from the residence of North Korean Gen. Nam Il, head of the Communist truce delegation.

A UN plane dropped two bombs at 1:30 a.m. today (11:30 a.m. Friday EDT), the Reds said.

U. S. Air Force Col. Andrew J. Kinney, who headed the investigating team, told the Communists there was no conclusive evidence even that an aircraft had dropped the two bombs.

However, he conceded that the testimony of Korean civilians who said they lived in the area indicated the bombs had been dropped from a plane rather than planted

in the ground and then detonated.

But even if that were so, he argued, there was no evidence that an American plane had dropped the bombs. Moreover, he told the Reds, he believed a Red aircraft had released the bombs.

Kinney also headed the liaison team which investigated the Communist complaint that a UN plane had bombed Kaesong Aug. 22 in an attempt to kill Nam Il. It was on the pretext of this raid that the Communists broke off the Korean truce talks in Kaesong the next day.

The UN investigation showed that no Allied planes were over Kaesong the night of Aug. 22 and that the evidence produced by the Communists had been faked.

The UN command earlier Saturday also rejected three previous Communist complaints alleging Allied violations of the Kaesong neutral zone.

It categorically denied Red charges that UN troops had fired on Communist military police patrols twice on Thursday and that a UN plane had dropped a flare over the Kaesong area Wednesday night.

The Communists still have not replied to Supreme UN commander Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's latest proposal Wednesday that the truce talks be resumed.

A UN command broadcast said Saturday that if the Communists do agree to resume the conference the "manufactured incidents" already staged by the Reds indicate that the world can expect "further absurdities" in the months to come.

A Communist refusal to resume the talks, the broadcast added.

### Questioned Negro Shoots Officers

FORT WORTH, Aug. 31 (UP)

—A teen-age Negro who ambushed a city police car with a shotgun and wounded the two patrolmen late last night, said he guessed he "just lost my head."

The youth, who was arrested and jailed by detectives shortly after the shooting, said it was over a big knife the patrolmen had questioned him about two hours earlier.

Patrolman T. J. Stevenson, 61, was hit in the right side of the neck and his jugular vein nicked by one of the two shotgun blasts fired at the side of the car. His condition was described as serious.

His partner, officer H. L. Stephenson, 31, driver of the patrol car, was wounded in the right shoulder by several pellets from the 410-gauge shotgun.

The officers said they had stopped the boy earlier on suspicion. They questioned him about a large double-bladed knife he carried, and warned him that he should take it home to avoid trouble.

Notice of said election shall be posted in the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Ranger at least thirty days prior to date of said election, and notice of said election shall be published in the Ranger Daily Times once each week until date of said election.

bunkers and trenches with fixed bayonets and a shower of hand grenades while massed UN artillery buried a shattering barrage of flame and steel ahead of them.

Near the east coast, UN warships joined the furious bombardment.

Most of the front was aflame from the Sea of Japan coast inland to the southeast approaches to Kumsong, big Communist base 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel.

The Allies captured five key hills and gained up to four miles on the first day of the resumed offensive Friday. Officers on the spot estimated that the opening barrage killed 900 Reds. There was no report on how many others died in bayonet, rifle and machine-gun fighting, or from Allied air attacks.

The Communists put up fierce resistance and rushed reinforcements south from the Manchurian border by the truckloads to strengthen their threatened lines.

UN fighters attacked 2,500 vehicles in enemy supply and reinforcement convoys clogging the roads. At least 460 trucks were destroyed or damaged.

### Headhunters Get 93 Heads In Raid

NEW DELHI, INDIA, Aug. 31 (UP)

—Naked headhunting Naga tribesmen from Burma, raided an Indian village last March and carried off 93 heads, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru told parliament today.

"The incident had no geographical importance," he said. "It was an exhibition of exuberance which occurs annually and there is nothing new about it."

He said 400 houses and granaries in the village of Noidu had been burned, livestock killed and crops destroyed after the raiders had killed and beheaded 93 villagers.

The raid was repeated four days later but the villagers had fled.

Allied airmen reported that roads running from the Manchurian frontier to Pyongyang, the North Korean capital, and Wonsan, on the east coast, were alive with vehicles.

**Police Guard Against Red Demonstrations**

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 1 (UP)—Troops and police guarded the route President Miguel Aleman will take today to deliver his fifth state of the union message, on watch for any new Communist terrorism.

Some 3,000 Communist led student rioters battled steel-helmeted police and government security forces last night and burned 10 ornamental arches along the board Cinco De Mayor Avenue route which Aleman will use.

The rioters claimed the money spent on the decorations should have gone to the "hungry and miserable people," especially the sufferers from the recent flood and hurricane.

One police lieutenant was injured in the rioting and several students arrested.

Police closed off the approaches to Aleman's home after students shouted they would march on the presidential mansion.

More than 140 ornamental arches, costing from \$700 to \$7,000 each, have been raised along the city's main avenues to honor Aleman.

The rioters distributed handbills charging "the encircled politicians raise costly triumphal arches to Miguel Aleman."

They asked the public to tear down the arches and said the hungry and homeless can't feed themselves on the smiles of your president.

**Con Picks The Wrong Day To Break Out**

AUSTIN, Aug. 31 (UP)—A convict serving a two-year term for burglary from Anderson county escaped prison and gained a pardon all on the same day, the State Board of Pardons and Paroles said.

Since then, the pardon has been recalled. So has the convict, Morris Eugene Bennett.

The board said a conditional pardon for Bennett was issued Aug. 21, the day he picked to escape.

Prison system officials said Bennett has been "placed in class III"—no privileges. The pardon was declared "null and void."

**Connally Says Douglas Should Stay At Home**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UP)—William O. Douglas would stick close to his Supreme Court bench and judicial opinion if Sen. Tom Connally, D., Tex., had his way.

Connally's advice to the roaming Supreme Court Justice, who has just returned from a tour of the Orient, is:

"Stay at home instead of roaming around Asia making fool statements."

The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee offered his advice yesterday during the course of an angry debate touched off when Sen. Herman Walker, R. Ill., read a news dispatch quoting Douglas as favoring U. S. recognition of Red China.

**Treaty Meeting Will Show The Peaceful Nations**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today that the Japanese peace treaty conference opening in San Francisco Tuesday will show which nations want peace and which do not.

Acheson made the statement shortly before he boarded a plane for San Francisco.

He named no names, but Russia and its Polish and Czechoslovakian satellites are prepared to disrupt the conference and try to prevent adoption of the American sponsored treaty which frees Japan to rearm and expand its economy.

Acheson said the pact is "a realistic—treaty of opportunity" for Japan and predicted that the vast majority of the 51 nations attending the conference will sign. "San Francisco—will provide a test for those nations that really want peace and those that do not," Acheson said.

John Foster Dulles, Republican state department aide and prime author of the treaty, said the new pact is setting a new kind of peace.

"It will be solid against anything but a direct frontal attack," Dulles said. "By some great nation deliberately bent on starting World War III."

Acheson and Dulles and their wives were among 4 persons who boarded a chartered DC-6 airliner bound for the conference. They hope, despite Russia's opposition, to complete the treaty by Sept. 8.

A 40-man Soviet delegation headed by Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko will arrive in San Francisco tomorrow by transcontinental train.

Gromyko is expected to offer the peace conference a "made in Moscow" treaty that would be rejected outright by a heavy majority of non-Communist nations. Red strategy may also be tied to an offer to discuss all Far Eastern problems, including the Korean war.

**Shivers And Shepperd Speak At Texas A&M**

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 31 (UP)—Freedom can be killed by degeneration of the American home, Texas Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd told Texas Home Demonstration Association members yesterday.

"American citizens need to pay more attention to guidance of future generations," Shepperd said in an address to 1,500 convention delegates from 116 counties.

Preservation of freedom is the nation's most important job, Shepperd said. "If the home degenerates, freedom will go after."

Shepperd represented Gov. Allan Shivers at the three-day convention ending today.

Delegates approved a work program to include study of the Hoover Commission report, effects of alcohol and narcotics on young Texans, soil conservation and consumer and producer problems.

**General Kenney Retires From AF**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (UP)—Gen. George C. Kenney, commanding general of the Far East Air Force in World War II, retired today after more than 34 years of military service.

As the 62-year-old flying general closed his military career, Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, air force Chief of Staff, awarded him a second leaf cluster for his Distinguished Service Medal and the legion of merit.

Kenney, regarded as one of the nation's ablest air commanders, was born at Yatmouth, Nova Scotia, Aug. 16 1889, and attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, Mass.

In 1942 Kenney assumed command of the allied air forces in the South Pacific—later the Far East Air Force—and directed the far-flung air war against the Japanese for three years from Australia to the Philippines.

Joseph W. Collins in a suit filed yesterday, asked that he be awarded \$250,000 for services he rendered Davis in arranging his marriage to Mrs. Margaret Hill, a railroad heiress.

Mrs. Hill and Davis were married in a socialist wedding in Washington in 1946. Mrs. Truman attended the wedding and a dinner was held afterwards at the White House.

His wife died in 1948 leaving Davis most of a \$9,000,000 estate received from her first husband, James Norman Hill, son of a railroad tycoon.
