DISTURBING PARALLELS

Premier Stalin has accused Winston Churchill of nursing a Hitlerish idea of racial superiority, and of wanting to make this an Anglo-Saxon world. But it seems to us that Mr. Stalin's recent actions, much more than Mr. Churchill's words, bear the marks of the Hitler influence.

Mr. Stalin may be, and doubtless is, guided by decidedly different motives. But the parallels of method are striking. Hitler began to prepare the ground for war by talking of democratic encirclement, unfriendly elements in neighboring countries, and the right of selfdefense.

Mr. Stalin has recently spoken of capitalistic encirclement, the desire for friendly governments on Russia's borders, and the need of preparing Russia for "any even-

Hitler directed his most venomous oratory at Great Britain while, in the early days, he assured the United States of his friendly intentions.

Mr. Stalin and the Russian press have had some bitter things to say about Britain in recent days. At the same time they pointed out that Russia has been friends with the United States longer and more consistently than Britain has.

Hitler began his military activities by sending troops into undefended or weakly defended border territoies, with Austrian annexation as the climax. Mr. Stalin's troops have been active in Iran, where they remain in violation of a treaty in which Russia agreed to evacuate them on March

There the parallel ends. Hitler thundered and his armies clanked about near home until he had built up what he thought was an invincible war machine . Mr. Stalin undoubtedly has the most powerful military force under arms

It is unlikely that Mr .Stalin wants another war. Certainly, he does not want it now. For Russia, with all her military might, is war-weary and industrially weak.

The external parallel of German activities in the late 'Thirties and Russian activities today, however different the internal motives, proclaims the urgent need for action. This time the tragic drift toward destruction must be stopped early and completely

That is a job for the United States. Russia and Britain are new engaged in pot-and-kettle accusations of blackness which can only make a dangerous situation worse. There is need for strong meditation backed by strong force. If that means that we must partially rearm, then, repugnant as the thought is, we shall have to do it.

The cameras aboard the target vessels will be used to attempt to get close-up shots of the explosions at Bikini Atoll in the Pacific in

They will be self-operating, and Quackgnbush, who has been mak-ing a last-minute check on equipment at the Fairchild Camera and Instrument Corp., will know at what time each has been set to start shooting. From that he can tell at what time each picture was


