## Reds Abandon Assault On Seoul Today Shift East Apparently To By-Pass City

### Huge Crowd Expected Thursday To Hear T & P Women's Chorus

Huge crowds of Ranger's colorful citizenry are expected to be on hand Thursday to enjoy the Texas and Pacific Railway's Women's Chorus which is being sponsored by the Ranger "1920 Club" in observance of National Music Week.

This program which will be presented at the Ranger First Methodist Church following the regular revival meeting will be free to the public and persons from neighboring towns are urged to come to the affair.

The program will commence at 8:15 p.m. The chorus consist of 24 members.

One of the most popular of all recreational features in the general offices of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company at Dallas, Texas—and most productive of goodwill and public comment—is the T&P Women's Chorus.

This organization came into being during September, 1946, shortly after the coming of a new president, Mr. W. G. Vollmer, to the railroad in the previous year. A strong believer in good employee-management relations, Mr. Vollmer and his newly-named director of public and employe relations, Mr. J. B. Shores, instituted an employe recreation program at the outset. Formation of this chorus group followed as a part of that program.

Since that time, numerous appearances have been made by the T&P Women's Chorus at both employe and public affairs. In addition to singing for employe groups along the entire system from New Orleans, La., to El Paso, Texas, this feminine musical ensemble has performed before many luncheon clubs and civic groups in the Southwest.

These performances include presentations at U. S. Veterans Hospitals at Dallas and McKinney, Tex., and concerts at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas and the Central East Texas Fair & Livestock Exposition at Marshall, Tex. The chorus is no stranger to the video world, they have given two performances on television at Dallas.

Director of the chorus is William Hargrave. He has had an extensive musical educational background.

He studied in California for seven years under the tutelage of a singer who once had been Gay '90's Queen, Lillian Russell's leading man. From California, he went to New York where he studied under Metro Cimara, director of the Metropolitan Opera Co. Hargrave was with the Met for three years. The Met, which is synonymous with grand opera everywhere in this country, had him sing in Dallas in 1946. The company at that time was on the road and Hargrave, a bass baritone sang the role of Monterone in the Italian opera "Rigoletto."

### Escaped Convict Under Building

SUGARLAND, May 1 (UP)—An escaped Central Prison Farm convict, who was missing at the Sunday night count, was captured late yesterday—right on the prison farm.

The convict, E. C. Parker, 29, was found hiding under the Administration Building, waiting for a chance to leave the farm.

Parker was under a 17-year-sentence for hog theft and attempted jail break.

After he was found to be missing, guards, aided by bloodhounds, tried to pick up his trail, but had no luck.

Continuing the search yesterday, guards finally found him under the building.

### Security Agents and Armed Guards Protected Vogeler On In To NY

NEW YORK, May 1 (UP)—Robert A. Vogeler, nerve-racked by 17 months of Communist prison-torture, returns today to his homeland which paid a mighty ransom for his release.

The American businessman and his family winged toward the United States in a commercial airliner on a flight arranged by the United Department to get him quickly as far as possible from his Iron Curtain prison in Hungary.

Vogeler, 39, was protected by Security Agents and armed guards from the time he left Vienna at 12:45 a.m. (7:15 p.m. EDT) yesterday through the scheduled landing at Idlewild Airport, here at 10 a.m. EDT.

Imprisoned in Hungary on espionage charges in 1949, Vogeler was expected to be taken to a hospital for treatment of a nervous breakdown that followed his dramatic release from 14 months of solitary confinement last Saturday.

### Deputy Takes Over the Job

AMARILLO, May 1 (UP)—Former Deputy Sheriff Henry Maggard took over as manager of the Potter County Juvenile Home today after the previous managers were fired for allegedly mistreating prisoners.

Domestic Court Judge F. H. McGregor dismissed Mr. and Mrs. Lucas G. Jordan after the Potter County Juvenile Advisory Board said it had statements saying Jordan struck two young prisoners with his fists.

Another complaint said a young prisoner was forced to sleep on a bed without a mattress.

### Beef Prices Are Effective May 13

DALLAS, May 1 (UP)—Official beef prices scales to go in effect May 13 were announced last night by the Regional Office of Price Stabilization here.

The regulation classified Texas, New Mexico, and Arkansas as a single zone with identical prices in the three states, OPS Regional Director Alfred L. Seelye said. The varying prices, Seelye said, are due to cost differentials to stores, and all stores are required to post their ceiling prices by June 2.

Seelye said the new ceilings will apply until Aug. 1 when a cut of 4 1/2 per cent on all items will go into effect. A second 4 1/2 per cent cut has been ordered for October 1.

### Texan Flies to Rugged Country

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 1 (UP)—Berk Gann, 34, who was lost with his six-year-old daughter and a 16-year-old boy in the Alaska wilderness for eight days after his plane was forced down in a storm, took his little girl to an eye doctor today in hopes of saving her sight.

Gann, his daughter, Linda, and Alexander Hately were flown here yesterday after they spent four days without food, wandered along a lonely river and finally found refuge in a trapper's cabin.

Doctors said the trio did not require hospitalization despite their ordeal. Gann, formerly of Denton, Texas, moved to Alaska in 1949 to teach school. He once taught school at Wichita Falls.

Gann flew over some of the territory's most rugged country, including the 10,000-foot Alaska range, although he was advised not to attempt completion of the flight.

### Chinks Ordered To Whip Marines

CENTRAL FRONT, Korea, May 1 (UP)—Chinese Communist troops opened their spring offensive 10 days ago with orders to "destroy or neutralize" the U. S. 1st Marine Division, it can be disclosed today.

The opportunity was offered them when the South Korean 6th Division on the left of the Marines broke and ran, leaving a wide hole in the central front.

The Reds poured elements of three corps—nine divisions—into the hole. They advanced 20 miles. But they never did get behind the Marines to destroy them, as their orders read.

They were stopped by Marine reserves.

### Allied Planes And Guns Roar As UN Have Field Day On Reds

TOKYO, May 1 (UP)—The Chinese Reds abandoned their frontal assault on Seoul today and shifted east for an apparent attempt to by-pass the ruined city and strike deep into Central Korea.

Allied planes and guns had a field day against Communist columns pouring southeast toward the deep X-shaped Chinese salient in the United Nations line near the Junction of the Han and Pukhan Rivers, 15 to 20 miles east of Seoul.

The Reds presumably had decided to aim the second round of their spring "end-the-war" offensive down the spiny center of the Korean Peninsula toward Yoju on the southward bend of the Han.

A Communist advance to Yoju, key road junction 38 miles southeast of Seoul and 50 miles below the 38th Parallel, probably would force the 8th Army to give up the capital without a fight to protect its rear and flanks.

An 8th Army communique reported that UN patrols thrusting out from the 30-mile defense arc around Seoul for the second straight day made little or no contact with the regrouping Communists.

Patrols found a Communist minefield northwest of Seoul—further evidence that the Chinese plan no immediate attack from that direction.

Another task force encountered an estimated 200 Reds north of Seoul and called down an air strike "with excellent results," the communique said.

The air war raged briefly over northwest Korea for the first time in five days. Twenty-five American Sabrejets defeated an even greater number of Soviet-built Jet fighters 20 miles southeast of Sinju on the Manchurian border.

The dogfight swirled from 40,000 down to 2,000 feet and ended with four Communist MIG-15s damaged, one probably destroyed and the rest in flight to ward Manchuria.

The song services are being led by Mr. Earl Ward, able evangelistic singer. The special number by the forty voice choir was enjoyed by all.

This evening Rev. Farmer will be speaking on the subject: "Prepare to Meet Thy God."

The Boy Scouts, under the supervision of Mr. H. A. Shockey and Mr. O. L. Cantrell be the special guests.

All boy scouts are urged to attend in a body.

### Men Confess To Theft of Calf

Frankie Lee Bawn, Sweetwater, and Willie O. Matthews, Ekota, are under arrest and have confessed to the theft of a calf from C. A. Johnson of Rising Star, Sheriff Frank Tucker has announced.

Tucker went to Sweetwater, Monday, where the men were being held and brought them back to Eastland where they were placed in the county jail.

The two men took the calf from Johnson's barn on his farm near Rising Star, and have admitted taking the calf to Sweetwater where it was put in Ben's yard.

## Hulen Charged With Murder

AUSTIN, April 30 (UP)—R. J. Hulen, charged with the bludgeoned murder of his estranged wife at Amarillo, was being held here today for further questioning. District attorney H. C. Pipkin of Amarillo filed a murder charge against Hulen, a truck driver for a rendering plant, late Saturday, after the man "failed" a lie detector test given here by experts of the Department of Public Safety. Pipkin said also laboratory tests showed blood stains on Hulen's trousers and shoes.

Police Chief Sid Harper arrived from Amarillo late yesterday, bringing an object which he believed might be the murder weapon. Neither Harper nor other authorities were willing immediately to identify the possible motive.

Mrs. Hulen, who filed suit for divorce was found in her Amarillo home last Wednesday night, dead from a series of head-splitting blows. She was nude, lying under a sunlamp in her bedroom, and authorities theorized that the murderer surprised her as she was sunbathing.

## Charge Sergeant With Homicide

STEPHENVILLE, May 1 (UP) A 21-year-old Air Force Sergeant has been charged with negligent homicide in the automobile collision death last night of Delbert Louis Griffin, Sr., 65, prominent Odessa property owner.

Investigators said Griffin's car was hit by a vehicle driven by Sgt. Lewis Phillip Hammbach of Killeen Air Force Base.

The young serviceman was charged before Justice of the Peace W. T. Graves in Stephenville.

## Little Is New Mexia Ball Coach

MEXIA, May 1 (UP)—Truett Little, a 41-year veteran schoolboy coach at Seymour, Throckmorton, Seagraves and Odessa, took over as head football coach at Mexia High school today.

Little, a Howard Payne graduate whose teams have won 117 games while losing 39 and 5 in 14 years, succeeded L. Bain who recently resigned to go to Jasper High School.

He was elected by the school board Saturday night and started work today, midway through the Black Cats' spring training.

## Ancient Skull Rebuilt By Smithsonian

WASHINGTON (UP)—A skull believed to be 10,000 years old has been reconstructed at the Smithsonian Institution.

Found near Mexico City with fossil bones of mammoths that date back 10,000 years, the skull of Tepepan man may represent the earliest human beings in the Americas.

Reconstruction of the head from the skull was accomplished with plastics.

Some guessing was involved, particularly concerning the hair and shape of the eyes. Still, it is believed the head and face represent the man as he appeared centuries ago. He resembles a typical southwestern Indian and placed among modern Indian skulls would be hard to distinguish.

## "Unloaded" Rifle Blamed For Death

DALLAS, April 30 (UP)—An "unloaded" .22 caliber rifle was blamed today for the death of 16-year-old Charles Warren Graff, shot through the heart while playing in the kitchen of his home last night.

Police said the youth was shot by a gun in the hands of his younger brother, Rayburn, 15, who thought the weapon was empty. Shortly before the shooting, police said, Charles had pointed a .22 pistol at Rayburn and playfully yelled "hang!". Rayburn seized the .22 to return the make-believe fire.

## Charity Bread Continues To Grace Church Door

PORTSMOUTH, N. H. (UP)—One Sunday each month a loaf of bread is placed on a table in the entrance to St. John's Episcopal Church.

The monthly loaf observes the spirit, if not the letter, of a legacy left to the poor of the parish nearly two centuries ago. Theodore Atkinson left \$1,000

to the church when he died in 1779. The income from the fund was to be used to buy bread for the poor. For more than a hundred years the bread was distributed at Sunday services.

The Atkinson bequest has since been transferred to the church's general fund. The bread is placed at the church door in memory of the 18th Century benefactor.
