to seize the carriers.

Union chiefs charge it was merely a flare for the dramatic which prompted the action. Tom Cashen, switchmen's chief, says there was no excuse for it; that the president could have declared an emergency under the railway labor act and "frozen" conditions for 60 days.

Cashen adds that F. D. R. did exactly that 12 times in the past

Moscow Government Now Frowns on Franco Spain

Rail Union Chiefs Claim Road Seizure Unnecessary

Special to Central Press

• WASHINGTON-The sharp claws of the Russian bear, victoryund across the marshes of Poland, are stretching southward toward Spain-which Moscow considers not only distinctly unneutral

but a silent ally of Adolf Hitler. Only the other day, the Soviet Information Bulletin, official publication of the Russian embassy in Washington, thrust truculent criticism at the Madrid government of Generalissimo Francisco

The semi-diplomatic incident came on top of the Russian-Polish border dispute, which the United States and Great Britain have offered to mediate.

Situation

It also followed Pravda's "separate peace" charge against Britain-thus muddying farther the politic waters of understanding among the "Big Three" fighting Germany.

The Bulletin charged that the Franco government-which is fully recognized and on technically friendly terms with the Anglo-American Allies-is Hitler's cat's paw.

While American Ambassador to Madrid Cariton J. H. Hayes is doing his best in the difficult position, the Bulletin said flatly that Franco had lied when he stated the Spanish Blue Division had been withdrawn from the Russo-German fighting front.

Since Spain is far removed from the vast Russian front, the Bulle-

tin's charge was regarded as a plain indication that Moscow is dissatisfied with the tolerance the United States and Great Britain have shown for Spain.

Now there are signs that Pennsylvania Avenue and 10 Downing Street intend to take a sterner attitude toward Spain and reports to the effect they may force Franco to break with the Axis by threatsning to cut off all food shipments from the United States and Britain. February oil shipments to Spala from both the United States and Great Britain have been cancelled.

. ONE OF THE BIG UNANSWERED QUESTIONS of the recent railroad crisis will remain unanswered—whether it was necessary for President Rhosevelt to seize the carriers.

Union chiefs charge it was merely a flare for the dramatic which prompted the action. 


