### Decisions On VA Policies Put Off

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (UP)—Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray was reported by his aides today to have put off until early next year decision on most big policy questions in the bulging veterans agency.

One spokesman said Gray's moratorium had nothing to do with the presidential election or with a possible change in administration. However, some pending questions obviously are touchy in a campaign year.

One hot issue is whether to abandon, or modify, the "decentralized" branch office system set up by Gray's predecessor, Gen. Omar N. Bradley. The system has been attacked by members of the House veterans and appropriations committees.

Gray, former railroad executive, left last night on the final leg of a tour that is taking him to each of about 300 VA regional and branch offices, hospitals, and even building sites. He returns on Jan. 18.

"Gray said he is reserving his decision on major policy questions until he has seen for himself what is going on, and what the problems are, in every VA office and hospital," a spokesman reported.

### Big Foreign Aid Bill Looms For '49

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (UP)—Regardless of the outcome of the November elections, the next Congress faces the prospect of acting on a record-breaking foreign aid program of over \$8,000,000,000 (b), a United Press survey disclosed today.

The estimate, compiled from official sources, compares with about \$7,000,000,000 (b) authorized by the 80th Congress for economic and military aid through June 30, 1949. Recipients are Western Europe, Trieste, Austria, Greece, Turkey, China, Japan and Korea.

The biggest single amount next year will be over \$4,000,000,000 for the second year of the European recovery program. Then there are expected to be requests totaling \$1,500,000,000 or more for rearming Western Europe as this country's first line of defense. And more aid is in the works for China, Japan and Korea because of communist threats in Asia.

### Navy Tests For Seniors, Grads Due December 11

The Navy announced recently that the second nationwide competitive examination for its Officer College Training Program has been scheduled for December 11, 1948, and will be open to high school seniors or graduates within the age requirements. Successful candidates will be given a four-year college education at government expense and will be commissioned as officers in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation. Application forms must be forwarded to the Naval Examining Section, Princeton, N. J. in time for receipt by November 15, 1948.

Students selected through the medium of its competitive examination and who meet other qualification required by the Navy will be offered entrance into the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps (NROTC) Units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the country. Those entering the program will attend the college or university of their choice in so far as practical where they will receive from the government the cost of their tuition, books, and normal fees and \$50.00 a month for a four-year period of education. Upon graduation, they will be commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and will be required to serve a minimum of 2 years on active duty after which they may apply for retention in the regular services or transfer to the Reserve and return to civilian life.

High school seniors who are interested in the Navy College Training Program may contact the Deans or Registrars who are acting as the Navy's civilian representatives for the program. The Principals and Deans will be pleased to provide specific information about this program including the places of competitive examination, informed bulletins, application forms, and necessary age and scholastic qualifications.

Naval ROTC Units are established in Texas at the Rice Institute in Houston, and at the University of Texas in Austin. The Professor of Naval Science at these institutions or the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, Dallas, Texas will be pleased to give any information desired by parents or interested students concerning the program.

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### Fail To Block Palestine Query

PARIS, Oct. 14 (UP)—Russia, the Ukraine and Syria failed today in an attempt to block immediate United Nations Security Council consideration of reported violations of the Palestine truce by the Arabs and Jews.

The council met for a single day of deliberations on Palestine. Tomorrow it will renew the "trial" of Russia on Western charges of threatening sources raised doubts if the big three getting unanimous western support for the charges against Russia in the hearing which was given a green light by the collapse of a mediation effort.

Soviet and Syrian opposition to discussion today of the Palestine problem was based on a procedural technicality. They contended that the provisional agenda had not been circulated early enough. The council overruled them. It voted 8 to 0, with the dissenters abstaining, to adopt the agenda and proceed with hearing a report by Dr. Ralph Bunche, acting Palestine mediator since the assassination of Count Folke Bernadotte. Bunche, an American negro, then took his place at the council table.

Just before the hearing started, a British spokesman said the United States and Great Britain were standing behind Bernadotte's final report to the UN as the best basis for a settlement of the Palestine problem.

Bernadotte drafted the report just before he was assassinated in Jerusalem. He recommended the shifting of certain territories in Palestine across the previously delineated Jewish-Arab lines.

### Rotarians Hear Talk On Progress Of Oil Industry

Labeling the oil industry an American institution, L. R. Pearson in speaking on the subject of oil progress before the Rotary Club Wednesday and the Lions Club Thursday stated that Texas produces 44 per cent of the total production in the United States and is the largest of the producer states.

Dating his talk from the origin of oil, which is generally conceded to have come from sea life and vegetation which was covered up by silt millions of years ago, Pearson stated that it became a part of the American life when the Drake well, the discovery well, was brought in 1859.

He stated that there are at present 430,000 producing wells, one third of which are in Texas and that the average per well is 12 barrels per day. "Texas has a big stake in the oil industry and 62 per cent of the state taxes in Texas came from this industry," Pearson said.

Despite these figures, Pearson pointed out, the oil business is not a monopoly. There are 34,000 firms in the business, 14,000 in the producing end of the industry. "There are 150,000 miles of pipelines in this country carrying 13 per cent of the total freight of the United States," the speaker said. Figures show that this country is using 22 per cent more petroleum than in the war year 1945.

Texas with one eighth of all oil lands produces three-fourths of the oil in the world.

Pearson concluded his informative talk with the statement that the industry is progressive and has met every demand from the public without government subsidy. He pointed out that it has done more to raise the standard of living than any other industry, and that there are 1,200 by-products of petroleum.

Pearson was presented by F. P. Brasher, Sr. program chairman of the club and H. C. Henderson, president, presided at the Rotary club.

At the Lions' Club he was presented by Wilson Guest who was in charge of the program.

### Woman Held Believed To Be Mentally Ill

A woman said to be about 37 years of age was taken into custody Wednesday afternoon after she jumped from an east bound bus at the Greyhound stop and ran screaming into the Ranger Jewelry Company, stating that she had been poisoned by a man on the bus.

Police were summoned and took the woman to the West Texas Hospital where after examination it was determined that she had not been poisoned but was probably suffering from a mental illness.

She was still in the West Texas Hospital today awaiting arrival of relatives from Vincennes, Indiana.

A man traveling on the bus and who is said to have known the woman since their childhood stated that after encountering her on the trip sometime back, she had performed in a like manner at other stops. When she jumped from the bus here, the man notified police.

Don Butler, commander of the Ralph McKinley Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars has requested that all members of the past or veterans of foreign wars not in the post, meet Friday morning at 11 o'clock at the VFW headquarters.

Staff Sgt. McCleskey was killed in action in World War II at Cassino, Italy. Burial rites will be conducted Sunday afternoon at 8 o'clock at the First Christian Church.

### Says Country Faces No Oil Shortages Soon

FORT WORTH, Tex. Oct. 14 (UP)—Any fears of a future petroleum shortage in this country were allayed today by Eugene Holman, president of the Standard Oil of New Jersey.

Holman, a former Texan, talked at the opening of the 29th annual meeting of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Improvements in efficiency of oil consuming equipment and technical advances in extracting maximum usefulness from every barrel of crude oil will stretch available supplies of petroleum, Holman said.

Holman pointed out that if the time ever comes when available supplies cannot meet demands, the oil industry can throw into production its manufacture of synthetic fuels developed during the war. He said, however, that cost of production of synthetics today is too high to make it profitable on a commercial basis.

He cited the Diesel locomotive as the outstanding development in more efficient oil-consuming equipment and the trend toward conversion of residual fuel oil into gas oil and Diesel oil as one of the best technical advances.

Europe will rely more and more on middle eastern oil from Arabia, Holman predicted, adding this would result in less importations of middle eastern oil into this country, which he said was largely a temporary measure resulting from the unusually high rate of oil consumption here within the past two years.

More than 600 Texas executives were attending the two-day meeting at the Blackstone Hotel.

### Return Of Summer To Be Short Lived

Summer made a brief comeback yesterday with the mercury climbing into the 90's at many state points, but the weatherman said today would be somewhat cooler.

Yesterday's maximum was 94 degrees at Childress; Galveston had the low maximum of 81. Overnight the minimum was 59 degrees at Amarillo and 70 at Brownsville.

A squall moved through the north central Texas area last night leaving .61 inch rain at Dallas and .10 at Fort Worth.

Partly cloudy weather was predicted for the entire state during the next 24 hours.

The west again called on Russia today to tell the world what she really wants.

The call came from British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin. He spoke in London as the United Nations prepared for a showdown debate tomorrow on the west's indictment of the Russian blockade of Berlin as a threat to world peace.

"If I cannot get agreement," Bevin said, "the issue that has got to be settled is, can we live together? What areas do they want to live in? What is the extent of their ambitions?"

"If we cannot fix agreement with our neighbors, at least let them keep over their side of the garden wall and enjoy their own life in their own way."

Other foreign news developments included:

PARIS — The United Nations turned temporarily from the stalemate Berlin crisis to truce violations in Palestine. But after one day of discussing Arab and Jewish charges of the other's violations of the UN "cease fire" order, the Security Council tomorrow again will tackle the Berlin blockade. Argentina hinted that it may abstain in the final vote on the Anglo-American - French indictment of the Soviet blockade as a threat to world peace, hereby wrecking western unanimity on the question.

BERLIN — The Soviet Army newspaper Tagliche Rundschau reiterated Russia would lift the blockade "at the same moment the western mark is withdrawn from Berlin."

LONDON — Dr. C. F. Garbett, Archbishop of York, urged the Christian world to fight the cold war to the bitter end. If that did not subdue Russia, he said, "we should recognize that war is not the worst of all evils." From the conference of British commonwealth prime ministers leaked word that a powerful new "eastern-western union" against Communism is being discussed. It would stretch from Europe through Africa to the Far East and form a buffer between the main forces of the east and the west.

ROME — Italy's transportation, communication and government services were paralyzed by a nine-hour strike of most of the country's 1,250,000 government workers for more pay. Reinforced police units guarded government buildings, but there were no reports of violence.

PARIS — The first major break in the Communist-led French strikes came when steel plants in northeast France agreed to give striking workers a 10 per cent wage increase. More than 40,000 steel strikers will return to work tomorrow.

MUNICH — A Bavarian denazification court will try Adolf Hitler and Eva Braun in absentia as "major offenders" tomorrow in an attempt to confiscate their property to bolster the state treasury. They are liable to 10-year prison sentences. Hitler's Bavarian property is valued at only \$60,000, including \$2,700 of the rubble of his Obersalzberg estate and \$4,000 for his Munich home.

### Contract Let For Benbrook Dam

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 14 (UP)—Contract for completion of the Benbrook Dam on Clear Fork of the Trinity River to lay had been awarded to Liston Clark of Kansas City.

The contract for \$4,263,244, was the largest yet to be awarded on four dams for the Upper Trinity watershed. Three of the dams are now under construction and ground will be broken for the fourth in November.

With bellies still doing flip-flops after the Cisco squeak the thrice victorious once occurred Bulldogs face a tougher assignment this Friday against the Dublin Lions at Dublin.

Some time back the Bulldogs had a nasty experience against another group of Lions—Albany—but there's that ancient saying that something never strikes twice.

Dublin has a veteran line-up liberally sprinkled with all-district selections. Two linemen made the grade last year—150 pound Stephens at right end and the burly tackle, Jim Wooten. White in the back field fullback Norris rated the nod from the selectors.

Warden had little to say after the Cisco nightmare. But he looked as if he had gone through the Hundred Years War with a flourish. The stubby mentor paced the sidelines until he formed a slither h in front of the players' bench.

The Bulldogs showed a strange combination of football in last Friday's victory. In the first half they flashed their finest offensive display of the season but also one of their poorest defensive offerings. But in the final stanzas the locals did an about face—playing whirlwind defensive ball and looking like Susie Smith's Finishing School on the attack.

Warden thinks it's just about time when every phase of the game will be coordinated. With Raymond Comancho convincing himself he's a tough customer to stop and with Marvin Wilson back in stride, it could easily be the Bulldog's third straight victory.

After a shaky start Jimmy Lee has caught fire and joins Keith Munnerlyn in giving the Bulldogs one of the finest sets of terminals to be found in the conference. Jimmy's defensive stops in the final half wrapped up the ball game for the Ranger lads.

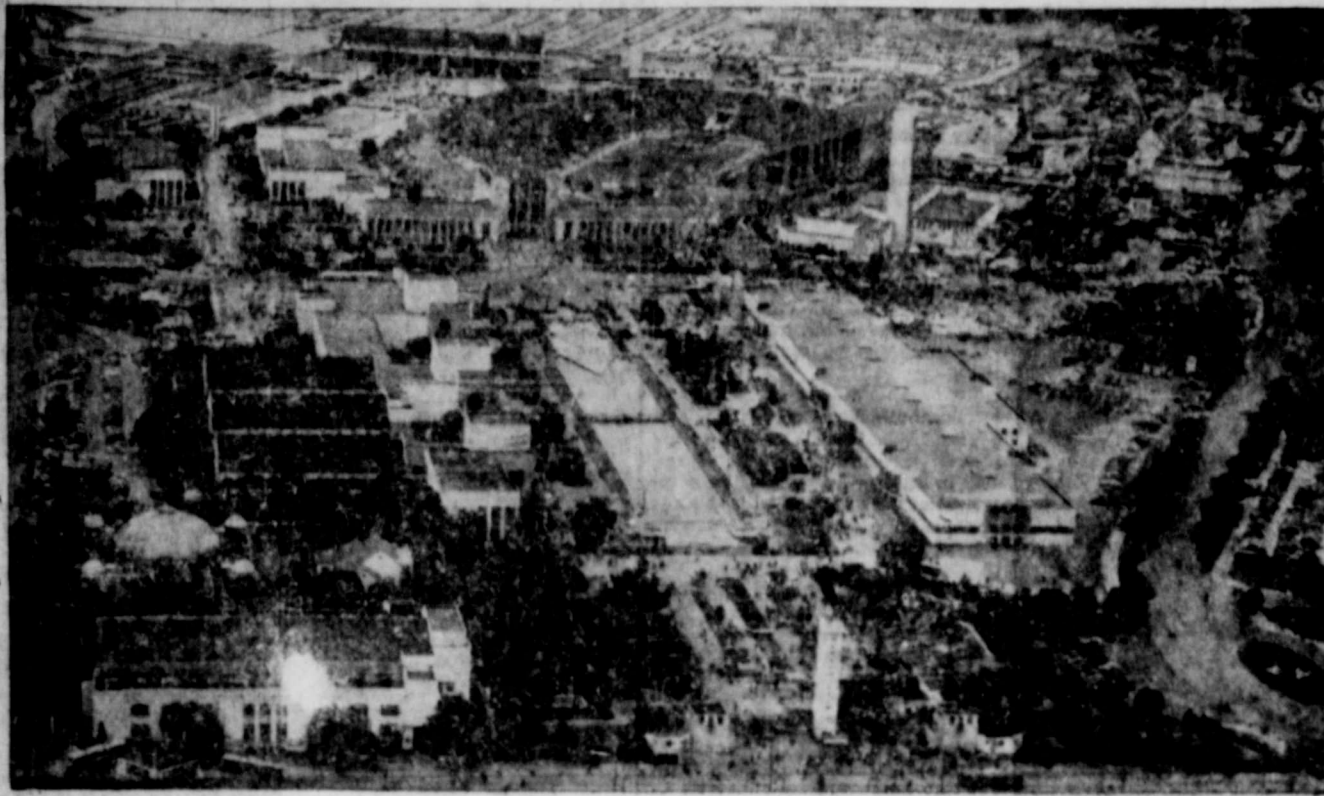

Attending were some 300 industrial plant managers, engineers, nurses and physicians.

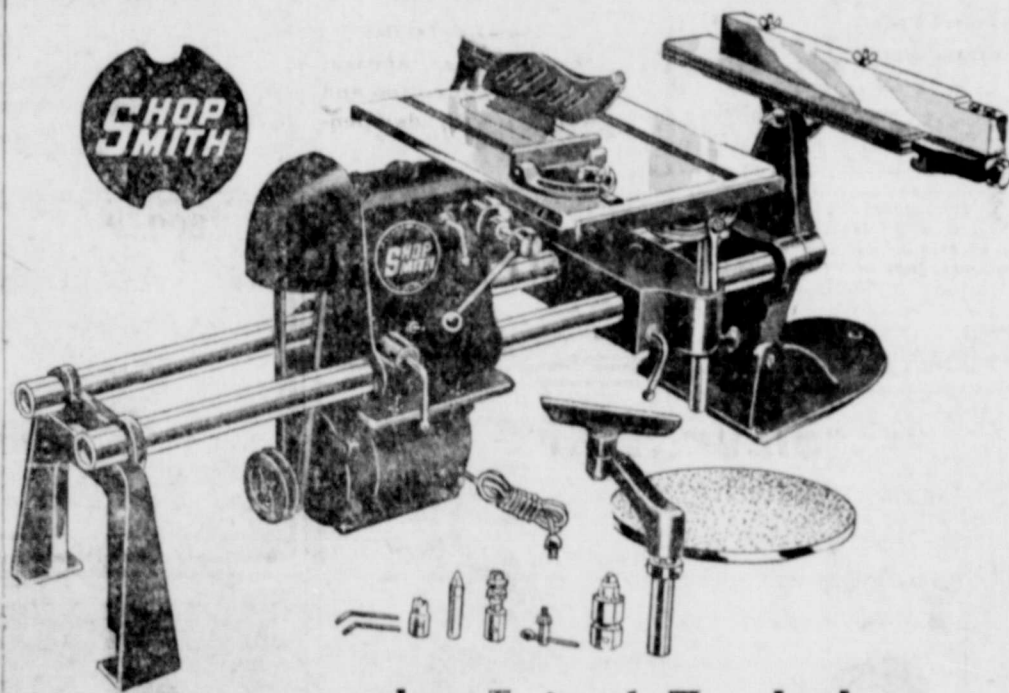

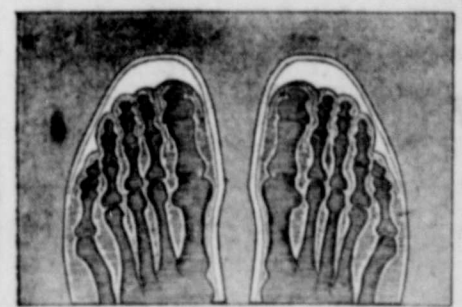

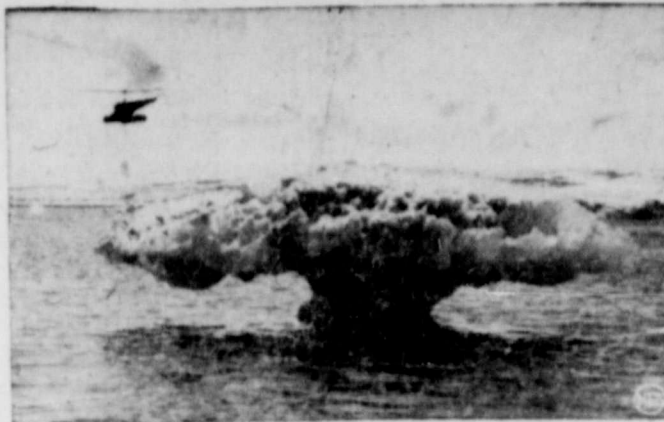

Typhographical Union Charged With Contempt

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 14 (UP)—The AFL Typographical union and four of its top officials, charged with violating the Taft-Hartley law in dealings with newspaper publishers, were found guilty today of contempt of court.

Federal Judge Luther M. Sawyer found that the union failed to abide by an injunction he issued March 27. The injunction restrained the union from discriminating against non-union printers, and from insisting on closed shop conditions prohibited by the Taft-Hartley law.

"These operators take unscrupulous advantage of the steel shortage and reap fantastic profits from the American people in dire need of stoves, bathtubs, automobiles, refrigerators, washing machines, farm machinery and other necessities."

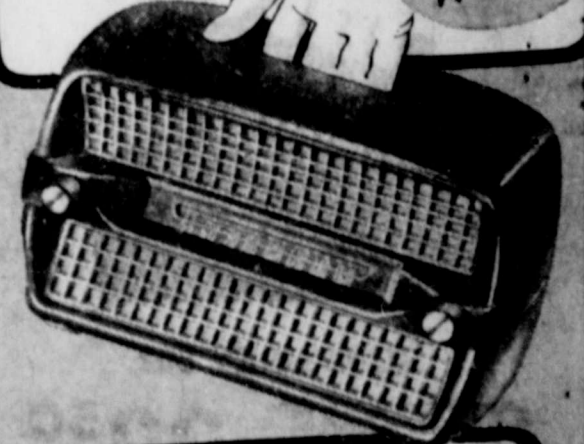
