WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 (UP) -Army meteorologists said today that the hottest spot in North America is the floor of California's death Valley during the month of

The Army said that on the basis of records for the last 36 years, the temperature of the desert floor can be expected to reach an high of 180 degices fahrenheit at least one day every seven years.

At five feet above the surface the official level recording temperatures—the mercury on these days would be 125 degrees. The higehst official temperature ever recorded in the valley was 134 degrees on July 10, 1913.





New York safety council, is warn-ing city-bred people to beware of all living animals when they visit the country, whether they be bulls rabbits, fleas, mosquitoes, kittens, ducks or chicks. ducks or chicks.

"Avoid unnecessary contacts. Tanham warned, "and approach startling them." carefully when it is necessary to come near an animal. If you can't other insects, at least respect their infected."

Tanham cautioned that wild animals should never be touched, even when they appear friendly. He pointed out that ticks from some animals cause spotted fever in humans. Wild rabbits and deer sometimes transmit tularemia.

The safest way, Tanham said, is to keep a fence between you and the local fauna. "Bulls and often hogs and rams,

are potential killers," he said. "Leave their handling to the farmer, who is familiar with their




