#### After Danube River Fiasco, Next Riddle Is Dardanelles

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Next riddle of European diplomacy is what effect the Danube River conference, whose terms were dic-by Soviet Russia, may have on future control of the Dardanelles the Turkish straits leading from the Mediterranean to the Black Sea The Potsdam declaration signed by Truman, Churchill and Stalin in August, 1945, called for revision of the Montreux Convention of 1936, governs international uses and control of the Dardanelles. The Big Three at Potsdam agreed that this convention, or treaty, should

e revised to meet modern conditions.

The English version of the Potsdam agreement says that the next step should be the subject of direct conversation between the three powers and the Turks. An exact translation of the Russian text of the Potsdam agreement says that "the proper course" should be the subject of direct conversations between "each of" the three powers

and the Turks.

On the basis of this neat little trick in translation, the Russians in 1945 and 1946 made direct demands on the Turks for special privileges in control and defense of the Dardanelles. The Russians wanted to establish their own military bases on the Dardanelles and the Bos-phorus straits to the north, so that they would have full control of approaches to the Black Sea.

AT the Danube conference just concluded, the Russians and their six Communist satellites were able to put over their idea that the river should be controlled only by states having riparian rights—that is, countries through which the Danube flowed. That of course cut out the United States, Britain and France from having any control over If the Russians now try to establish this same principle over control

of the Dardanelles, an interesting fight may develop. Geographically, Turkey is the only country that has any riparian rights, since both banks of the Dardanelles, the Bosphorus and the little Sea of Marmara in between are Turkish soil.

The Russians may claim, however, that since the waters of the Black

Sea flow through these straits, countries bordering an the Black Sea should also have a voice in control of the Dardanelles. That would cut Russia, the Ukraine. Bulgaria and Romania in on the deal. They could then outvote the Turks on every issue.

THE Montroux Convention which now governs the straits provides very definite procedure for revision. It was to be subject to revision every five years after 1936 and completely rewritten after 20 years, in 1956. No revision was made in 1941 because of the war, during which Turkey had full right of control. In 1946 the issue was hot. y notes were exchanged but nothing was done. The next regular for revision would be 1951.

ace the Russians have put over the principle of riparian control of the Danube, it would not be surprising for them to move for revision of the Montreux Convention now, under the terms of the Potsdam declaration. In a straight revision by the countries that signed the Montreux Convention, however, the Russians would not have majority voting control as over the Danube.

NEW YORK-(NEA)-"Here's something that will give you a short piece and maybe a beat," said the man high in the Yankee council.
"I hear it is very, very likely that Johnny Neun, ousted by the Reds, will be back in the New York American League organization next

spring.
"He is a George Weiss man, as you probably know.
"It could be, that if the Yanks don't win the flag, Bucky Harris will

"It could be, that if the Yanks don't win the flag, Bucky Harris will move into the front office again, and Neun become manager."

"Without having talked to him, it would be presumptuous for me to say that Neun would be back in the Yankee chain next year,," explained general manager Weiss.

It must be remembered that Neun is still being paid very well for not managing the Redlegs, which is nice work if you can get it.

"I don't know what happened to Neun in Cincinnati, but understand he was taking a beating from the fans, and was fed up," continued Weiss. "The fans are tough out there.

"Neun is a grade A manager in our book, demonstrated that through a 12-year stretch. He is thorough, a stickler for details and a hustler. "I guess firing the manager remains one way of drumming up midseason interest."



## The oil industry is producing more oil for you

## ... but it's a big job!



A SEISMOGRAPH CREW creates miniature ments. The records are then studied to see if they reveal likely oil formations. The seismograph crews operate on the plains and prairies of Texas, on the ranges of New Mexico, in Mississippi's form lands, in the bayou country of Louisiana, and in the open Gulf of Mexicowherever there is a chance that possible oilbearing formations may be found.

You have asked the oil industry to produce nearly twice as much oil in 1948 as we produced in 1941; that's what today's increased use of oil products amounts to.

To produce oil, it is necessary first to find it. And finding oil is not easy; it's not like looking for buried treasure; it's not a matter of old maps and digging with shovels in romantic spots. The search for oil is a hugely expensive undertaking. It is a scientific project on the grand scale. It involves a careful study of geology and such feats as measuring the difference in the pull of gravity at different places, and tracing the shock of the miniature earthquake created by setting off a small dynamite charge.

But with every possible scientific aid, the scientists still can't say, "Drill here for oil." Instead, they say, "Drill here and you may find oil." And these days, about 90% of the explora . tory wells find no oil-they are what the oil men call "dry holes"

Today, the industry is hunting and finding oil sometimes two miles and more deep in the earth.

Humble, for example, this year completed a producing well in Chambers County, Texas, that is 12,026 feet deep, and many exploratory wells are drilled even deeper. All this makes the search sometimes slow, always expensive; and it adds thousands of dollars to the cost of drilling a well.

But the industry is producing more oil than ever before in its history, and is finding enough additional oil to maintain its reserves. You can help this effort by making your personal demands for petroleum reasonable, by cooperating with programs designed to conserve oil products for the uses to which they are best adapted, by the exercise of patience as the oil industry acts to meet the need.
