BELIEVE LOVE INSPIRED PLANE BOMB PLANTING

LOS ANGELES, April 18 (UP) — Police worked today on the theory that love for a red-haired stewardess drove aircraft engineer John H. Grant to try to kill his wife and two children by timebombing a plane carrying 16 persons.

Grant claimed he plotted the mass murders to collect \$25,000 insurance he took out on his wife, Betty, 29, and their children, Robert, 5, and Mary Anne, 4, just before they boarded the United Airlines DC-3.

He said he needed the money to clear himself of back-breaking debts totaling about \$8,000. Most of the debts were incurred, he said, when a New York woman won a suit naming him as the father of her child.

However, Betty Suomela of Kermosa Beach, Calif., told officers that she and Grant had carried on a love affair for the past three years.

Mia Suomela, assistant supervisor of stewardesses for American Airlines, said the 31-year-old engineer was supposed to be in court arranging for a divorce at the very moment his plot to blow up the airliner was discovered.

Grant claimed it was a last minute change of heart that caused him to shoot a warning to the flier.

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MINOR COLD FRONT MOVES IN AS TEXAS SKIES CLEAR

A minor cold front accompanied by 33-mile-an-hour winds, moved into the Texas Panhandle today as clearing skies brought an end to several days of valuable rainfall.

The rains, which ranged up to five inches over the five-day period, were extremely beneficial to crops and ranges in all but the Panhandle and South Plains. And even there, most areas got enough rainfall to help wheatlands at least temporarily.

It came too late to keep this year's wheat crop from suffering badly from drought, but it will help to some extent.

Except for fog in deep east Texas, from Texarkana to Bryan and Beaumont along the upper coast, and from Laredo to Brownsville in the Rio Grande Valley, skies were clear to partly cloudy in Texas this morning.

A bright sun was expected to burn out the fog during the morning.

Temperatures were fairly cool during the early morning hours, but were expected to warm up during the day. Most readings were around the 50-degree mark, but ranged from 45 at Dalhart to 66 at Brownsville.

That brought the 36-hour rainfall to 4.43 inches at Galveston, 2.07 at Beaumont, 1.92 at Houston and 1.11 at Corpus Christi.

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Phone Company Re-Organization Is Announced

ST. LOUIS, April 18 (UP)—Southwestern Bell Telephone Company today announced a re-organization of its administrative and operating set-up in Texas in the face of the great growth of that state during the past decade.

W. L. Prehn, general manager of the Texas area since 1926, will retain that title under the decentralization program, but will now be charged with the company's operating activities as well as its commercial duties. His office is in Dallas.

Previously, Prehn's office has had equal rank with those of area traffic and plant chiefs and all three have been responsible to the Southwestern Bell's home office in St. Louis.

Heading the three operating offices under the new organization, which is effective immediately, will be Ben Smith, former assistant general manager, now general commercial manager; Clarence Oliver, former traffic manager, now general traffic manager, and Sam P. Martin, former plant superintendent, now general plant manager.

Thomas B. Kelly, former general plant manager for the entire Southwestern Bell system in St. Louis, will become Prehn's assistant general manager. C. Walker Mier of Dallas will become chief engineer for Texas.

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



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

BROWNWOOD FOX CALLER TO AID EAST TEXANS

BROWNWOOD, Tex., April 18 (UP)—Adam L. Lindsey, Brownwood, who sells sewing machines, will go to East Texas Friday to "call up" 100 rabid foxes.

Emulating the pied piper of Hamelin, Lindsey will tootle—by invitation—on his cow's horn fox caller in Henderson County, deep East Texas, where the foxes are

simply going mad for lack of a fox caller like Lindsey, or something.

Lindsey got a call last week from Henderson County Judge James F. Spencer. Spencer asked the fox-taming Brownwood sewing machine agency manager to pocket some callers and come to Athens, Texas.

The plan, Lindsey said, is to get 50 armed men, divide them into 25 teams, and send them out into the woods of Henderson County under Lindsey's leadership to call up and kill the hydrophobia-mad den fox population of the area.

"If they will let me brief those men before they go out, explaining the best ways to use lights and a caller, I know we can get about 100 foxes in one night," Lindsey said.

Lindsey likes nothing better than to call up foxes in his spare time.

He will be accompanied to Athens by his understudy, lank-drawling Wayne O. Weems, a special agent for the Santa Fe Railroad. Weems, a former Brownwood constable, likes nothing better, too, than fox calling. He's an official of the Brown county rifle and pistol club.

To prove his fox-calling abilities, Lindsey went out in the woods last week with a newspaper reporter formerly from the deep East

Texas, John Moran. After the demonstration, Moran came home wide-eyed.

"I called up my barking fox for Moran," Lindsey explained chuckling.

Judge Spencer heard about Lindsey's abilities through sportsmen of this area.

Like Barkis, Lindsey was willing.

He said the mass fox calling will take place either Friday night or Saturday night, depending on arrangements in Henderson country.

He's convinced that the county can be cleaned of rabid (and mated, if any) foxes in a single night.

Lindsey's family say fox calling is a regular phobia with him, anyhow.

RELIABLE BLOOD TEST FOR CANCER REPORTED

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 18 (UPI)—A West Coast scientist working in a basement laboratory of his home may have found the key to reliable blood test for cancer and even more, perhaps one of the causes of cancer.

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than 4,000 persons had been studied in connection with the test. And of that number 880 persons were patients definitely diagnosed as suffering with cancer. In their cases the test was 98.6 per cent accurate.

The most significant part of their report was the statement that those persons who underwent surgery for removal of a cancerous growth showed up negative in tests eight days after the operation. Thus, if the tests meet other clinical trials and are found to be without error, cancer doctors may be able to determine whether all of a cancer has been removed.

The new cancer technique is similar to that of the Kahn test for syphilis; it is done quickly in a test tube, and requires no microscopic examination.

In the first place, the doctors use the livers of persons who have died of cancer. The tissue is ground, and prepared in a purified form. During the early work, the scientists found that the livers of persons who have cancer and not particularly cancer of the liver contain a factor that appears to be a causative agent of cancer.

The medical men know that the human body creates antibodies, or chemical fighters, against disease but there has been no proof that cancer causes the body to create antibodies. The new test is based on the assumption that cancer does cause the body to create antibodies, such antibodies show up in the white part of the blood—the serum.

In making the test for cancer, the West Coast doctors took blood from persons in the study and mixed it with a saline solution containing the "cancer factor" of the liver of cancerous persons. In the case of persons who had cancer in their body, it was assumed the blood had created antibodies against the disease.

Result was that in those persons who definitely had cancer there was reaction in the test tube test. That is, substances, apparently anti-bodies, were "attacking" the cancer agent and causing the solution to lose its cloudiness, such is a positive test.

Those persons, known to be in health and apparently free of cancer, had no such reaction. Their serums remained cloudy. There was no activity of a "cancer antibody" attacking the cancer agent.


