FORD SHOWS THE WAY

At long last the thing for which all of us would-be consumers have been wishing and waiting has happened. Common sense and the American spirit of understanding compromise have entered the blood-spattered arena of current economic controversy.

The auspicious debut was made in Detroit, where officials of the Ford Motor Company and of the CIO's United Automobile Workers got together, calmly talked over their differences in an atmosphere of co-operative honesty rather than in that of the recriminating super-sensitivity which has marked so many labor-management conferences, and made the astonishing discovery that continued production was to their mutual interest. Both "sides" were in fact, so thoroughly convinced that an operating plant was preferable to a closed one that each found itself willing to sacrifice inane class "face" and announce a series of genuine concessions.

The company agreed to an 18-cent per hour wage increase, retroactive to January 5, and to a full-time grievance - investigating status for factory union representatives. The union agreed to prevent illegal work-stoppages and to sanction discharge of trouble-making or inefficient workers. So saying, the two parties shook hands and parted friends, to meet again the next morning at their common place of business not as enemies under painful truce, but as industrial partners pointing the way to a new era of economic peace. It was as simple as that.



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


