TOKYO, Oct. 20 (UP)-Victory-sealing Allied forces opped up in captured Pyongyang today, sprang a parahute landing trap on the shattered Communist army fleeng the capital, and raced to within 90 miles of Manchuria. Four thousand American paratroopers showered down athwart the Communist escape routes north of Pyongyang in a spectacular bid to cut off and destroy the 27,800 North Korean troops in panicky flight from their lost capital city.

#### New War Agency Heads Have Country's Most Thankless Jobs BY PETER EDSON

NEA Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-There is some cause to wonder when this country knows what it let itself in for under the "Defense Production Act of 1950," passed by Congress early in September. A lot of things were authorized under that act which haven't begun to happen yet. When they do begin to happen, there may be much loud squealing of the type there was against OPA, WPB and the other civilian appropries of the last were was against OPA.

civilian agencies of the last war.

The only part of this act now functioning is the NPA—Nation Production Authority under William H. Harrison. Even it is in embryo form, having headquarters on the fifth floor of the Commerce

NPA has issued only one order at this writing-an allocation and inventory order whose effects have not yet begun to be felt. One of these fine fall days, small business concerns are going to wake up and find that they are having difficulty getting materials. The old small business problem of World War II will then become a hot potato again. If it isn't solved any better this time than it was last, it

Another item with a hidden punch in this production act is "Title III—Expansion of Productive Capacity and Supply." This is to all intents and purposes the same thing as President Truman's production expansion plan of a year and a half ago.

YOU may recall how much criticism the President caught for this when he first proposed it. His idea then was that the government should step in and expand production in any industry whose capacity was not considered great enough to keep up with the growth of the country. For this he was accused of wanting to socialize industry. Now, however, it seems to be all right. Is is so all right that Con-

gress authorized \$2 billion for such government financed expansion of industry. And it has made \$600 million available for use at once in furthering this program.

It will be handled a little different this time. Instead of an "Uncle Jesse" Jones as federal loan administrator making most of the decisions, the regular departments of Commerce, Agriculture and Interior will do the planning. Reconstruction Finance Corporation will be just the fiscal agent, carrying out the orders of the other three.

W. Stuart Symington, chairman of National Security Resources

Board, has been designated as the top mobilizer, but he has not begun Three other unknown officials, any one or more of whom may be named by the President even before this gets into print, will be worth watching. These will be a director of Economic Stabilization, a price administrator and the chairman of another tripartite public-management-labor wage board.

THESE will be the home front heroes in probably the most thankless jobs in the country. They will be the Chester Bowles, the Leon Henderson and the William H. Davis of the new defense effort, and on their heads will be heaped all the abuse and hatred those officials

The new defense production act says prices can't be frozen in any industry unless wages in that industry are frozen too. That puts a new twist to the business. Wait till the first test cases arise.


In spite of rising living costs, the Truman administration is not yet

ready to move all-out on the anti-inflationary front. Congress authorized no expenditures for subsidies, and prices can't be rolled back without subsidies. Rent controls expire Dec. 31, and the cost of living line can't be held without rent controls. These may be two main items of business when Congress returns after Thanksgiving.


