another attack against the airfield at Tel El-Arish, which is inside the Egyptian frontier. Israeli authorities tightened censorship as a result of the new fighting and all civilian traffic to the Negev area of

Shortly after the Helicopter arrived the Air Force sent a transport plane which had heater in it. Terhr teahM

They put me in the plane and tried to take off. The snow was olinding and the wind threw the plane around. Te officer said it was so cold the instruments were frozen .They said we couldn't get Anchorage,

We turned around and almost cracked up landing on the ice. We pent a cold night on the ice but Dr. Brown took good care of me. he next morning they decided to ee if they could get the plane in the air against the strong wind ice and fog. They were afraid I'd get hurt so they made one practice

The wind blew the plane off the lake and into some trees where it stuck with its wings punctured and the propeller bent.

Then Lt. Weir said he would make an attempt to get the Helicopter in the air as the doctor was anxious to get me to the hospit-

We flew into Anchorage 10 feet above the ice of Cook Inlet and Knik Arm.

When we arrived at Anchorage the snow was so heavy we couldn't even see the field or the city. But the pilot got our plane down

I can't express my thanks to the Air force men for the wonderful treatment they gave me and for the risks they took. But I feel a little guilty having three planes and a Helicopter busy trying to get me to the hospital.
