

### Chemist Admits He Gave Formula To Communist

MONTREAL (UP) - Prof. Raymond Boyer, wartime chemist at McGill University, admitted today he gave details of a secret Canadian explosive to Fred Rose, Communist member of Parliament and that he knew the formula was sought by Soviet Russia.

Boyer, one of the suspects arrested in connection with the Soviet esplonage ring in Canada, made the admission at resumption of preliminary hearings for him and Rose. Both are charged with violation of the official secrets

#### **BACKING OUROWN HORSE**

Few if any speeches by a private citizen ever matched in political repercussions the address which Winston Churchill delivered at Fulton, Mo. It was hard to realize that this was a retired, defeated statesman speaking, and not the first minister of the British Empire. He was still the wise, elquent, authoritative voice of experience.

The policy that Mr. Churchill expressed is probably not too different from that held by his successor at the head of Britain's government. For Britain, beset by strife throughout her empire and by privation at home, badly needs American help. Her interests are threatened by Russian expansion. It is an expansion both physical and ideological, it is devious and veiled in secrecy, and it has Britain understandably worried.

Mr. Churchill's blunt speech, through unofficial, came in significant sequence to the recent and almost equally blunt statements by Senator Vandenberg and Secretary Byrnes regarding Russia. It helped set the stage for what promises to be a hot fight at the pending UNO meeting in New York.

Mr. Churchill professed belief in certain freedoms which are not actualities throughout the empire, a n d which he did nothing to advance as Prime Minister. He and his successors will surely find that, without a binding military agreement, the American people will be better friends of Britain as things stand now than they would be if they might be called upon to enforce some of Britain's imperial policies by force of arms.

All this may sound as though the UNO did not exist. But at present the infant organization is unable to walk unassisted. It is dominated by three great powers. And to date at least two of them have spent more time in quarreling over its custody than in trying to guide its first steps on a straight path toward peace.

America has the opportunity, and at last is showing Our government's policies may not be perfect, but they do seem more moral and disinterested than those of Russia and Britain.

### TO WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA)-No one point in current negotiations between John L. Lewis's United Mine Workers and the coal operators is apt to be more kicked around and misunderstood

than the question of organizing the so-called supervisory employes.

It will be represented as "an attempt by labor to usurp the powers of management." It will be tied in with the drive against the foremen's union in the automobile industry. There is no connection, except that both grew out of short-sighted policies which did not give the foremen and supervisory employes their proper place in the industrial scheme of things, thereby forcing them to break away from top management and join forces with rank-and-file labor.

In the first place, it is the contention of the United Mine Workers that it does not seek, and never has wanted, to organize the mine superintendents, foremen, fire bosses, tipple foremen, or

others who have the right to hire and fire and are recognizably a part

ORGANIZATION of supervisory employes in the mines grew out of mechanization of the mixes. Before coal cutting and loading machinery came into use, there were only a few foremen in a mine. With the introduction of mining machinery, a crew of 10 men had to be assigned to each unit, and, naturally enough, one man out of the 10 had to be boss.

At first the supervisors were paid a dollar a day more than other miners, or they were paid a straight salary instead of an hourly rate and, being a part of management, were expected to work overtime without compensation. When they become dissatisfied with this deal, they began to talk of organizing their own union.

As soen as the new supervisors' union began to show signs of strength, representatives of the operators came to Washington to protest to John L. Lewis against having to deal with two unions. It is the United Mine Workers' contention that the operators asked that supervisors be admitted into the U. M. W.

THEN, in May, 1943, in the celebrated Maryland Dry Dock case, the National Labor Relations Board handed down a ruling forbidding. in effect, the organization in labor unions of foremen and supervisory

employes.

With that ruling behind them, the coal operators did an about-face, charged the miners with trying to take over management, and the fight was on. Opposition only made the union stronger. The whole matter came to a head last fall in a series of unauthorized strikes of supervisory employes, which U. M. W. district officials found it impossible to check until Lewis postponed to a later date his negotiations with the operators in October.

But now, on the eve of resuming negotiations with the operators for a general new contract. Lewis is handed a beautiful break in a National Labor Relations Board decision in the Jones and Laughlin ease. It is a specific ruling that supervisory employes in coal minus who wish to join a union for collective bargaining are eligible to do so under the Wagner Act.
