Third Annual Field Day Held At Kokomo

The third annual conservation field day, under the direction of District Supervisor, L. R. Higginottom, was held last week, at the Kokomo Community Tabarnacle. Kokomo is located about 10 miles northeast of Carbon.

More than 50 farmers and ranchers of Eastland and neighboring counties attended the meeting.

The morning program consisted of discussions on soils and soil capabilities. A brief explanation was made on the recent reorganization of the USDA and the basic objective of the Department of Agriculture.

M. T. Turner and E. E. Mc Alister, Soil Conservation Service technicians assigned the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, led in the morning discussion.

After a free lunch was served, Higginbottom introduced the Eastland County PMA Committeemen, A. Z. Myrick and E. E. Blackwell; and Emmett Powell, PMA Secretary of Eastland County. Each made brief talks regarding the cooperation be-tween the United States Department of Agriculture agencies in assisting farmers.

Randall F. Reeves, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conserva-tion Service at Rising Star, outlined the short tour on Albert Hendrick's farm.

The group observed several soils under field conditions. Fa-'vorable and unfavorable soil characteristics were pointed out . with discussions on maintenance of improvement for those charac-
