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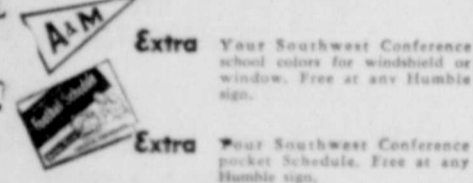

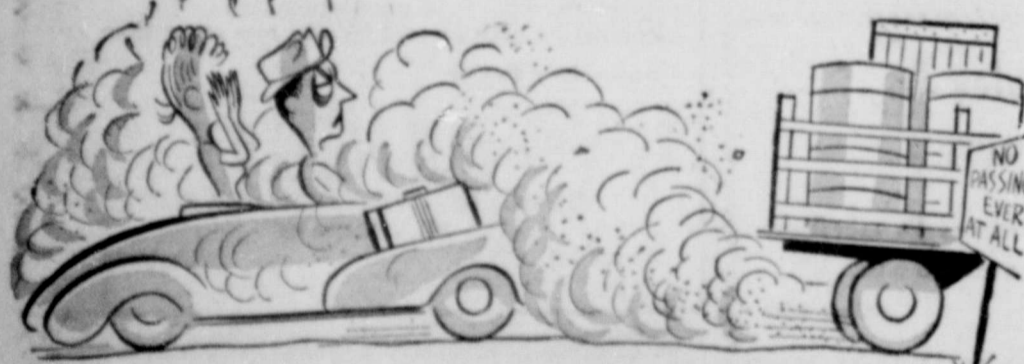

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 14 (UP)—Henry Ayres of Paris today succeeded A. A. Buchanan of San Antonio as chairman of the Texas Aeronautics Commission, Buchanan becoming vice-chairman.

The change was voted at a quarterly meeting of the commission held here Monday. Virgil Musick of San Angelo was named secretary.

A law to require state registration of airports was endorsed by the commission, with requirement that notice be given of opening and closing of airports.

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 14 (UP)—Texas is setting a record of oil production this year greater than that of wartime, a report of the Texas Railroad Commission revealed here today. In the first seven months of 1948, the state's oil wells produced 514,542,340 barrels.

Drilling of new wells is continuing at a fast pace, commission statisticians reported.

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 14 (UP)—Drew C. Nichols, the Progressive Party's singing candidate for U. S. Junior Senator from Texas, will open his campaign in his home town here tonight.

REPUBLICANS PREDICT DEWEY-WARREN VICTORY

Jubilant republicans today predicted a Dewey-Warren landslide in November on the basis of the GOP's clean sweep in the Maine elections.

Republican candidates captured every top office on the Maine ballot yesterday in the kickoff election of 1948. The sweep was led by Rep. Margaret Chase Smith, who became the first Republican woman ever elected to a full term in the U. S. Senate.

Both Mrs. Smith and Maine Republican Chairman Alan L. Bird said the GOP victory margin heralded a smashing victory in November for the national GOP ticket headed by presidential nominee, Thomas E. Dewey.

Nearly complete returns showed Mrs. Smith polled about 74 per cent of the total vote. In Maine's September election two years ago, the GOP senatorial candidate polled 63.5 per cent; two months later a national Republican tide enabled the party to re-capture

control of Congress.

Today's election fare included primaries in seven states—Minnesota, Colorado, Washington, Michigan, Vermont, Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

A fairly heavy turnout was forecast in Minnesota to settle internal battles in both major parties. Favored for U. S. senatorial nominations were incumbent, Joseph H. Ball, Republican, and Mayor Hubert H. Humphrey of Minneapolis, democratic-farmer-labor. In the contest for the GOP gubernatorial nomination, incumbent Luther W. Youngdahl, was opposed by State Auditor Stafford King.

In New Hampshire, Sen. Styles Bridges was unopposed for the Republican senatorial nomination. Vermont's primary featured a five-way contest for the GOP nomination to the state's lone seat in the House.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, Republican, was unopposed for his party's senatorial nomination in Massachusetts where only about 500,000 of the 2,400,000 eligible voters were expected to turn out. Five democrats sought their party's senatorial nomination.

In Colorado, the chief race was between incumbent Sen. Edwin C. Johnson and former State De-

mocratic Chairman Gene Cervi for the Democratic senatorial nomination. Johnson appeared the favorite.

A new record of 1,250,000 voters registered for Washington's primary but only a 50 per cent turnout was expected to pick party nominees for governor, lieutenant governor, six congressional posts and six state offices.

Voting also was expected to be light in Michigan where Sen. Homer Ferguson, Republican, was unopposed for renomination.
