Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad engineers have completed surveys for siding and spur tracks to be constructed at the rock quarry site a short distance east of Carbon, where a Concrete Materials Company is preparing to crush which, it is said, will include dams to be built in Texas.



# Rayburn Appeals | RAIDS EXPECTED ALONG WEST SECTOR BOUNDARY

BERLIN, Sept. 14 (UP)-Military police and British sector German police were alerted tonight by reports that sweeping Soviet raids were to be made along the west sector boundaries of Berlin starting at midnight, Berlin time (4 P.M. CST.)

American military police officers said similar reports that the Russians planned raids along the sector borders had reached them, but they said no unusual precautions were being taken in the U. S. sector "for the present."

Several clashes between Russian sector German police and those of the Western sectors occurred along the boundaries recently when Soviet raids were made on alleged black market hideouts in the border area.

MOSCOW, Sept. 14, (UP) - Western envoys with Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov tonight in a renewal of the big four talks on the German crisis after an interval devoted to consulations in Berlin.

W. Bedell Smith of the United States, Frank Roberts of Great Britain and Yves Chataigneau of France went to the Kremlin at 6 p. m. (11 A. M. EDT).

Just before departing for the session with Molotov, the British and French envoys called on Smith for a last minute review of the latest directions from Washington, London and Paris.

From the American embassy the three diplomats proceeded in separate cars to the citadel which is the seat of the Soviet Government.






