No Legislation Simplifying Heavy "Over-Cut" of Timber Income Tax Before Mid-Year Due to War Effort Demands

Special to Central Press

· WASHINGTON-The job of drafting legislation simplifying income taxes and tax returns is proving to be rather a slow process. Indications are that it will be two months or more before a bill begins to take shape, and that simplified legislation will not be ariacted before the middle of the year.

Right now the whole matter is in the hands of experts of the Congressional joint committee on internal revenue taxation and the treasury. A report from Colin F. Stam, chief of the Congressional staff, is expected to be given to the House ways and means committee by the end of the month.


