Texas Has 9 Deaths On 1st Turkey Day

The first of Texas' two Thanksgiving Days resulted in at least nine deaths from violent causes, seven of the victims of traffic accidents.

The weather, which was climaxed by a breath-taking norther sweeping the state during the day, was indirectly responsible for two of the traffic deaths.

One man, Seth J. Morrell, of Houston, was shot and killed while hunting on his parents' farm near Bryan. Sheriff's officers said Morrell was struck by a .22 caliber rifle bullet fired at a rabbit by Johnny Sanders, also of Houston.

Another Houston man, Gus Peppas, 26, was shot and killed by the estranged husband of a woman for whom he had sought a divorce.

Two Dallas women, both Negroes, were drowned in Bin Sandy Lake after their car had been involved in a mass-collision along fog-covered U. S. Highway 80

near Big Sandy. They were Mrs. Willie Pickens, 42, and Minnie Hunts, 50. Two cars collided head-on in the fog and four more piled into the wreckage.

Three persons, including a father and his son bound for Thanksgiving dinner with their families, were killed in a two-car smash-up at Garden City.

Levelland, Kermit, Arlington, Coleman March Into Playoffs With Impressive Bi-Dist. Wins

By United Press. Lovbes to victory. Riek Spinks and Wayne Culvahouse each scored twice to pace Kermit to its victory over Colorado City. The mercury dropped 35 degrees during the game.

Bill Baker, 155 pounds of passing wizardry, paced Coleman to victory over Ranger, passing for three touchdowns and running for another as the Bluecats built up a 13-0 halftime lead and coasted in.

Rusty Gunn and Charles Marshall were the big guns in Arlington's powerful running attack at the Colts beat Newcastle. Gunn picked up 149 yards and Marshall 122 yards and each scored a touchdown as the Colts won their 11th straight game and extended their string to 23 without a loss.

Roland Hallmark picked up nearly 10 yards a carry in gaining 124 yards and scoring one of Athens' five touchdowns against Mineola. He also starred on the defense as the victors roared away from a 12-0 halftime lead.

La Vega, which beat Mexia 7-0 in an early season game, had to turn on the heat in the last half to break a 6-6 deadlock. Halfback Billy Dennis was the hero, scoring one touchdown and passing for two others.

There were dark bloodstains on the living room rugs. The lawns were trampled and rutted with the tire marks of ambulances which ignored the boundaries of the street in their haste. The folks of the neighborhood gathered in clusters on the corners to talk, to exchange tales of horror.

William Staker was one of the first men on the scene of the wreck. It happened just across the street from his house.

"My house was police headquarters," he said. "The police were in and out, phoning and everything until 7 o'clock in the morning."

"Just when they left, the kids got up. They wanted to see what happened. So I haven't been to bed yet. Turkey? I don't know. I haven't even had last night's dinner yet."

Staker looked out the living room window. There the expense of the four-track-wide railroad gleamed, without a sign of the tragedy remaining.

"Look at it," he said. "You'd never know anything happened. It's hard to believe—just a dream—a bad dream."

"But something happened, all right. I'll never forget that something happened."

29,996 US Casualties

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UP)—American casualties officially reported in the Korean fighting totaled 29,996, including 4,993 dead, through last Friday, the defense department announced today.

Public anger against the railroad—largest commuter line in the country—was so great that railroad guards stood watch last night while its chief bankruptcy trustee David E. Smucker slept in a car in the Jamaica yards. A rumor circulated that the widow of one victim had headed for Smucker's home with a gun. The railroad and police said the report proved to be false.

The wreck was the third this year on the heavily traveled line, with a total death toll of 110.

The engineer of the express, a man known for his caution among fellow employees, was killed in the accident. So it appeared unlikely investigators ever would learn exactly what happened in the few seconds before the crash.

However, it seemed likely the brunt of the criticism for the fifth worst U. S. rail wreck since 1900 would fall on the management of the bankrupt line which failed to install automatic safety devices at all signal blocks after a similar wreck at Rockville Centre, N. Y., nine months ago killed 33 persons and another three months ago injured 47.





### Teams Take Field Tomorrow To Battle For Bowl Booty; Only Cotton Bowl Names Opponents

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (UP)—They'll battle for bowl booty on the football fields of the land tomorrow.

Unbeaten California plays three-time Stanford for one Rose Bowl spot. Illinois takes on three-beat Northwestern for the other. In both cases there were dire dreads of the upset bugaboo, but California and Illinois each were 13-point favorites today.

Unbeaten Kentucky plays Tennessee for a Sugar Bowl berth. This is a tough one, for Tennessee has lost only one game—on upset to Mississippi State—and already has accepted an invitation to play Texas in the Cotton Bowl. But Kentucky was a seven-point choice, chiefly because of Babe Parilli's passing. He set a new record of 23 touchdown throws for a season when he tossed five against North Dakota last Saturday.

Oklahoma is Kentucky's most likely rival in the Sugar Bowl and plays Nebraska, which has lost only one game. But the Sooners were big 19-point choices to win their 30th game in a row.

Miami starts the bowl sweepstakes early, playing Iowa tonight in a bid for the home-grown Orange Bowl. Miami is unbeaten.

although once tied. The game is an even bet after Iowa's 14-14 tie with Notre Dame last Saturday.

Wyoming dove into the bowl brevities early, finishing its regular season unbeaten and untied by downing Denver, 42-12, and now sits (not all alone) by the telephone. Washington and Lee has an outside chance of a bowl bid after it clinched the Southern Conference championship yesterday by beating Richmond, 67-7 on Wild Walt Michaels three touchdowns and seven (out of 10) extra points.

Clemson looks to the Orange or Gator Bowl in its game with Auburn tomorrow. Clemson has been tied, but not beaten—yet is only a seven-point choice over Auburn, a team which has lost eight out of eight. Here seems to rest the best chance for an upset this weekend.

On the eve of these deciding games, however, the probable bowl lineup must be set thusly:

Rose Bowl — California vs. Illinois.

Suga Bowl — Kentucky vs. Oklahoma.

Cotton Bowl — Texas vs. Tennessee (all set).

Orange Bowl — Miami vs. Clemson or Southern Methodist.

Gator Bowl — Wyoming vs. Clemson or Southern Methodist.

SMU, which admits to Sugar and Orange Bowl feelers already, plays fierce Baylor Saturday and is a seven-point choice. Texas is off this week-end, playing Texas A&M next Thursday. Rice is 7 over TCU in another top southwest game.

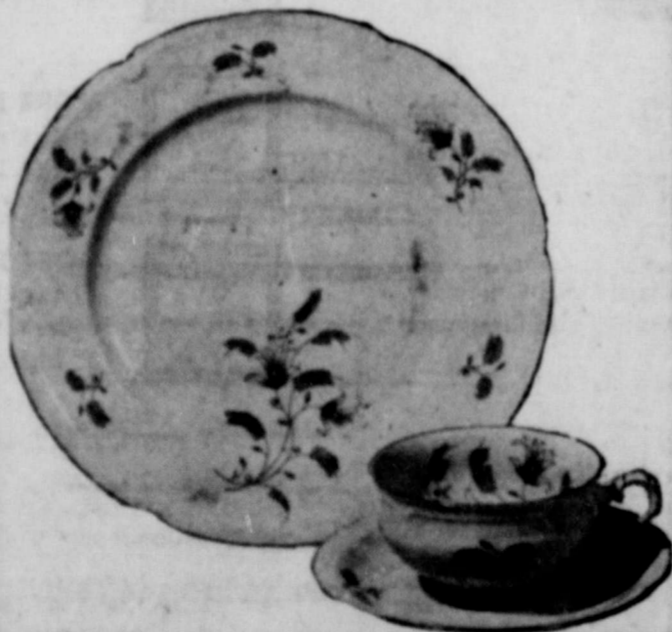

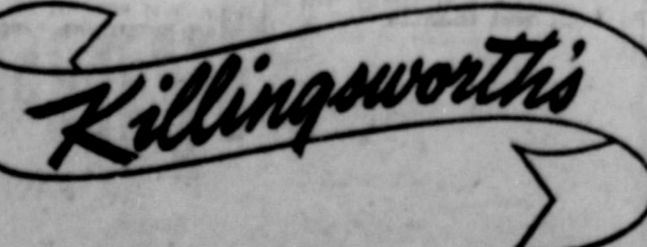

## Ray Eliot Of Ill. Named By UP Coach Of Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (UP)—He is about to get into the Rose Bowl on a pass—a 52-yard touch-down pass that went to the wrong receiver.

That is getting a lot of mileage out of just one desperate heave, parlaying it into a transcontinental trip. But that is what he has been doing all year with a team that even fond supporters admit is a little thin in spots.

He is the United Press coach of the week, Gay Ray Eliot, of the fighting Illini of Illinois, who spurned the odds and toppled mighty Ohio State, 14-7, almost assailing themselves of a New Year's Day appearance in Glamorous Pasadena.

They have only to get by Northwestern Saturday and the Rose Bowl invitation is theirs, but Eliot still refuses to count the possibilities until they are plucked, emphasizing that "we're lucky to have gotten this far."

He points out the team's shortcomings, "lack of size, not enough depth, no top flight quarterback, and plenty of trouble with punting and passing."

It was surprising to him that Illinois did as well as it did in humbling the bumptious Buckeyes. Don Major, his quarterback and passer, throws a "wobbly ball" even though Eliot admits he is "pretty smart."

In the play that started Illinois to victory, Major had intended to complete a pass to end Chuck Fox but Ohio State had him boxed and it looked as if the Illini would be thrown for a disastrous loss. But the alert Major spotted sub half-back Don Stevens getting into the clear and shot him a cross-field pass. The heave was good for 12 yards and Stevens ran 40 more to put Illinois ahead.

Thus reducing the Ohio giants to mere mortals, Major turned opportunist again a few moments later. One of his so-called wobbly passes was fumbled by Tony Klimek when he was tackled, but the ever-ready Stevens was on hand to grab the ball and raced to the five. Then Major passed to Stevens for what proved to be the winning counter.

Eliot, who said before the game that he felt like he was headed for the electric chair, confessed that "we escaped the execution but it could be only a reprieve."

"We've got a big ball game with Northwestern, and they're just lusting to beat us," he went on. "Lordy, yes, everybody is talking Rose Bowl, and I wish they wouldn't. We've still got a game to win and if we don't win it we may not be anywhere near that bowl."

But he is the only one on the jubilant Illini campus who doesn't have that "California here we come" spirit at the moment.

The students and players think the genial sandy-haired balding giant who succeeded the immortal Bob Zupke in 1942 has come a long way with his congenial easy-going manner. He isn't rated as a stand-out grid tactician but he

is tenacious and his long memory helps him in key situations.

When the way ahead is the toughest, as it was before the Ohio State date, he kids the players along telling them "we're going to be the underdogs but if everybody was as dumb as we have got the stuff to win it."

Actually, he wasn't kidding them and the spirit he generated was the biggest factor in the final analysis.

"It was a team victory and team victories are a tradition at Illini," he said.

It could be, too, that they'll make a tradition out of going to Pasadena as often as the big ten Pacific conference closed shop agreements will permit them to.
